Reflection

Today as I write this reflection, I am taken by the way nature has makenedqover the past few weeks. From the cold starkness of winter, the weeks leading to and just beyond Easter have heralded the re-awakening of nature with its dazzling springtime flowers, vibrant hedgerows and blossoming trees. Birds have burst into activity ready for the mating season and those of us prepared to leave our bedroom windows slightly open or take a very early morning walk, may have felt blessed to hear the enchanting complexity of the dawn chorus.

It is perhaps at such times that we feel closest to nature. Our reflections over Easter may also have drawn us to contemplate the state of world events and even our place in the world and within creation as a whole.

Old Testament scripture teaches us that when God looked at the world He had created He saw <u></u><u></u><u></u><u></u>that it was goodq His plan was that mankind would play a part in this creation, saying:

"I have placed my rainbow in the clouds. It is the sign of my covenant with you and with all the earth" Genesis 9.13.

Throughout the Old Testament we read how the natural world was celebrated as a true and wonderful gift from God.

"Let the heavens be glad, and let the earth rejoice; let the sea roar, and all that fills it; let the field exult, and everything in it. Then shall all the trees of the forest sing for joy. Psalms 96.11-12

What happened to change this? Was there a particular time when mankind began to lose its awe of the natural world and appreciation of its intrinsic value? Some would point to the Industrial Revolution or the broader philosophical aspects of the Enlightenment period in the eighteenth century. Whatever the reason, there came a turning point when the worlds sense of wonder diminished, and the natural world took on the role of a commodity or a resource that might be freely exploited.

Whatever started the process of change, perhaps we all now have to accept the reality that the materialistic culture in which we live makes it, virtually impossible for any of us to live without impacting negatively on the natural world in some way or other.

Jesus built on the Old Testament understanding of the natural world. He could calm a storm with a word, make people¢ bodies well with a touch, he could walk on water at will, and was adept at multiplying food when the need arose.

He also constantly referred to the natural world in his teaching. He talked about animals and birds in his parables and rebuked the crowds telling them that no clothing, however splendid, could make any of them more beautiful than <u>the tillies</u> in the fieldsq

As we look at the world around us, we can see how creation has been designed to give us what we need to thrive in an environment which teems with life and beauty. We are not, however, the masters of the arrangement . but as servants within it. As we read in a Psalm of David:

"The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world, and those who dwell therein." Psalm 24.1

May we never take our world for granted and try always to do treat it with the reverence and care it deserves.

Whatever the time of year and wherever we find ourselves, we are called to remain in awe of Godos creation on which we rely so completely.

May we do as God calls us to love Him, to love one another and to cherish the living world . in all its beauty, its glory and its magnificence.
