These are the reports to be delivered at the GCM on Sunday 12 May. In some cases they have been edited down.

Our Minister

Around this time last year we received the sad news that Rev Julia was ill and needed to begin treatment immediately. We continue to follow her progress with interest and uphold her with our prayers. It was at this point that I was invited to step in as interim minister until last September, and it has been my privilege to continue throughout the year as Highlands' minister. I would like to just express my gratitude to the church family for the friendship, warmth and encouragement as we have sought to discern and follow God's leading together.

Let me start by highlighting what I have found to be characteristics of our church community that have been a particular blessing to me. Highlands has a very strong volunteer base which makes it possible for so much to be delivered both in terms of the maintenance, upkeep and in particular loving mission into the community. You are all amazing and I want you to know that your service is appreciated and never taken for granted! Finance, property, stewarding, pastoral, craft, prayer, worship, as well as the passion I have found for people who are vulnerable and in particular the homeless!

Something else I love about Highlands is the way new ideas and suggestions are taken seriously, considered, evaluated and, when it seems appropriate, acted upon! I know some of us come up with some crazy initiatives; but keep them coming! We might not always act on every suggestion, but you can be sure your ideas are valued. The latest thing has been the idea of doing something different on 'Father's Day' (16 June since you ask). Let's hope and pray we can pull this off. You know, there's no shame in trying new things and some of them becoming a bit of a flop. I'd rather try five new things and get two of them to fly, rather than out of the fear of failure, not

try new ideas and never achieve anything at all. Let's keep on dreaming dreams and pushing the boat out - you never know when you'll get a good catch or end up in the middle of a storm. In this context - Parade Services have been fun, and it has been so worthwhile doing the children's event - X-Cite on Saturday mornings.

Another highlight of the year was receiving new people into membership, and I am pleased to say that someone else has expressed an interest in becoming a member. In the near future I will be holding a couple of sessions to explore church membership and would love to hear from anyone who would like to join us in these.

Now then - a particular thank you to our two employees! Anne Lane who continues to do a great job with the property, and Julie Peek whose role has changed somewhat but who continues to do an amazing job not least through the community days. We value and appreciate you both but also recognise that your contribution depends on the army of volunteers we spoke of earlier. A special mention also needs to go to our organists Tim and Barry; your involvement has truly enriched our worship.

I also just want to celebrate the different groups who use our premises - Showstoppers, Uniformed Organisations, the Salvation Army Pre School and many others, as well as all those groups run by the church whose reports will be included in the Highlander this month for our General Church Meeting. Thanks Andrew for using this month's publication this way - much appreciated.

Finally, as we seek to set fresh goals for the year ahead let us become devoted to prayer, released in worship and focussed upon God's call upon us to share his presence, grace and love with others!

Thanks to everyone for their help during the year. Without exception our stewards have other church responsibilities, so we are lucky to be able to rely on them.

We also have a great team of vestry assistants – Maureen Kelly, Jill Groves, Vanessa Mayes, and Sandra Harrison. Jackie Williams, along with others already mentioned, compiles and prints the weekly news sheets. Patrick and Andreas operate the projector/computer each week. Tim Francis regularly (and Barry McCurdy on occasions) has played the organ for us and advised on musical matters.

So what do the stewards actually do? There are some clues above, but in short, the job of the stewards is to decide how best to use limited resources to meet the spiritual needs of Highlands, and then to make it happen.

On every occasion where stewarding has been required, we have successfully provided a stewarding service. Where sound amplification is needed, we plug it in and switch it on and test it. If people want to sit in a circle, we'll get the chairs shifted. If written material is required, we get it printed. Where refreshments are required, we arrange it. And so it goes on, sometimes without anyone really being aware. But we don't mind that; if nobody notices what the stewards are doing, then we are probably working effectively!

