I'm sure we're all fed up with the news lately, I am for sure, so rather than bad news let's remind ourselves of the good news. As what may be a different Christmas to usual approaches, it's time to remember the most important 'Good news' story of all time.

Behold, I give to you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people (Luke 2:10). The virgin will conceive and shall bring forth a son, and they shall call His name Immanuel (God with us) Isa 7:14) For to us a Child is born, to us a Son is given (Isa 9:6). for God so loved the world that He gave His onlybegotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life (Joh 3:16).

(Php 4:7) So this Christmas as we celebrate Jesus' birth, rest assured in God 's love and faithfulness, remembering not only Jesus as the baby in the manger, but also as the risen Lord whose Spirit dwells with all those who love Him. So wherever your Christmas is this year, let us take time to thank God for the presence, peace and joy of the risen Lord with you, in all that you do. Now that really is Good news.

SIGMA UPDATE

We are very grateful to all those regular donors to Sigma and those who have responded to the desperate need in the Akividu area in India where Calvary Baptist Church is working. [we also recently received almost £1300 from Gift Aid] This has enabled us to maintain support for the project at this time of crisis. The Church's response has been recognised with great thanks by the local community – even the regional TV recognised their relief work recently.

Covid19 had a devastating effect with many areas being closed off with resulting lack of basics. The Church were sometimes having to hand out supplies through security fences. With so many people living in poverty and in very basic accommodation – some just in grass huts and with limited sanitation and water access the virus ran wild.





Then further tragedy struck when a cyclone hit their area bringing terrible flooding — Rev. Yesupadam wrote:-

Very sad news: a big river (Upputeru) overflowed, because the river wall was damaged. Now 45 surrounding villages fully in the water, people hopeless. no way village to

village all roads are fully water. It is a major disaster. Kindly pray. Please pray

for flood victims. These are all villages you have visited.

Undeterred the Church continue to distribute food and other supplies to folk who have again lost everything.





Just the other day Rev. Yesupadam wrote Brother, Praise the Lord. We visited the most dangerous flood areas. God saved us with His powerful hands. You and my Sister Dorothy fully knew our area's poor people's living conditions. We are thankful to you, your Family and all the Church Families and who are supporting the SIGMA

project. Many needs for the Ministry activities. Please continue to pray.

Wash your hands – we all have the message in these days of virus, and we have the facilities, here are some facts from homes in England from the 15th century and earlier, that may make you smile.....





June was a very popular time of the year to get married, not because of the sunshine or blossom, but more because people took their annual bath in May and so they still smelt quite sweet by June... but just in case, the bride carried a bunch of flowers or herbs to hide any body odour on her big day.

Hence the custom today of the bride carrying a bouquet.

Baths consisted of a big tub filled with hot water in which the man of the house had the privilege of the nice clean water, then all the other sons and men, followed by women and children and last of all were the babies. By this time the water was so filthy that you could actually have lost someone in it.



Hence the saying - Don't throw the baby out with the bath water.



Houses had thatched roofs with thick straw piled high and no wood underneath for support. It was the only place for smaller animals to keep warm so dogs, cats, mice, bugs etc. took refuge there. However, when it rained, it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall out of the roof.

Hence the saying – Raining cats and dogs.

When these accidents happened, there was nothing to prevent rubbish from falling into the house, which posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings could mess up the sheets. This led to a bed with posts at each corner and a sheet over the top to catch any such creatures.

Thus – four poster beds came into being.

Made in Mozambique: Behind the masks.

For Gloria, the Capaz sewing school was everything. It gave her a way to provide for her five-year-old son who can't walk. It gave her friends — a family really — who could support her and who she could share fellowship with. It gave her a chance to learn vital skills, the chance to dream of a future, the chance to create things herself, when so few clothes carry the label "Made in Mozambique". It gave her hope when so much was against her.

And then Coronavirus happened – and it took so much away.

Within days of the first cases of Covid-19 the entire country was locked down and you could be fined for not wearing a mask. Capaz sewing school was shut down together with many businesses.

All seemed hopeless, then, amazingly, they were given the opportunity to fight back.

BMS Missionary, Susanna Barrell, who trains the women at the school, was asked by Maputo Central Hospital if her school could make much needed masks.

They were happy to have this work. The sewing machines were distributed between women so they could work from their own homes.



It was a big ask to provide 30,000 masks – how could it be done! Then a wonderful thing happened. Other women from different groups involved in the sewing school joined in; women from the local Baptist church, women with tragic backgrounds in prostitution, women from all walks of life coming together to achieve an incredible feat. In the face of a virus that threatened to disrupt and divide, these amazing women were able to stand together and fight back – even if they were apart. An amazing 31,550 masks were provided to the hospital.

CHRISTMAS CARDS FOR PERSECUTED CHRISTIANS

For a number of years now we have had the opportunity to send Christmas cards to persecuted Christians in some of the most oppressive countries in the world. We have used the 'Connect & Encourage' initiative from CSW [Christian Solidarity Worldwide.

Here are a few notes about the organisation:

The CSW's team of specialist advocates work in over 20 countries across Africa, Asia, Latin America and the Middle East, to ensure that the right to freedom of religion or belief is upheld and protected.

Their vision is a world free from religious persecution, where everyone can practise a religion or belief of their choice.

The right to freedom of religion or belief is also known as the 'first freedom' given to humanity by God. It's a touchstone human right, often serving as a 'litmus test' for whether other rights are at risk of being abused. It's a right we must protect, defend and restore.

CSW seeks to challenge and change the laws, behaviours and policies which lead to abuses of the right to freedom of religion and belief. They have over three decades of experience advocating for freedom of religion or belief around the world

Sending a card to a prisoner or persecuted person is not only a great encouragement to them – knowing they are not forgotten by their brothers and sisters in Christ. It is also a reminder to their persecutors that the world is watching and caring."


- 100,000 bags of sprouts.

O Little Town of Bethlehem

Phillips Brooks, the composer of this famous Christmas carol "O little town of Bethlehem", was the minister of Holy Trinity Church in Philadelphia and had visited Bethlehem in December of 1865. He asked the church organist, Lewis Redner, to compose a simple melody for the children to sing on Christmas Eve. Mr.Redner sat down at the piano to find just the right tune to carry the descriptive words.

But nothing he wrote seemed to fit. On the night before the Christmas Eve service he felt defeated, so he went to bed. During his fretful sleep it seemed that he heard music. Immediately, he got up and wrote down the melody just as we sing it today. When he joyfully presented it to Rev. Brooks he said: "I think it was a gift from heaven." The children sounded like a choir of angels as they sang the new carol written just for them. "O Little of Bethlehem" quickly became a favourite after it was published in 1874. We are blessed to continue singing it over one hundred years later.

Within the beauty of "O Little Town of Bethlehem" is one of God's promises from the prophet Micah: "Bethlehem Ephrathah, you are one of the little towns of Judah, but from you I will bring a ruler for Israel, whose family line goes back to ancient times." (Micah 5:2, GNB).

The last verse is a <u>prayer</u>. In fact, it is such an awesome Christmas prayer that we sing it with evangelistic fervour:

"O Holy Child of Bethlehem,
Descend to us, we pray.
Cast out our sin, and enter in,
Be born in us today.
We hear the Christmas angels,
The great glad tidings tell.
Oh come to us, abide with us,
Our Lord Emmanuel!"
