ALIVE + WELL

Saturday 18th January at Georgetown

Please do join us at 9am on the 18th of January at Georgetown Methodist Church, to take part in our

Mission Event 'Alive & Well'. Within this event we will start by marking this point in our journey, reviewing and summarising what we have learned over this time of discernment, before moving forwards and into the next, more proactive phase of future planning!

We are very blessed that both Katy and James are joining us from the Learning Network and will be leading the day. James has kindly sent an introduction to the work we will be looking at on the day, which we would recommend reading through if you are going to attend:

Growth Planning Reflection Cycle

The growth planning cycle offers a simple structure for listening deeply, dreaming about the change you long to see in the world, choosing a couple of areas to focus on, then taking action. The aim is at the General Church Meeting or Church Council (whichever fits your context best) you review what you've done over the past year, listen again, and go round the cycle once more.



Timetable:

Arrivals & Coffee - 9am

Opening devotions - 9.15am Closing devotions - 1pm

The growth planning cycle invites churches to do what they can, not what they can't. A good idea might be to choose two stations from the Methodist Way of Life as a focus: one strength and one stretch. Many Methodist churches report that the evangelism practices – share, live

and tell – are the ones they struggle with the most, so we highly recommend that you choose one of these stations as the way you will stretch yourselves. (You can learn more about the Methodist Way of Life at: www.methodist.org.uk/mwol)

Once you have chosen your two areas of focus for the year, think about how you will create easy entry points for unaffiliated people. For example, you may choose to focus on the 'pray' station from the Methodist Way of Life, and commit to praying more often, more deeply and more creatively. That's great – but how are you inviting unaffiliated people to pray too? Studies have shown that a large proportion of people pray – far larger than the number who would call themselves Christians. As well as meeting as a church to pray, you might plan some community events that include prayer, create a prayer garden that's open to everyone, or simply contact all the groups that use your building a couple of times a year to ask what they would like you to pray for.

Remember Every Voice Matters; Church growth is so much more than more people worshiping on a Sunday and we have so much to give in this circuit. As such everyone is welcome and we would like to see as many people as possible to give their thoughts and opinions on how we can move forward!



MBE AWARDED TO RUTH SMITH

We were pleased to hear that Ruth Smith, a member of our St Aubin family has been awarded an MBE for services to communities in both Jersey and Kenya.

Ruth has taught in Jersey for over 50 years, having come to the island at the age of 23, however, it was through a gap year, taken in 2014, that Ruth

found herself splitting her teaching abilities between Jersey and Kenya. Having spent time in a school in Malindi, Ruth saw how many younger children were not in school and was inspired in setting up her very own self-funded school.

The school opened in January 2015, and has now been running for 10 years, growing in size from only 5 students at the beginning to over 300 students today. Student numbers are not the only growth seen at the school, however, with Ruth noticing that many students would come to school hungry and/or without lunch. This prompted Ruth to set up a porridge and lunch fund as part of the School's offerings, meaning every child would have breakfast and lunch at school if they could not bring their own.

Ruth's accomplishments do not stop there, with her also:

- Setting up a Registered Jersey Charity in 2020, named 'The Friends of Malindi Bright Future Academy', which continues to support the school
- Writing Children's books with funds also supporting the Malindi school
- Running the Jersey Dyslexia Association for many years
- Setting up and leading a Trinity Youth Club




CHRISTMAS CELEBRATIONS FROM AROUND THE CIRCUIT