If equipment gets broken or wears out, we make decisions to replace it (always assuming the Treasurer has the money). We arranged the upgrade of the lighting, whose versatility was shown to great effect in the Passover meal on Maundy Thursday, and managed to secure a grant for some of the cost. We try to innovate, inviting people to Highlands for special events, especially families, young people and community groups.

Once again we ran a Nativity Trail to stir up interest in our celebration of Advent and Christmas 2018. And thanks to some heroic steeplejacking by Andrew Saville and Frank Edmonds, supported by me, we revived the custom of having a lit exterior Christmas tree, twinkling every night and clearly visible from the London Road.

We make small changes to our worship and try to ensure everyone can have a say. We've agreed to the Circuit using Highlands as a base, and arranged for the Church Office a quick clean and tidy in order to welcome them.

We have continued to support the excellent work of Julie Peek, the Mission Enabler to Older People. Julie's report appears separately, and I commend it to you.

As always we welcome volunteers to become members of the steward team. A nomination form is included as the last page of this issue, so that you can clip, complete and submit it.

Treasurer's Report

Our income derives from offertories, lettings, donations, fund raising and any associated Gift Aid. From this we have to pay utility bills, insurance, property maintenance /improvements and equipment etc. In addition we have to pay a Circuit Assessment. This currently is £23,441 per annum.

The Church financial year runs from the 1 September until the 31 August. Accounts are independently audited & submitted to the Circuit.

In the last Financial year (y/e 31/08/18) our expenditure exceeded receipts by £3,556. The main project expenditure was £5,316 on re-surfacing the Car Park.

However, we remain solvent albeit delicately balanced.

So far this year our main project expenditure has been the installation of much needed, improved Sanctuary lighting at a cost of £12,846. This was funded by very generous donations, a grant from the Garfield Weston Foundation and existing Church funds. Many thanks to those involved in the fund raising and to those who donated.

Donations have been thoughtfully made and gratefully received from Barry Tipping in memory of Kay, and from Betty Hall in memory of Arthur. This will enable us to improve the catering facilities within the Sanctuary and assist in the provision of improved 'projection' facilities.

We continue to support various charities on a regular basis- Action for Children, Christian Aid, Mission in Britain, World Mission, and others as and when the Spirit calls.

Lettings remain our main source of income accounting for over 50%.

Grateful thanks, as always, go to Les Davis and Anne Lane for managing the lettings, Patrick Smith for drafting Gift Aid applications and Jackie Williams and Sylvia Cornwell for banking.

I have still the additional role to encourage and support the spread of the new Memory Worship ministry that started at Wesley in 2016.

My first priority was to shadow the busy existing range of activities for older people at Highlands, to establish new events that complemented Highlands' life and try to improve church/ community links.

Memory Worship

This new ministry that started life at Wesley continues to grow. On Monday 21 January 2019 Wesley Memory Worship celebrated its 2nd Birthday and "Lord of all hopefulness" seemed a perfect theme for the day. Sixty people gathered to share worship together with dancing, singing, storytelling and yummy Birthday cake.

It was our vision when we set up this new ministry two years ago to find a way that people with or without dementia could join in worship and take comfort that God accepts us all and meets us where we are today. Two years on, and Memory Worship has become a beacon for churches across the country to address the spiritual needs of people (and their carers) living with dementia. Every month, churches contact me wanting to come and learn how they can emulate for their own communities, from Somerset to Hereford and Birmingham to South Woodham Ferrers and many others in between. Last week I learned of a new Memory Worship service that had just started in Bedale Methodist Church in

Yorkshire.

In Essex there is a Memory Worship service at Thorpe Bay Methodist Church on the first Monday of the Month. On the third Monday of the month Memory Worship services are held both at Wesley Methodist Church in Leigh-on-sea and at Holy Trinity Church in South Woodham Ferrers.

If you wish to try Hobbies why not join us on 7th or 21st Feb as a taster. All are welcome.



Pin Point is a spin-off from Hobbies, led by Teresa and assisted by Glenis.


