From the Rectory

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I write this reflection on Easter Eve, a day of quiet and calm after the business of Holy Week. Holy Week began with a beautiful 'Quiet Day' led by Sisters Judith and Sue from OCMM in Tunstall near Carnforth. We spent time considering the women around the crucifixion in art and prayer, diving more deeply into the Stations of the Cross, and sharing a meal with time for reflection and prayer.

Our daily services have been a wonderful meditation surrounding us in the passion of Jesus. As someone said this week, 'You cannot get from Palm Sunday to Easter Day without the bit in the middle.' During this time, we experienced beautiful liturgy, glorious music, and thought-provoking drama and prayer. I have loved sharing this with you. The Holy Spirit is definitely on the move in Burnley as we grow in love, number, and faith, a direct answer to our prayer.

Spring is always special to me. The grip of winter has eased, giving way to spring flowers and the birth of new lambs, which are never far from their mothers.


As a Christian, I believe there is that same sense of expectation and hope as we journey through Lent and Holy Week; we can see the brightness of a new dawn emerging. Although we know the Easter Story so well, it is one we are never tired of celebrating or sharing. This is all because of the joy and hope brought to us by God in the crucified and risen Christ. In order for us to experience the joy of Easter to the full, we too must go through the winter, which often has a sting in its tail or final flourish. For Christians, that is the reassessment in Lent, which culminates in Holy Week with all the emotions we experience before the joy of the resurrection and a joyful fifty days of Easter celebration.

As I sit and look at some of our amazing stained glass windows, with the sun shining through, I am attracted to a simple but effective scene of victorious risen Jesus Christ the King. This is, to me, a metaphor for our Christian life: the beauty of God's creation, which we do not necessarily fully appreciate or understand so clearly at times, but at the centre of everything, where our gaze and attention should be drawn, is Jesus, the Good Shepherd, who cares for and loves us all. These windows serve as a reminder of the supremacy and mystery of Christ, who, in his risen existence, can now be present anywhere and at any time.

CHURCH MAINTENANCE NEWS:

The church clock: Many people have noticed how our church clock has been somewhat erratic over the past few weeks. Paul has been up the tower and after numerous interventions has managed to coax it into keeping strict time. It once again shines like a little beacon in the night, and we know that a good number of people do rely on it! **New Oven:** The original gas oven that we ordered to replace the old range in

the kitchen was going to be too costly to have fitted due to it requiring extra pipework and being installed by a specialist gas fitter. Another oven is now on order and is due to be installed in May. This will enable us to cater for bigger numbers in a more reliable oven! We are very grateful for all the donations that have been received towards the cost of the oven and installation, with no funds being required from the PCC/church accounts.

Quinquennial Inspection: As mentioned in the last magazine, this inspection took place earlier in the year and we are still awaiting the official report; however, we are assured that nothing major was identified that would incur great expense on our part – good news!

Gardens: The variety of spring flowers growing all around us have put on a magnificent show this year, particularly in our Remembrance and Memorial Gardens. Our grateful thanks are extended to Jim who keeps both these areas in pristine condition for all to enjoy! It is also very pleasing to see that our gardens have been free of vandalism over the past year. We believe that this is due entirely to Father Andrew

Hello everyone,

We hope you are all staying safe and well and are enjoying the lovely weather we have been having recently.

The annual Halsted Sermon will be preached during the Choral Matins service on Sunday 4th May at 10am. This year's preacher is Miss Margaret Carr, a Licensed Lay Minister in the Lancaster & Morecambe Deanery. This traditional sermon dates back to the death of Henry Halsted in 1845, who charged property in his ownership to secure "payment for ever of the yearly sum of two pounds" for a sermon based on Hebrews chapter 13 verse 14, "For here we do not have an enduring city, but we are looking for the city that is to come", to be preached on the first Sunday in May.

We look forward to welcoming Bishop Joe to St Peter's on Pentecost Sunday, the 8th June. The Confirmation service for the Benefice will take place at 10.30am, for which the candidates will be preparing with confirmation workshops during May. This will be the first time the new Bishop of Burnley has visited St Peter's since his Consecration last year, which many of us from our two churches had the pleasure to attend.

We now have another way of staying up to date with everything going on at St Peter's with the launch of our new Bluesky account. PRAYER FOR
GROWTH AND RENEWAL

Hi everyone,

First of all, Keith and I would like to thank everybody for all your cards and good wishes for our Golden Wedding Anniversary. One of the cards we received listed events and statistics from 50 years ago. The population was 4.07 billion it's now 8,23 billion more than double! Bill Gates and Paul Allen established Microsoft. Lots of things have changed over the last 50 years. Especially how people attend church. Sunday is no longer treated as a special day by many in this country. With shops open on Sundays, community football, dance classes and lots of other leisure activities happening on Sundays.

