

During the Service that Pam Bryan, our Moderator, conducted recently, she quoted from and recommended a book on prayer:

"Dirty Glory" by Pete Grieg



With a foreword from Bear Grylls "A Powerful, personal and honest story about life's most important adventure.. from the heart and hand of a prayer warrior whom I love and admire."

Pam quoted: "Satan's not particularly interested in sin. His primary objective has never been to tempt you into violating a particular set of rules. His number one aim is simply to divert your attention away from Jesus. He'll use sin to do it, for sure, but he's equally able to use busy-ness, or shame, or pain, or religion, or Candy Crush Saga, or an obsessive relationship, or a golf handicap, or a pay rise, or an illness to distract you from the Lord. Satan hates the fact that when we fix our eyes on Jesus, broken relationships get fixed, and when we love Him all our lives, then death itself can lose its sting."

The book is full of inspirational stories, and "easy" to read. Why not put it on your Christmas list!

Shoebox challenge: Give a gift to a homeless young person in Leicester.

The Y centre provides a safe place to call home for 118 young people, but they need help with 'basics'. A shoe box filled with some of the basic necessities (which we take for granted) can make all the difference to someone moving into this accommodation with nothing.

Recommended items: shampoo/conditioner; shower gel; deodorant, razors, face flannel, toothpaste, brush, mouthwash, teabags, coffee, sugar, pen and pad, cup, bowl, plate, cutlery, socks. You could also include a message of encouragement and something of your own faith.

The Gateway Club, for adults with learning difficulties, has met in our Church on Wednesday evenings for about 30 years.

The evenings vary, with club nights when they can play pool or darts, jigsaws, colouring, play some music, and enjoy being together.

Sometimes there is a disco, or some ladies come in to run a craft evening, a skittle and meal night at the Black Horse from time to time is a popular event, and the annual outing to Skegness is always fun.



A highlight is the sponsored walk (for some walking is a great challenge) and this year they raised $\pounds 1,200$ – some of which went to charity and some for an evening at the theatre to watch a Pantomime.



Once a month, usually the 2nd Wednesday, Stan and Dorothy go in to hold a Worship Service. The worship is lively and the prayer-times meaningful and moving. At Christmas each year the Gateway Club present their Carol Service and Nativity Play. Most of the members take part in the play, and if you haven't yet come along to one of these special evenings, try it this year, and you will surely

Christmas Fayre.....

Here are a couple of recipes you might like to try for your special meals over the Christmas period:

For a delicious starter: <u>Leicester Fish Pate</u> (Serves 4. – preparation time 25 mins.)

198g (7oz) can tuna, drained.
200g (7oz) Red Leicester cheese, grated.
10ml (2 tsp) lemon juice.
150g (5oz) Natural yogurt.
30ml (2tbsp) chopped parsley
Freshly ground pepper, parsley to garnish, 1 lemon.
Toast, crispbreads or French bread to serve.



Place tuna in a bowl and mash with a fork. Add cheese & lemon juice and mash together. Add yogurt, chopped parsley and season to taste. Mix well. Spoon mixture into 4 ramekin dishes and chill.

Garnish with parsley, a slice of lemon, and serve with toast, crispbread or French bread.

A quick and easy dessert to delight your guests: <u>Toffee-topped peaches.</u> (Serves 6 – preparation time 10 minutes, cooking time 5 mins.)


1 x 411g (14 oz) can of peach halves. 300ml (1/2 pint) double dairy cream. 175g (6oz) demerara sugar.

Drain peaches and lay in the bottom of an ovenproof dish, reserving one for decoration.

Lightly whip cream and spread over peaches. Chill.

Just before serving, sprinkle sugar over and grill until sugar melts.

Cut remaining peach half in slices, place slices on top of sugar in a star pattern and serve immediately.
