From the Rectory

Dear friends,

November can feel like a sad month as the darkness draws in, the trees stand bare, and the mornings are clouded in mist. It is a time of remembering. The children may cry, "Remember, remember the fifth of November..." but there are a number of other and more significant days of remembering for all of us.

The second Sunday, the Sunday nearest to the eleventh day of the eleventh month, is a time for remembering those who fell in the defence of freedom, not only in two World Wars but also in all the lesser conflicts that have shattered nations and peoples since.

We look backward to honour those who gave lives in war, but we must also look forward to keeping faith with them and using our energies to build the sort of world that they held dear. There is an old saying that "those who fail to learn from history are condemned to repeat it." That is why all of us need to remember and pray that the world's rulers and politicians may make wise and honourable decisions on behalf of their people.

There will be a special service of remembrance in both curches on Remembrance Sunday, starting at 10.30.

Remembrance Sunday comes just after the Church's special period of remembrance. All Saints' Day (November 1) commemorates all the unsung heroes of Christian discipleship, the ordinary men and women of every age who have been faithful and loving in their service of God and their fellows.

They are our inspiration to persevere in what we believe to be truly good and noble, especially when things get tough for us. Within the Christian family, they remind us, too, that life in Christ endures beyond physical death, and our fellowship with those we love is not severed when we die.

Within this communion of saints, we pause to recall with loving reverence our own loved ones who have died. For many people, All Souls' Day (November 2) is a very precious, if poignant, time of remembrance. We shall mark this by a special service on Saturday, November 2 at 10.00 St Stephen's. The service will be over in time to be at the Saturday morning concert at St Peter's. At this service, we will dedicate the new memorial board.

One way in which we express our continuing love and respect for those who have died is by preserving their values and sharing their vision. There is much in the world today that causes us deep concern and anxiety, and the shadow of war hangs over so many lands. When Pope John Paul II visited this country, his address at Coventry included these words, "War should belong to the tragic past, to history; it should find no place on humanity's agenda for the future." This is a reminder to us all. That is why we pause to remember and consecrate ourselves to a new future of peace and justice for all. We pray for world peace at this time in Israel, Palestine, and Ukraine and all areas of unrest.

May we live in love and gentleness with all, serving others as Christ serves us.



As we head towards the end of another successful concert season, it is an appropriate time to acknowledge the wonderful support of all those who help in the planning and delivery of concerts at St Peter's.

Our next concert on the 2nd of November, features two young musicians who make up the Orion ensemble. Emily Wilson is a clarinetist who has appeared as an orchestral player with most of this country's leading orchestras, including the Hallé and Royal Philharmonic. Pianist, Adam Taylor hails from Newcastle, and studied at the Royal College of Music. As a soloist Adam has performed across the U.K. at venues including The Bridgewater Hall, The Sage Gateshead, Newcastle City Hall and Rachmaninoff Hall in Moscow. Adam is also an active chamber musician and has performed in a number of ensembles. He is passionate about music education and teaches at Withington Girls' School and The Manchester Grammar School.

Their programme focusses on the relationship between Brahms and the Schumanns (Robert and Clara) and will include Brahms: Intermezzi Op. 117 no. I for solo piano (1892) and

Brahms: Sonata for Clarinet and Piano No. 2 in Eb major (1894).

On Saturday 7th December St Peter's Young Singers will appear in concert with opera singer Jack Bowtell. Originally from the Ribble Valley in Lancashire, British baritone Jack Bowtell, is an alumnus of The Royal Welsh College of Music & Drama and The David Seligman Opera School. After nearly a decade in Cardiff, Jack has been privileged to work with such eminent Welsh companies such as Music Theatre Wales and BBC National Orchestra of Wales and Welsh National Opera, where he made his professional debut in 2016. The concert will provide a fitting grand finale to our season, with the Young Singers serving up some festive music. Seasonal refreshments will also be available!

As usual, admission is £7, free for under 18s, with refreshments served from 10:30 am and concerts starting at 11 am. Free parking is available in the school yard on Rawcliffe Street, and disabled parking is available in the church grounds.

The night sky is a vital, shared resource for all life on Earth, yet the increasing spread of artificial lighting has obscured the stars and altered how we experience the night. For most of human history, people lived under a vast, star-filled sky—one that inspired countless advances in science, shaped religious beliefs, and fueled the imagination of artists, philosophers, and writers.

Today, the natural darkness of the sky, once a universal experience, is fading from memory, and many of the youngest generations may never fully know its wonder.

Evidence shows that artificial light at night has negative effects on wildlife including amphibians, birds, mammals, insects and even plants. Wildlife, such as birds, bats, and moths, rely on darkness for migration, navigation, and feeding. Light pollution can disorient these species, leading to population declines and disturbed ecosystems.

Sixty percent of insects are active at night, and it's estimated that one-third of those drawn to artificial light die as a consequence. Each year, millions of birds lose their lives during migration after becoming disoriented and fatigued from circling and colliding with brightly lit buildings.