As I mentioned in the last magazine the diocese have made this year a year for growth and discipleship. We need to look at how we can encourage people to come to church and that doesn't have to be on a Sunday.

During Lent this year we followed the diocesan course on prayer. We discussed different types of prayer, How to pray, When to pray. Do we pray? Do we feel, "Well I went to church on Sunday so I've done my bit". We discussed how we can and should set aside time for prayer. Prayer should be a constant in our lives. Not just when we have a specific need. We should pray with Thanksgiving (expressing thanks to God) Confession (Naming sin before God) Intercession (Asking God) Silence (Listening to God).

Jesus prayed for himself and for others and he prayed to commune with the Father. Jesus gave us the model for prayer in the Lord's Prayer. The first part includes praise and worship of God. The second part moves onto praying for God's will to be done. Then there is supplication for ourselves and for others as well as asking for strength to deal with temptation.

Then there is communal prayer. This is something that is missing from St Stephen's. The Vision team will be meeting in May to discuss , among other things how we can establish a prayer group at St Stephen's.

I would encourage you to think about your prayer life, to make it a constant in your daily routine.

GROWING LEADERS:

... Some thoughts from Alan Roadley

Recently there was a three part TV series on Channel 4 featuring presenter Sandi Toksvig and her wife. They had bought a piece of woodland. The wood was not in a healthy state, and the aim of the series was to show what, with advice from many specialists, they did to restore it to a healthy state. We found it an interesting and informative watch, helped along by Sandi's humour and infectious laugh.

But here's what seemed to me, who has no real knowledge of woodland management, a strange thing. Because the first job, according to the experts, was to get rid of some trees. Yes, cut them down and get rid of them. And get rid of some undergrowth. *In other words, create space for new things to grow alongside and in harmony with the more established trees.*

I sort of made a connection in my mind between growing trees and growing leaders. The direction my thoughts took me in is this:

During the course of the life of the Church, any Church, new volunteers and new leaders will need to be recruited and developed, as older ones decide to pass on the baton or new projects are started. And very often, it's established leaders that volunteer of their own volition or are suggested by someone, and accept taking on an extra duty. And in a way, that makes sense. Because existing leaders have generally already proved themselves and are a known quantity. In many cases they will have completed at least some of the necessary Safeguarding requirements. They will probably know their way around the various Church committees, and have contacts in their own and other Churches that they can call upon if needs be. And especially now the required "Safer Recruitment" procedures have to be taken into account, it's easy to see why any PCC would jump at the chance for one of the existing leaders to take on an extra duty rather than go down the much more time and effort intensive process of developing a completely new leader. But actually, that easy solution ... is in many cases, the **WRONG** solution. The most obvious consequence is that you can end up with a two tier Church, comprising those who have often large portfolios of positions and responsibilities, and those who are playing no part in taking on any leadership roles or any tasks at all. You can also end up with all of the same people sitting on the same committees.



Is there a better way of working? I suggest there might well be. For a start, if you've already got a lot on your plate, and you're asked to take on a bit more, stop and think. Is there not someone else in the wider Church community with less to do that could take on this role? It might seem that we are being heroic in stepping into the breach yet again, but actually, we could be storing up problems for the future by not discerning who else might be able to take on a new task and investing some time to nurture and develop them.

But even better, is to anticipate, to think ahead, and to start to discern and develop new leaders BEFORE it becomes a necessity. Because we know people get older. We know that there is a natural turnover of people and that, for a variety of reasons, some will move on. We know that new roles will emerge that require people to oversee them. And that if new projects are successful and grow then additional leaders will be required to sustain them and keep them growing.

Therefore, the best policy, be it for a business, voluntary group, or as in our case Church, is to make identifying and developing new leaders an ongoing process. It's a great idea to give newer members a chance to work alongside established leaders and volunteers. With a pipeline of potential volunteers and leaders transitions into new roles can happen smoothly, and already busy people need not feel obliged to take on yet another role "because there's no-one else to do it".

I learned from Sandi and her expert advisers that woodlands cannot just be left to do their own thing forever but require planning and action to ensure they stay healthy and sustainable. The same goes for Churches.



How they will never be able to be baptised or express the Love of God and to learn that Jesus died for them. We often scorn religion here in the Western world. We forget the prayers of our parents, of fierce grandma's or aunts who battled in prayer, so that we may find Grace.
