Restoring Stowe - return of the muses

Whilst we aren't currently working as we normally would at Stowe right now, our programme to restore Stowe continued earlier in the year, with the return of the Nine Muses, part of a project to return a group of statues called Apollo and the Nine Muses. Over the statues' 100 years at Stowe, they have been in several locations in the garden. The third and final location was the Doric Arch in the Elysian Fields and this is where the statues have been returned to. As there was no appropriate set



of Muses to copy, we commissioned Clivedon Conservation Workshop to create a set of Nine Muses based on evidence of the statues at Stowe.



March W.I. Meeting

Well, our speaker for March, William French, certainly was dressed the part. Ex Royal-Navy and butler extraordinaire, he arrived immaculate in full butler uniform with the shiniest shoes I have ever seen.

wounded as a first aider on the Sir Galahad where he assisted in the evacuation of many troops with horrific burns including Simon Weston. For this he was awarded the South Atlantic medal which he justly wore with pride, and attends the remembrance parade each year as a reminder of those who did not return.

His career has taken him worldwide spending 5 years on the Royal Yacht, serving many of our royals and endless dignitaries. We heard many interesting facts regarding Britannia and was surprised to learn that on-board was a double garage but not always used for cars, more often to store barrels of beer.

Serving in Buckingham Palace, he explained the precision in laying a banquet table and this would not take a few hours but actually many days to complete.

After working for Tom Cruise and Nicole Kidman for over 4 years he decided it was time to hang up his tray and white gloves after 40 amazing years of butlering. He is now giving talks far and wide and raising money for the medical detection dogs. Many thanks for a very interesting and informative talk.

And Finally - 18 suggestions for this season of isolation

- 1. Call a few people each day just to say "Hello" and offer a word of encouragement. Be diligent to share words of hope and refrain from talking about negative things—there's enough of that in the news already.
- 2. Make a list of people that come to your mind and start praying for them. Pray for each person by name.
- 3. Pick up that book you've been meaning to read. Read a few books at a time. I do this all the time. Read one for half an hour, then switch over to another book and read that. In this way, you are reading many different subjects at the same time. It feels like a good meal that has several items on the plate all at once. Maybe recommend a good book to a friend.
- 4. Read God's word and memorize verses of hope and promise.
- 5. Read poems about hope, love, and faith.
- Read a good book about using time wisely.
- 7. Think about others, especially those who are in a much more dangerous environment than we are, and pray for them.
- 8. Write an email to the Government authorities, both local and higher levels, and encourage them. Appreciate all that they do for the society. They don't hear positive encouragement very often.
- Although you cannot go to public places like the gym for exercises, discipline yourself for at least half hour each day to do some kind of physical exercise in your home.
- Look around and see the accumulation of material stuff that has cluttered your life. Simplify your living conditions by throwing things away that can't be used and giving away what can be.
- 11. Don't consume foods that your body cannot use, especially during these days with limited inability to burn the calories.
- 12. Listen to music that calms your mind and emotions.
- 13. Watch good movies on life. Don't watch scary movies.
- 14. Guard your ears from listening to people talking about negative things.
- 15. If you have resources to give, look for ways to help others in dire need, especially those in communities and nations that are greatly suffering due to this coronavirus crisis.
- Learn something new! Practise a new language, develop speed reading, learn an instrument - you can get started by looking at what is offered for free online.
- 17. Try to help the needy and suffering abroad and at home through your prayers and assistance.
- 18. Being isolated with your family members is a gift from God. Be kind and loving to those who are close to you. This convergence culture and online world of social media has caused so much loneliness and isolation. Relearn how to be a real human being during this time you have together.
