Dear Friends,

As we have begun to tackle the jungle that is the rectory garden, after having received little love for the past couple of years - it is fascinating at what is unearthed. The massive hedge to the front of the property, once we had given it a good trim, revealed a solitary iris plant (we think), trying to grow underneath it. I love that so many of the parables and teachings of Jesus reflect the natural world. The reading I chose for my installation speaks about God being like a Gardener, who prunes us, so that we can be more fruitful. And much like the pruning of the hedge made way for



the Iris to flourish - sometimes when bits are pruned away from us, when we refocus our attention, it can allow other things to flourish, not just in ourselves, but in other people also.

And speaking of things which grow alongside each other, one of the things which agriculturalists and soil experts are beginning to learn is that modern farming methods of planting monoculture crops, simply are not as sustainable as when things are planted alongside each other. Often when plants are planted together, they help each other to grow, to resist pests and often reduce, or eliminate the need for pesticides altogether. Most notably even Jeremy Clarkson on the TV Series -Clarkson's Farmøon Amazon Prime, (if you have been watching it), has been trying out polyculture crop methods, with varying success, to help -save the soil.ø

For the church, how we do church has often reflected this monoculture way of doing things. This is the legacy of the Roman Empire absorbing Christianity and it is the legacy to which we in part inherit. But when ecosystems are diverse and have different plants and crops growing alongside each other, these can work together to create a far healthier crop. It is the same for church.

Church has for centuries looked very much the same, and yet the culture of the world around us has changed significantly. Where once going to church was the idone thingg, now many will not even darken the doors of the church or have competing priorities on a Sunday morning. And so, the mission of the church is to think - how do we proclaim the gospel afresh to a new generation? To do this we need a diversity, a polyculture crop, (the church of England has called this mixed ecology), in how we worship together, and this means making church more accessible, particularly to those who are younger. It may also mean taking church to where people are, or feel more comfortable being.

Having a more diverse church should not be a threat to how we like to worship and engage with God, after all pruning does not remove the hedge, but having a more diverse form of worship, as in agriculture, will create a far healthier church.

And so, in the coming weeks, months, and years, we will be thinking what it means for us to *go to* people, and to be church with people who are not currently part of our gatherings.


