

FROM AD FIONA

Dear friends

As I write this I'm about to embark on a four-week period of interim study leave to complete (God willing) my PhD thesis. By the time you read this, we'll know whether or not I have succeeded!

The work focuses on one of the seven deadly sins, not necessarily the most popular of topics when the idea that human beings might be sinful creatures in need of a Saviour has rather fallen out of favour in our society. Even more obscurely, the sin I'm writing about is the one most people have never heard of: acedia. It's most often translated 'sloth' which is usually associated with laziness, and laziness isn't normally seen as much of a sin. An annoying characteristic, maybe, but not a sin.

But as I've studied this topic over many years (too many years; I've often felt like my own case study in acedia) I've come to realise it's far more complex than that, and may even be the prevailing sin of our time, all the more insidious because we've largely forgotten it even exists.

Acedia, according to the early theologians I've been reading and engaging with, is a toxic combination that occurs when desire and anger become disordered. It makes us either withdraw into inactivity or hide in restless over-activity, in an effort to avoid engaging with God, or with fellow human beings, or with the tasks God has given us to do. That's why I'm suggesting this is the hidden but very real sin of our time.

One theologian calls it the container of all other vices because it triggers all of the other deadly sins. So far from sloth being almost trivial it appears it's potentially lethal for our spiritual lives, if left unchallenged.

But, thanks be to God, it needn't be. Like any other sin with which we battle acedia has been overcome by Christ on the cross. In our individual lives and struggles against sin we can know God's grace, forgiveness, and strengthening in the daily battle against the sins we know all too well and this sin of acedia, whose name we may never have heard of but now may recognise. Recognising it is the first step in overcoming it. I love the deeply realistic means of grace which our ancient predecessors in faith suggested as prescriptions for those suffering from acedia. They were written more than 1500 years ago, but could have been written yesterday:

First, pray short prayers, not long ones. The mind can wander and fall prey to acedia when praying long prayers.

Second, set yourself a short task, and don't get up or do anything else until you've completed it.

Third, physical work. That can snap us out of an acedia attack in the mind.

Fourth, try a warm bath (yes, really!). That one's a bit less practical if acedia strikes while you're at work.

Fifth, the one that usually makes people sigh in startled relief: tears. Because tears break down the shell that acedia has built around the soul, and bring healing.

I could write a lot more on the subject, which is just as well as I have 80,000 words plus footnotes to hand in, so for now I must bid you farewell for a few weeks as I stop procrastinating and get on with the work of writing about acedia and how, by the grace of God, we may overcome it.

CLERGY THOUGHTS FROM MARJORIE

Him we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone with all wisdom, that we may present everyone mature in Christ. (Colossians 1:28)

I preach a sermon almost every Sunday as well as at various occasional services. And I preach, not exclusively, but nearly always from one of the passages indicated by the Church of England lectionary. The Gospel is usually the more user-friendly but I think it is important to strike a balance and be prepared to tackle some of the more challenging readings at times, so we do not become too cosy.

But this begs the question - why preach at all? That great actor, Sir Ralph Richardson once said of his own profession: "Acting is the art of keeping a large group of people from coughing." And you could apply that to preaching. If you get through the sermon without a lot of shuffling and throat-clearing, - and with the congregation still awake you are probably not doing too badly. Preaching is of course a traditional part of a church service; sermons have always been preached in church and there is a slot designated for it in the liturgy. And when I began my ministerial training, initially as a reader, I was instructed that preaching was the central feature of my ministry, though the brief became wider after my ordination.

But none of that explains the reason for and the purpose of preaching.

The reason for doing it, first and foremost I think, is that we are following Christ's example, doing what Jesus did. He went round the countryside teaching; day after day, he was preaching sermons. In fact, one of the most influential parts of all Christian teaching is called The Sermon on the Mount. And I don't think there would be any coughing in the pews if every sermon had that quality.

Then I am aiming to share thoughts and knowledge which I have gleaned from my own study of the scriptures but which I hope are inspired by the Holy Spirit. That is important because it means that though the words are mine the underlying meaning comes from God and I am acting as a channel to convey what he wants you to know; continuing, **in a very small way**, a long prophetic tradition. Teaching the hearers more about God and what he is like. But the difference between teaching and preaching is that teaching is about imparting knowledge while preaching is about encouraging lifechange. So, I believe a sermon should be challenging – but not daunting. It should not discourage by setting unrealistic goals, but should spur the hearer to aspire to something better; greater service, a more fruitful or a more prayerful life. In other words to encourage the congregation to become the people God wants them to be; that we may all become mature Christians who continue to grow in the faith throughout our lives. And that maturity should lead, too, to a social awareness and an understanding of the responsibility we carry, to further the kingdom and care for all of creation.

But above all, preaching should be Christ centred. No sermon is worth listening to unless it has Christ at its heart, explicitly or implicitly. Not just preaching *about* Christ but preaching Christ; making him real and vital to the hearer. We are here to "preach Christ crucified." (1 Corinthians 1:23) That was the focus of Paul's missions and should be the focus of all Christian preaching – and of all our lives.

RIDE+STRIDE – 14 Sept 2024

Ride+Stride is a chance for YOU to raise money for your Church. Anyone can join in - collect **sponsors**, then plan your own route - walk, bike, **or car** - visit some churches - enjoy the day.

The **sponsorship money is split 50/50 between your local Church** and the Shropshire Historic Churches Trust (SHCT), which uses it to award grants for repairs and improvements to our Churches and Chapels.

So 100% goes to our Churches. This is definitely a 'Good Thing'.

'Ride+Stride' is a National event by the National Churches Trust and we, at SHCT, are pleased to support it. The basic idea is twofold:

(1) Churches try to be open for visitors on Saturday 14 Sept from about 10 to 6, ideally with light refreshments (biscuits. squash; cake maybe).

(2) Anyone can visit as few or as many churches as you wish.

Go anywhere ... on foot, by bike, **or by car**, using our Sponsorship Form to collect sponsorship for your church and for the Trust

R+S is **NOT** an event where church visits are centrally organised. The Trust does **not** have a 'central team' that plans any walking, cycling, or car rides.

NO ... It's something that Churches do for themselves.

September may seem like a long way away, but time flies. You can get a **Sponsorship Form** from our website **www.shropshirehct.org.uk**

Or contact me and I will get one to you. You can still go and visit other churches, even if your own church is closed (builders, lack of staff, etc).

The next 'R+S Day' is <u>Saturday 14th Sept</u>. **But** if you can't manage that date **then you can go on on any other day** – which is what a lot of people do.

It is important to maintain or increase the visiting aspect otherwise the event will cease. The county raised £37,082 last year, so we, the Trust, are encouraging it to continue - even in parts of the county where it has fallen 'off the radar' and, at present, there are few visitors to the open churches.

This event has much more potential ... For example, Dorset raised £98,000. This is 260% more than us, and it has a similar population to Shropshire. Well, actually 30% more, but raising so much for their churches is amazing.

Thank you to everyone who helped in previous years. We (you) raised a record amount last year. Congratulations. We are progressing well.

I hope you can participate this year. Help preserve our Churches in good repair; and help to keep them open for the future.
