

We look forward to seeing lots of Dads, Grandads and boys and girls, aged up to 7, on the first Saturday of each month during 2019.


Junior Badminton

Poppy Project



In November we saw the culmination of our poppy project with a wonderful 'weeping cross' installation. Community, church and school based groups had worked amazingly hard

creating clay poppies that were then gathered and curated into the artwork. We gathered 350 poppies in total and created a 4 metre waterfall of red poppies.

With wonderful booklets about soldiers who had lived in Formby contributed by Formby High, poetry and artwork donated by St Luke's Primary school and a variety



of war memorabilia lent to us, we created a whole interactive experience that we were pleased to welcome over 250 people into.

It was wonderful to see a wide range of the community engaging with the project. All ages from little toddlers to those wise in years came to visit the installation and we were struck time and again by how inspiring and emotive people found the poppies. During the week we heard stories of family members who had been involved in the armed forces, stories from those who had served their countries and talked about the impact of war and our role in being peacemakers.

The whole event was wonderful and thanks to everyone who made it possible.

The Guides also completed their 'Passion for Fashion' Go For It. All activities were based around fashion and clothing and were enjoyed by all.


Some Guides have gained their Annual Challenge badges.


Angel Trail

finger puppet, treasure box and stable scene to make in woodwork. The origami star which went with the stable was described as being 'easy' to make in the You Tube demo video - those of us who


did it don't believe them - but the models looked good when finished.
