Letter from our Moderator...

Every year, Christmas commercialism starts earlier - it used to be confined to December, but High Street shops and supermarkets begin displaying festive goods in early autumn. It would be easy to become blasé about the whole season but please don't.

Remember what Christmas is really all about: remember the love and grace of a forgiving God who sent us a rescuer in the person of His Son, Jesus.

Imagine what it would be like to hear that, and to celebrate Christmas, for the first time! Nava is an isolated new believer from Iran. Last year was the first time she and her family celebrated Christmas. "It was just me, my mother and my little brother sitting at the dinner table, like we do each night. But this night, somehow automatically, I put down a fourth plate: for Jesus. It felt like Jesus was really present."

The family was too poor to have any gifts but they received spiritual ones, answers to prayer. "My mother was freed from anger issues. My brother, who used to see ghosts in his bedroom, got freed from them when he called on Jesus' name that night, and I was set free from a bad relationship with a married man."

Her wish for this Christmas is that it will be as special as her first: "It's not about physical presents, it's really about spending a special time with Jesus and my family."

The Christmas story is all about Jesus's presence with us: Immanuel, God with us. It would be a pity to lose the richness of that truth amidst all the commercialism, so take some time out of all the 'busyness', and set a place for Jesus in your home and heart this year.



Update from Lois and Joe Ovenden BMS Partners October 2019

My name is Innocent and they wanted me to die.

At the hospital they called me a "waste of oxygen" and chased my mum away. I had been into the ICU 19 times. I am Innocent. I have Down Syndrome. I am a God Plan. My mum tells me I am a God Plan.

I am Innocent and my father disowned me. Told my mum to "throw" me. To abandon me, in Gulu in Uganda, where we live. I am Innocent, I get infections easily, I took a long time to walk, a longer time to eat or drink than other children. I am different.

My grandma said that I look different, called me abnormal. Asked my mum to throw me. Her family disowned me. I like to dance. I am five years old. I am Innocent. I am Innocent and while I did not, could not, write these words, I'm important too.

Lois, a BMS speech therapist, started a group in September 2017 when she realised that many of the mothers she was meeting had not understood (or even received) a diagnosis of Down Syndrome for their children. They felt isolated and confused and so Lois brought them together to talk, share wisdom and dispel myths. Many felt amazing relief at knowing they were not alone.

There are many other children like Innocent, who are beautiful and friendly and joyful and kind, and who have been rejected by family and neighbours and society. Whose parents have suffered depression and financial hardship because people around them have not understood what Down Syndrome is.



"I've done a lot of the diagnosis," says Lois Ovenden, a BMS World Mission worker based in Gulu. "People notice that there is something not typical, but they won't know what it is. And sometimes doctors won't give the diagnosis, even if they know it." You can understand why. In Uganda, as in many countries, there is a stigma attached to disability, and reactions range from fear and disdain to blame. And there are practical problems too. Care is time-consuming and expensive.





NEWS FROM INDIA

Our friends in Calvary Baptist Church have asked us to pray for Christians in their state – in a recent email Yesupadam wrote

My dear Brother and Sister Sorry to inform You, In Kakinada India some people very badly damaged te City's Baptist Church and Cross tower. We have organised a rally calling for the justice and protection for the Churches and Christians.

Kakinada is a city a few miles North of Akividu. These attacks on Churches and Christians are almost certainly carried out by Hindu extremist with the tacit approval of the government.



The government is reported to be requiring every staff member of Indian charities that receive donations from outside India to sign an affidavit that they will not be involved in any act of religious conversion. Christian leaders in India feel that this is aimed at Christian ministries serving the poor and marginalised.

When apostles Peter and James were commanded by the rulers of their country "not to speak or teach at all in the name of Jesus", they replied "Judge for yourselves whether it is right in God's sight to listen to you rather than God. For we cannot stop speaking about what we have seen and heard" [Acts 4:18-20]

Please pray that the Holy Spirit will give wisdom and words to each Indian worker faced with this situation, and particularly the family in Akividu who do such great work amongst the poor people in their area with the help of the Sigma Project – our charity that supports their work through Calvary Baptist Church.
