As time goes by!

When I was a child, it seemed that time was endless, summer days were spent playing in the fields behind our house, even wintertime brought joy when the snow and ice came so there clearly was a sense of movement of the seasons, but for some reason I didn't seem to notice. Move forward to my late 30s and then a kind of turbo boost kicked in and my life sped up like never before and seems to get faster as every year passes!

Time is a funny thing, we change, and things change around us, sometimes we are aware and sometimes we are not. Now I am in my 50s and I literally have no idea how I got here!

However, every so often we get a chance to slow down, to step off the 'hamster wheel' of life and start to enjoy a sense of stillness again, but sadly those moments don't come as natural as when we were children, these days we must work hard for it.

Our recent Queen's Jubilee presented a good opportunity to be aware of how much time has passed, the film clips from earlier decades made me think about what I was doing in those times gone by!

I remembered during her Silver Jubilee being sat at a table in the middle of our road dressed up as a 'bandaged mummy' wearing a plastic union jack bowler hat whilst eating jelly and ice cream...ah good times.

And here in my home village of Ludgershall I had the opportunity to go out and participate in our local village celebrations for the first time since the pandemic began!

The sun was shining, there was an amazing 8-year-old cook winning best cake, tractor rides, a place for the children to eat and play and somewhere for the adults too! Music, celebration, and tree planting all created a sense of energy, that new seasons and beginnings were just around the corner. It all felt great and for a little while being able to stop and have some fun was brilliant. I think as we learn to live alongside Covid 19 it's such a joy and a relief to see that some things will always remain steady.

As an adult I've realised how important it is to deliberately seek stillness and slow down time a little, because if you proper slow down, things do eventually stop, the world still carries on its busyness, but the world inside of you doesn't. And I always think that it is this moment that allows us to create deeper relationships with God, because listening out for that still small voice of calm means asking ourselves to be calm too.

I'm not saying that God isn't in the chaos, but I do believe communication is harder when we are in the chaos too feeling tired and overwhelmed. I have recently been taken by the words of the Japanese poet Toki Miyashina who has rewritten **Psalm 23** to express exactly what I'm talking about. Take a moment to pray it through, then let go and let God.

*The Lord is my Pacesetter, I shall not rush;
He makes me stop and rest for quiet intervals.
He provides me with images of stillness, which restore my serenity.
He leads me in ways of efficiency
through calmness of mind, and His guidance is peace.
Even though I have a great many things
to accomplish each day,
I will not fret, for His presence is here;
His timelessness, His all importance,
will keep me in balance.
He prepares refreshment and renewal
in the midst of my activity by anointing my mind
with His oils of tranquility.
My cup of joyous energy overflows.
Surely harmony and effectiveness
shall be the fruits of my hours;
for I shall walk, in the pace of my Lord
and dwell in His house forever.*

Abigail's quick thinking

Nabal planned a great feast when the sheep-shearing was over. A churlish, bad-tempered, wealthy man, he dismissed David's request for food with contempt. "Who is this David? Who is this son of Jesse?" Nabal could afford to be generous and the laws of hospitality should have prompted him to answer favourably.

Nabal's servants and shepherds were terrified of David's reaction and they were right. David had a personal army of 400 men and he told them to arm for battle and set out at once to attack Nabal.

When the servants told Nabal's wife, the beautiful and intelligent Abigail, of Nabal's insulting reply to David she realised immediately the danger they were in. She lost no time in putting together a practical response. Through her intervention she restrained David from guilt for murderous revenge and changed the course of events.

What was Nabal's reaction when she told him the next day of what she had done?

Solomon judges a difficult case

If the Lord appeared to you in a dream one night and asked, "*What would you like me to give you?*" what would your answer be?

What Solomon asked for was wisdom. Not theological, abstract, philosophical wisdom but the practical morality of daily life. "Give me the wisdom to rule your people with justice and to know the difference between good and evil."

The people looked to the king to discern between right and wrong, to make decisions in disputes. Solomon listened to two despised prostitutes who came to him over a quarrel about babies. It was one person's word against another's. Solomon showed a clear understanding of human nature and an awareness of the power and reality of love. The threat of neither mother having a living child revealed the true mother's feelings.

"When all Israel heard the verdict the king had given they held the king in awe because they saw that he had wisdom from God to administer justice."

In his Letter to The Ephesians 1,17, Paul wrote, "*Ask God to give you the Spirit who will make you wise and reveal God to you.*"

There was nothing she didn't know about all the herbs and spices that were shown to us and advised how to use them. While explaining the different lentils, flavours and processes she used to create the most delightful curries, the electric wok and pans were producing some extremely tasty dishes for us to sample. Not too spicy, just flavoured to perfection and delighted to take home sample packets.



Patricia went on to tell us of her **British Curry Company**, which produced curry sauces and were stocked in many of the high street stores.

Travelling far and wide to promote her sauces Patricia decided to sell the company as her husband was not in good health. It was an exciting talk. Thank you, Patricia, we look forward to welcoming you back for part two.

In June Daphne Preece, along with her husband Frank, who are both **National Trust Volunteers**, came along to tell us all about **Claydon House**.

With its close connection with Florence Nightingale, we saw the bedroom and rooms she used on her frequent visits to this Bucks estate. The interior was very impressive with the most elaborate 'singing staircase', with beautiful parquetry using 3 different types of wood. It also houses a large collection of period costumes some dating back over 400 years.

With over 30,000 visitors a year it certainly needs its 110 volunteers to keep it in good order. The current custodians run the estate hosting many different events and were very pleased to host the film crew for 'Far from the Madding Crowd'.

A very interesting talk, leaving us determined to find the time to visit this National Trust property right on our doorstep.

As summer approaches why not make the most of the longer days and come along to enjoy the garden at Stowe? For those seeking tranquillity, take in the summer scents of Sleeping Wood as our roses appear or rest a while on our benches found in the cooling shade of **Lampport Garden**. For those looking to get out into the wild, release some energy and have some fun splashing in puddles, come and explore our open spaces. And for those with four-legged friends, we love to welcome dogs at Stowe (please keep dogs on leads). With acres of grounds to enjoy, water bowls dotted around the site, and doggy treats available in the shop a day at Stowe is the perfect way to spend quality time with your dog.

Seasonal highlights to admire in the gardens include the *Indian bean tree*, *tulip tree* and *mock orange*, all displaying their delightful summer blooms. Water lilies can be spotted on Octagon Lake, and you may be lucky enough to see them flowering. Keep your eyes peeled for the Cranesbill by Pebble Alcove and the bright Coneflower by the Temple of Concord and Victory.

A mindful meadow meander

As summer develops through July and August our hay meadows come to life; home to a wide variety of spectacular wildflowers which sway gently in the summer breeze and buzz with wildlife. Pick up a self-guided map that will take you through our wildflower meadows. Take a moment to pause, relax and take in the sounds and scents of nature around you. Spending time in green spaces has been found to reduce stress, anxiety and depression, and we have lots of wonderful green spaces to explore and relax in.

An area not to miss is the **Grecian Valley** which is Stowe's oldest hay meadow and an original garden feature. Its damp, almost marsh-like, nature makes it a haven for bio-diversity, attracting a wide variety of grasses, wildflowers, birds, insects, bees and butterflies. A top highlight from our Senior Gardener, Anna, is the Bee and Pyramid Orchids that are scattered within these meadows.
