From the Editor

Sorry but this is not terribly seasonal, but I'll try to shoehorn a festive reference in at the end.

Lesley and I take part whenever we can in the Gospel Vespers Service at the Fishermen's Chapel. Great atmosphere, great music. Great worship. The latest, in November, certainly lived up to this. It included a song made famous (though not written) by Michael Jackson – 'Man in the Middle'. The choir performed it impeccably but some thought that it was an inappropriate choice, due to the accusations against Jackson of child abuse, mostly made since he died 10 years ago.

I have every possible sympathy with victims of this and any other child abuse, but no problem with the song. The lyrics, written in 1987 by Siedah Garrett, have some strong resonances with 2019 themes. This is the chorus:

*I'm starting with the man in the mirror
I'm asking him to change his ways
And no message could have been any clearer
If you want to make the world a better place
Take a look at yourself, and then make a change*

Now, you surely know that an Election is coming this way on 12 December. Some politicians, and some commentators, would have it that B***** is by far the largest issue, or indeed the only issue that matters. I don't agree. I think that there are problems and debates that are more important. Climate change, the mess we're making of our planet, how we pay for and make use of healthcare, human migration (across the whole world), the futures of various nations and continents in crisis, poverty, conflict, injustice – I could go on...

So what can anyone do about these problems? Does anyone care? If you get the knock on the door ('*May I rely on your support?*') or take part in a meeting, ask about these matters. But I doubt that

any of our politicians has a complete answer. Even if they do, they may be reluctant to share. Frank answers are not always comfortable answers.

The truth is that each one of us has to take ownership of (say) climate change, find out what we can do about it, and then do it. If we can just follow the advice of the song and start with 'the man [or woman] in the mirror' we might make some progress. It would be a great Christmas present for the next generation._

now the big question becomes, 'How do I make sure this doesn't just end up as a one off?' The answer is quite simple really; running has to become part of a routine fitting comfortably into the pattern of my life.


Paul tells us that:


'Advent is a season of expectant waiting and preparation for both the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus and his return at the end of time.'





Florentines: a Very Sweet Christmas present

This recipe is a winner three ways:

- These little biscuits are utterly irresistible – don't start because you won't finish until they're gone
- They make a very special and personal gift for someone, especially if you invest in some

presentation bags (in Lakeland 50 for £3.99, or elsewhere). It's the effort, not only the thought, that counts.

- They are quick, easy and almost completely idiot-proof to make at home. I know because I am that idiot.



- 50g butter
- 50g demerara sugar
- 50g golden syrup
- 50g plain flour
- 25g dried cranberries or glacé cherries
- 50g candied peel
- 25g almonds, finely chopped
- 25g walnuts, finely chopped
- 200g chocolate

1. Preheat oven to 180C, 350F, gas 4. Line 3 baking trays with parchment or silicon sheets
2. Put the butter, sugar and syrup into a small pan and gently heat until the butter is melted
3. Remove the pan from the heat and add the flour, then all the fruit and nuts. Stir well.
4. Use a teaspoon to put the mixture on the 3 trays in small amounts. You should get about 18 – 20 from the mixture. Space them well apart as they will spread out.
5. Bake for about 7-8 minutes until just golden brown – don't overcook. Cool on the tray and then place onto a rack.
6. Melt the chocolate and spread it over the flat base of each Florentine. Just before the chocolate has set, use a fork to make a zig-zag pattern.

I'm sorry to say I have no idea how long they keep for. They always disappear too quickly to find out.

He is a Rastafarian, an Abrahamic monotheistic faith whose beliefs rely on a specific interpretation of the Bible.
