Also, this year, we will have a games and crafts room with all sorts of activities. There's also a quiz for the adults (which you might need to help them answer).



We look forward to welcoming new and existing members when we re-start in September.



The story we heard was about Naaman, who had got very wet himself.


Naaman was a very important man in the army. He was in charge of a lot of men. He was also very

Our challenge was bandaging up a family member with toilet roll. The families were really good at this and some even managed to do it without tearing the toilet roll!


Then there were water games: knocking balls off cones with water pistols, throwing water bombs without breaking them and catching fish to name but a few.

An enjoyable lunch of sandwiches, fruit and cake then finished off the morning's activities.


Our next Footsteps is on Saturday 28th September, 3:30-6pm. Everyone is welcome to come,



A week later we followed clues to find out more about the church and hall where we hold our meetings.


We had some fun outings too. We went to the pool park where we played games and then had some healthy fruit and drinks.

All in all a very busy and exciting last half term with lots more exciting things planned for the new term in September.




Illumin8
