Dine with the Homeless

Florentines

These are a really easy treat and great to give as presents. Literally anyone (including children) can make them and they look special when wrapped in cellophane and tied with a ribbon. You can vary the dried fruits. I've used apricots, glacé cherries and sultanas, but candied peel and cranberries are the best in my opinion. Obviously the recipe above contains nuts, but that's easily avoided.

It's very important to measure precisely and make them small, as they flatten and spread during cooking. Watch the cooking time. I like to use dark chocolate but it's a personal choice – you can use milk or even white.

Ingredients

- 50g each of butter, demerara sugar, golden syrup, plain flour and candied peel
- 25g each of dried cranberries, finely chopped almonds, finely chopped walnuts
- 200g chocolate

Method

- Heat your oven to 180° C, Gas 4. Line 3 baking trays with baking parchment or silicon sheets. (You do need to use 3 trays)
- Put butter, sugar and syrup in a small pan and heat gently until butter is melted. Remove from heat, add flour and fruit/nuts and stir. That's it!
- Put 6 teaspoons of the mixture on each baking tray, with each teaspoonful separate and well-spaced.

- Bake for 8–10 minutes until golden brown. Let them cool a little on the tray and then lift off onto a wire rack to cool completely. They're quite fragile when you first take them from the oven.

Melt the chocolate in the microwave and when cool but still runny, spread a little over each florentine. Allow to cool and then with a fork make a zig-zag pattern in the cooling chocolate.

They don't keep well, and need to be eaten within a few days. Achieving this will not be a problem.



Christmas in 1940s Lancashire was a special time.

A full "Star-card" for attendance at Sunday School meant a book-token for a first prize. A magical trip to the largest bookshop in the town to choose from the wonderful array of children's books. I can still picture the fairy tale book I received at 4 years of age.

Our little hands made crêpe paper chains which were hung across our front room ceiling. We mixed Christmas pudding and cake and cut pastry shapes for mince pies.

In the week before Christmas singers from the chapel went carolling round the village. We sang our favourites under the street gas lights. Our speciality was '*While Shepherds Watched*' to the tune '*Lingham*' with its multi-layered final line. Cold and tired we wended our way to the farm house of chapel friends, where we sat by the roaring fire with hot drinks and mince pies.



Waking on Christmas morning we found lyle stockings full of goodies. Always an orange and chocolate money. Larger presents were few. I remember the year I got a second-hand bike painted orange – what a treat! Christmas dinner was usually a chicken, always sprouts, and a steaming pudding with white sauce. Hugh, our coalman friend, always joined us. Aunt Mary came in the afternoon and we ended with a game of cards, the one time in the year when everyone joined in.

In those post-war years we didn't have a lot, but what we had we appreciated. Our celebrations were centred on the chapel and the faith that we held dear.