A recent study by biologists, conducted over two decades in Chicago, revealed the significant impact of light pollution on birds and how reducing it can make a difference. By dimming half the windows in a building during nighttime, the researchers observed a remarkable reduction in bird collisions—I I times fewer during spring migration and six times fewer in the autumn. In total, the study estimates that this simple change lowered bird fatalities by 60%

For humans, exposure to excessive artificial light can disrupt circadian rhythms, impacting sleep quality and contributing to health issues like insomnia and stress. In the UK, efforts to combat light pollution are gaining momentum. Practical solutions, such as shielded, energy-efficient lighting that reduces sky glow are being put in place along with the obvious solution of turning lights off.

By safeguarding our dark skies, we can support wildlife and ensure that we can all stand beneath a canopy of stars, undimmed by modern life.

Last week I attended The Festival of Healing at the Cathedral. It was a really uplifting day. I attended several workshops. I was surprised at the one which meant most to me. A lady called Ruth from Renew Wellbeing was speaking.

But before I talk about that I must confess all the talk around wellbeing has just made me think 'stop worrying, pull yourself together and get on with it. Which is what I have always done. Earlier this year a lot of things happened at once, I had a bad stomach bug, i encountered problems in my family in my church life and my best friend became ill and passed away. I got up one morning and thought I don't want to do this anymore (long list formed in my mind) I just stopped. I went to see my Spiritual Advisor who suggested I take some time off everything, do nothing, pray and heal. Which I did. Ruth recounted a very similar story resulting in her setting up Wellbeing Hubs to help people take time for themselves and to look after themselves. So often we work, we serve God, we look after friends and family, the person we think can manage is ourselves. But that can result in burnout.

As Christians we need to look after ourselves to successfully serve and help our communities. In group discussions people agree the first thing that goes out of the window when we are too busy is our prayer life. We have depleted our bank balance, emptied our accounts and reserves and are now running on empty. That's a bit confusing but I hope you understand what I mean. We perhaps come to pray, look at the world, our prayer lists and feel that emptiness. Can I suggest a simple way of filling our accounts? First thing in the morning take a verse of a psalm not a lot maybe just - The Lord is my shepherd. Find a quiet place, take your first drink of the day, mine is a strong black coffee, sweet. Sit holding the cup, drink slowly the whole contents and relax, repeat the verse and feel the presence and filling of God.

Then ... empowered by your Holy Spirit send us out into the world to share your love with all we meet. take care of yourself


Also, on the 17th it's fellow MU member, Father Andrew's birthday. He will be celebrating a 'Special O' though I'm not saying which!














How Much Paper Required:

166 verses altogether

7 words approx. can be written on a line

27 words approx. in a verse

Total number of words in both Letters is approx.

27 x 166 = 4482

4482 / 7 = 640 lines required

30 lines approx. on each side of A3

(except on the 1st side which will have 15 lines)

40/30 = 21 sides

I estimate that 7 sheets of A2 paper will be required but for ease I will format 8 sheets. That is each Chapter will fit on one piece of paper.

In Sunday School this month we follow a few themes beginning with the celebration of 'All Saints' day. The story of Ruth will be briefly looked at including the theme of travel, refugees and displacement. Our young people will help Father Andrew on 'Safeguarding Sunday' discuss and promote church - a safe space for all. We end the month celebrating the end of the church year and 'Christ the King'. Our Old Testament reading from Daniel reveals his visions of a promised King.

Winter Vegetable Soup

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tbsp sunflower oil
- · I onion, finely sliced
- · 3 garlic cloves, finely sliced
- 2 carrots, cut into 1.5cm/3/4in chunks
- 2 turnips, cut into 1.5cm/3/4in chunks
- I large potato (preferably Maris Piper), cut into I.5cm/³/₄in chunks
- I large parsnip, cut into 1.5cm/3/4in chunks
- 2 heaped tsp paprika (sweet), plus extra to serve
- I heaped tsp hot smoked paprika
- I x 400g tin chopped tomatoes
- I tbsp tomato purée
- 125g/41/20z chorizo sausage, skinned and cut into 5mm slices (optional)
- 100g/31/20z Puy lentils, rinsed and drained
- 1.75 litres/3 pints stock, made with I chicken stock cube
- 100g/3½oz cavolo nero, kale or spring greens, tough midribs removed, shredded into 2cm/¾in pieces
- · flaked sea salt and freshly ground black pepper
- · soured cream or crème fraîche, to taste.

METHOD

- 1. Heat the oil in a large non-stick saucepan or large flame-proof casserole and fry the onion and garlic gently for 5 minutes, or until softened but not coloured, stirring occasionally. While the onion is frying, cut the carrots, turnips, potatoes and parsnip into roughly 1.5cm/3/4in chunks.
- Add the root vegetables to the pan with the onion and garlic and cook over a low heat for 5 minutes, or until beginning to soften, stirring occasionally. Stir in both the sweet and smoked paprika and fry for a few minutes. Add the tomatoes and the tomato purée into the pan, increase the heat a little and cook for 2–3 minutes, stirring regularly.
- Add the chorizo, Puy lentils and the stock into the pan and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat and simmer gently for 45 minutes, or until the vegetables and lentils are tender, stirring every now and then.
- Add the cavolo nero, kale or spring greens to the pan with the vegetables. Cook for 5 minutes or until softened, stirring regularly.
- Season the soup with salt and lots of freshly ground black pepper. Serve in deep bowls, with a dollop of soured cream or crème fraîche and a sprinkling of paprika.
