From Your Minister



Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent comes from the Anglo-Saxon word 'lencten', which means "spring." The forty days represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan and preparing to begin His ministry.

Traditionally, Lent has been all about giving things up, and over the years people have given up all sorts of things like chocolate, sweets, desserts, and even more recently Facebook and other social media activities!

I think giving things up can be helpful if it focuses our thoughts and prayers on our preparation for the arrival of Easter.

But I don't believe that Lent should be a time for just giving things up, but also for taking things up!

Sometimes, I think when we really look at our lives and the time we spend with our Lord, we can often come to the conclusion that we've fasted all year since the last Lenten season, or even longer; fasting our prayer life, fasting our daily devotional time, fasting our giving?

So, my prayer for all of us, myself included, is that this Lenten

season we would take some things up, and really prepare ourselves for the death and resurrection of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

And as we grow in our knowledge and personal relationship with Him, Easter will be a far greater experience for us as we commune and bring ourselves into His presence in this time of preparation and confession. Scripture tells us;

Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.'

My Auntie Mavis, the last surviving child of Harry and Dorothy Simmonds, died in early January. For many years she had lived with her good friend and companion, Edith Bamber, in North Weald. Our family worshipped at Highlands from the late 1940s through into the 1980s and I thought that some Highlanders would still remember us. Mavis's brothers were Alan, Eric and Keith, with Jean her sister.

For some years, Mavis had been attending Holy Innocents Church, High Beach, and her funeral was held there in the middle of Epping Forest on a cold but sunny day.

Over recent years, I kept in touch with Stella and Keith Carter and tried without success to contact them after Mavis's death. I then looked at *The Highlander* online and learnt with sadness



that they had died late last year. My parents regularly played badminton and tennis with them and I can well remember playing Subbuteo on the floor with 'Uncle' Keith!

It was good to see that there are still people that I remember, for example, Rosalie Bryant. A couple of months ago, I was giving a talk at Castle Hedingham for the National Trust about the Coast of Essex. I included a picture taken of a 'seafront bus' outside the former Church, later the Church Hall. I remarked that my parents had been married there and was amazed when a couple in the audience shouted back "So were we!". They were Hilary Field and her husband Andrew (Peronne?). We had a good chat after my talk!

From the Editor

As I write this, the TV news is dominated by buildings, streets and whole towns in Turkey and Syria that have been devastated. Where once were blocks of flats, homes to dozens of people, there are now piles of rubble. I cannot imagine how it feels to have your home, and everything in



it, completely smashed in a matter of seconds. Far worse than that, thousands have lost friends and family in sudden disaster. Many now must put aside mourning in order to take care of the living, and the survivors must feel that God has forsaken them.

Meanwhile in Ukraine, more homes have been smashed, thousands of lives lost, families shattered on both sides of the conflict. This is clearly a result of human folly and wickedness.

Human blame can also be levelled in Turkey and Syria. Fewer lives – many fewer – would have been lost in Turkey if buildings had been constructed in accordance with regulations published in 2001, following a disastrous earthquake in Izmit in 1999. In Syria, an existing conflict has hampered the rescue attempt, costing lives that could have been saved. This seems to point to a world where there is no respite from a careless God.

As flies to wanton boys are we to the gods. They kill us for their sport

[King Lear: W Shakespeare]

However, that's not the full story. God has provided a perfect habitat for all. Where there are natural disasters, He has given us ways, if only we take them, of mitigating harm. If the harm is only financial, then we might look to insurance.

Insurance has a particular resonance for Leigh on Sea. Many local people have made careers in insurance, principally because

London EC3 (close to Fenchurch St station) is the world centre of the insurance industry. However, insurance doesn't work with war damage, which most policies exclude.

What we need is insurance that is 100% reliable, with no loopholes. So let me recommend Jesus Christ - the ultimate insurance. Be assured that JC

- will never go into liquidation
- will never refuse a claim
- always pays out
- covers every risk
- is backed by an underwriter whose assets are beyond price.

If in doubt, refer to your policy. JC has a very detailed policy document called *The Bible*. Not only does this document spell out the insurance benefits that are available, it also contains wise advice for every disaster. To sum up the level of cover that is available:

If you believe, you will receive whatever you ask for in prayer.
[Matthew 21:22 NIV]

At the moment we pray for comfort and relief for the people of Turkey, Syria and Ukraine, and the strength to recover. The rebuilding will take decades. We must also pray that lessons will be learned, so that the scale of these disasters is never repeated.

Dining In – Mushroom Curry

I've had some very good feedback for previous vegetarian recipes so here is another. By the way I should have mentioned that last month's recipe serves 4.

Once again it uses mushrooms as its main ingredient. I'm a big fan of mushrooms, mainly because they are very much veggie, but they don't make a big fuss about it, like some ingredients do. There are many different safely edible varieties you can buy, including the rare and expensive laetiporus, AKA 'chicken of the woods' because it really does taste like chicken. This recipe works with basic mushrooms.

Ingredients

(serves 2)

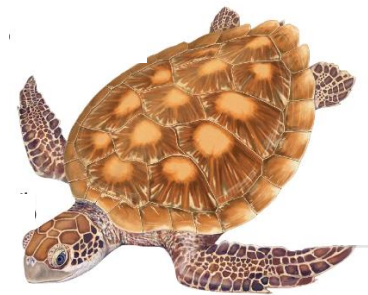
80g unsalted butter	¼ tsp ground turmeric
500g chestnut mushrooms	½ tsp Kashmir chilli powder
5 tbsp sunflower oil	½ tsp garam masala
1 tsp cumin seeds	400g tinned tomatoes
1 tsp fennel seeds	1 tsp caster sugar
1 lge onion, chopped	2 tbsp full fat Greek yogurt
4 garlic cloves, chopped	2 tbsp chopped coriander
1 tsp ground ginger	Rice or naan bread to serve

Method

- Heat butter and fry mushrooms in pan or wok for 10 mins
- Set mushrooms aside and fry cumin and fennel in oil in same pan, stirring, about 30 secs
- Add the onion and fry 12-15 mins, then add garlic for a further min
- Add the ginger, turmeric, chilli powder and garam masala, then tomatoes and sugar; cook for 5-7 minutes uncovered until the masala thickens
- Put yogurt in small bowl then add 2 tbsps of the hot masala; mix well then add back into the pan
- Add 100ml of hot water and cook until it has texture of double cream
- Return the mushrooms to the pan to warm through and then serve, garnished with the coriander, with rice or naan

Puzzle of the Month Solution

Not too hard to solve. The detail that is only there to confuse.

Here is an algebraic solution.

Others are available.

First let's summarise the information, using the abbreviations C for Crime, R for Romance and N for Non-fiction.

We know that:

- Three times as many C as R: $C=3R$
- Twice as many N as R: $N=2R$
- Total is 150: $C+R+N=150$

Now let's rewrite the last equation according to the first two:

- $3R+R+2R=150$

Hence: $6R=150 \Rightarrow R=25$

So the answer is:

- Crime – top shelf – 75 books
- Romance – middle shelf – 25 books
- Non-fiction – bottom shelf – 50 books

I really must try to return some of these to the library.
