## Letter from your Minister

# Not on “Richard & Judy’s” List

Whether you are looking at holidaying at home or away, a time of refreshment is in order and I always look forward to the Methodist rule of no meetings in August to catch up with family and friends and read some of those books that have been accumulating by my bedside. I usually have several books on the go at one time from autobiographies that makes me think, to novels that make me feel, to offerings from spiritual gurus that make me pray.

In the autobiography slot, I have been reading 2 books lent to me by my daughter. The first is entitled, *Half the Sky: How to Change the World*, by Sheryl Wudunn & Nicholas Kristof. It takes you on a journey through Africa and Asia to meet an array of extraordinary women who face poverty, disease and conflict and make a difference for themselves and other women who have very little. There is Rath in Cambodia, who escaped from the brothel she had been sold into and now runs a thriving retail business that supports her family. There is Mamitu, who grew up without an education in a remote village in Ethiopia and now trains surgeons in Addis Ababa. There are stories of countless other women who have overcome unimaginable hurdles in order to change the world. The title for the book comes from a Chinese’s proverb, “Women hold up half the sky,” and illustrates that investing in women’s education may well be the highest return investment in the developed world. Though often challenging, it is an inspiring and compassionate read whatever gender you are.

The second book is by Azar Nafisi and is called *Reading Lolita in Tehran*. Set in the late 1990, it records the conversations of a group of educated women who meet every Thursday to read forbidden Western literature. Hesitant to start with, they begin to open up about the novels they are reading and their own personal stories, intertwining *Pride and Prejudice*, *The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie* and *The Great Gatsby* with their lives in revolutionary Iran. Painful, witty and perceptive and hugely informative as to what women wear under their burkas, it provides a window into politics, faith and resistance.

Coming under the heading of novel, but with a strong biblical emphasis, I have been reading Anita Diamant’s book, *The Red Tent*. This is the story of Dinah, the daughter of Jacob and sister to the more famous Joseph, and is essentially the biblical story of princes and palaces but told from the women’s perspectives. Based on reliable research, it provides interesting insights into the cultural and faith practices of the time, the Red Tent, for example, being the tent the women live in when they are menstruating, and where they form relationships of encouragement and support. All set within a lively story it enables you to reflect on the voices that are missing and increases your understanding of a God at work through chosen-ness.

**Letter from your Minister (continued)**

Following a similar structure but set 2000 years later is Naomi Alderman's, *Liar's Gospel*. This reimagines the story of Jesus through the experience of 4 people a year after his death. You hear the story from the perspective of his grieving Mother, the High Priest from the Temple, from a rebel called Baravo, and from one of his friends who has lost his faith, Judas. Either something miraculous happened or somebody is lying. Alderman sets the story within the politics of the time, develops the characters from where the biblical story leaves them and leads them in not necessarily the most predictable directions.

Dealing also with themes of forgiveness and redemption, Kate Atkinson's, *Life after Life* was a novel I really enjoyed and just right for a holiday. It's about Ursula who is given an special gift at birth of being able to come back and live life over and over again, putting right some of the things that have gone wrong in previous lives. It begins with her birth in 1910 and spans both world wars. Every time she dies, reality for her friends and family will be slightly rearranged and the story highlights that life can often turn on the smallest of incidents whose significance is only gained in retrospect. There's a theme of parental favouritism running through the story and a hope that things could be redeemed even as we relinquish along the way.

And finally, if you are after a prayer book to slip into your case, *Grain in Winter*, from Methodist Minister and past Chair of Birmingham District, Donald Eadie, will bless you. Donald describes himself as a Saturday person, his theology honed from years as a Spiritual Director deeply listening to where God is at work in people's lives. His prayer book can be picked up and put down but always provides something to chew on.

May you find peace and relaxation over the coming 2 months and let me know what you are reading. I always enjoy a positive recommendation.


### Thank You

#### **"HARP FACTS (2013/14)**

- HARP assisted over 1,295 people last year at our Day Centre where we find people a safe place for the night to avoid sleeping rough on the street.
- HARP received 12,540 visits last year from people who are homeless or under the threat of becoming homeless.
- HARP can house up to 100 people at one time in supported accommodation (hostels, bed sits and flats).
- HARP provided 38,329 hot meals.
- HARP provides 1,750 food parcels a year.
- HARP's volunteers are crucial to keeping the charity afloat. We have approximately 50 volunteers across sites including our charity retail shop in Westcliff and our kitchens are all run by volunteers.
- All food donated to HARP is used in food parcels, night packs and for meals at the Day Centre, Night Shelter and specialist hostels."

## **Redevelopment at Highlands**

In July 2012 we set out to ask for suggestions for redeveloping Highlands Methodist Church so that we can move forward and grow God's presence on the Highlands and Marine estates. It has been quite a big part of what we have been working and praying for over the last two years. After many months, meetings and meanderings we came to show the Church a draft Plan. We asked for responses to the plan, and we received them.

They weren't quite what we had anticipated. We were disappointed.

25 to 5 the responses did not support going ahead with the Plan.

We had had a preliminary meeting with the planners who reinforced one view expressed – we would not be able to build so close to the edge of the site. This means we would have to shrink the building. This would mean a radical pruning and might not make the building viable. At very least it would mean committing a considerable sum to come up with another Plan.

There are real issues around access via the roadway at the back which would need to be sorted in order for the residential plots to be viable...

We have listened to the people who have never been comfortable with this drastic plan, especially those who had concerns about its financial viability. We were clear that it should be cost neutral but, as they stand, the plans at this point did not give us enough financial security...

We are very aware that we have an amazing financial resource in this plot of land. We need to make the best possible use of it. We can't use it twice. We need to make sure that God's work prospers and not a firm of developers. So, after 2 years work and worry, we haven't got the answer we were hoping for. The problems / issues that we are left with and the comments that we have listened to have led us to believe that we should **not** continue with a plan to redevelop the site...

So, is that it then? Have we done this all for nothing? Are we going to settle down and wait for the world to swallow up Highlands Methodist Church?

We are not!! God has work for us to do. Many of the things that we are doing are growing and **we have all the opportunities we had before. None of that has changed.** We have lots to be excited about – and now we can do it knowing that we have explored this option very thoroughly and can agree with those who were doubtful from the beginning, that a new build is not the way to go.

It is a disappointment. Maybe a loss – something exciting, something we were looking forward to has gone. But we cannot always see it at the time, **God will have a better plan than ours!** We have some money, and it is enough to make some things that we might have put on hold start to happen. We can start to make changes. We can work together to raise some more money, to make new things happen, to find what God's Plan really is for Highlands Methodist Church.

We can come together to think again, to plan what really needs to be done **and we can get on with it!** No more waiting for something in the future – the future can begin today. We think that the best way forward is to pass the planning to the Property and Finance committee – but only in so far as we ask them to set up a sub-group, co-opting who ever would like to be involved, to prioritise and plan the things that we really need to get done.

We recognise that we can't ask P&F to do all the work! Rev Julia will join that group. We will need more people to work together to get the buildings at Highlands fit for the purpose we share.

And we hope that some of us, and some of you, and some of the others, will want to be involved.

Another New Year, another New Beginning.
