




#### Joint session with the Film Club





# NEWS FROM SAPPERTON AND FRAMPTON MANSELL



#### NOTES FROM CULKERTON

#### GARDENING TIPS FOR OCTOBER

Autumn has been creeping in prior to the official meteorological start of autumn this year, which runs from 1 September to 30 November. The astronomical autumn starts with autumnal equinox, this year 22 September. However, in practical terms, the first frost marks autumn, it is the end of summer tender flowers and vegetables, many performing well until their cold end. This year 11 October marked the beginning of autumn.

Deciduous shrubs and trees have been gently shedding leaves, these are cleanly swept from paths, allowed to stay where these fall in borders and mown up with grass for compost making.

At last, the vigorous weeds of 2024 can be really cleared. This year's growing weather and extra CO2 in the air suited cooler growing plants very well. Established shrubs and trees are growing vigorously taller than usual.

Plans are to change the planting in one main central area to a mixed shrub, herbaceous and bulbs for 2025. The paper plans are in preparation for the update and specimen plants are noted for moving. A selection of bare root roses need ordering. Included in the design will be some additional hardy fuchsias which have more than proved their worth and they remind of my Mum.

Roses need a tidy up prune in the autumn. The long new stems on ramblers and climbing roses need training with old stems removed. Bush roses need a light tidy up of removing about a third of the top. In early spring modern hybrid teas are best cut low so new stems shoot up from the base.

As ground is cleared, home-made compost can be added to protect beneficial soil microbiology or in larger areas for vegetables a hardy green manure can be sown. Look for winter hardy mixes.

Another use for cleared ground is as a nursery or holding bed for temporarily displaced plants ready to be relocated into a new place.

There is still plenty of time for tulips to be planted either deeply at 15cm or in containers, these do much better when the weather is cooler. Other spring bulbs can be planted too.

If wet weather prevails, tidy up the garden shed or greenhouse, clean and maintain garden tools, get the mower serviced before the spring

rush. Sort out plastic pots to keep, or recycle; locally Dobbies Garden Centre offer this service with a big container near the entrance.

November is traditionally the month to sow broad beans; this seems best if you have a sheltered plot or if sowing for an early crop under glass. The hardy beans are really affected by strong winter wind, the shorter growing 'The Sutton' fares better than much taller varieties.

With colder weather lovely winter flowers appear, shrubby winter flowering honeysuckle, Lonicera x fragrans, winter jasmine, Jasminum nudiflorum and the wonderfully perfumed winter box, Sarcococca confusa. Look out for other beautiful winter flowering or berried plants and bulbs to suit your plot or style and establish where they are visible

#### **BIBLICAL RAINFALL...**

In recent decades, September has been our most reliably fair month – the month in which to hold weddings. Not this year: my humble garden rain gauge recorded a staggering 219mm (8.6"), and the Met Office informed us that ten English counties experienced their wettest September on record, including (of course) Gloucestershire; with Bedfordshire and Oxfordshire recording their wettest calendar month ever, in a series dating back to 1836.

Seven English counties recorded three times their average September rainfall, headed (of course) by Gloucestershire, with an official 212mm. Southern England overall had its wettest September since 1918, and its third wettest on record in a series from 1836. Ironically, Scotland and Northern Ireland had a decidedly dry month.

It all kicked off after a classic week of fine September weather midmonth. Indeed, I recorded 154mm of rain during September's last 12 days, including a preposterous 50mm in just over six hours on the 27<sup>th</sup>. This episode began with a thundery breakdown on the 20<sup>th</sup>, when the Storm of Mordor (from the *Lord of the Rings*) raged in from the south-east. I just managed to get home from Bournemouth Airport (a lovely, friendly little airport) with thunderstorms raging behind me, blackening out Salisbury Plain. Swindon and then Cheltenham got deluged, but it ignored our patch.

We got clobbered on Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> October, when many of our local roads turned into raging upland rivers, puddles in road hollows became traffic-stopping ponds, and the Thames Head bridge dip got closed for 24 hours. The term everyone used for this stair-rod rainfall

was 'Biblical'. Sorry, but this is not something out of the Old Testament, it's now and it's real; the concern is that it's climate change morphing into climate breakdown. I for one am scared, and am not looking forward to winter.

Spare a thought, though, for Rodmarton Farms, which has been trying to harvest potatoes in all this...
