CHURCH SERVICES GOING FORWARD FROM SEPTEMBER

You may or may not be aware that in the Deanery due to long term sickness, retirement and existing vacancies there is considerable call upon a limited number of PTOs and SSMs to take Communion services.

There will be at least one Communion service every Sunday within the Benefice so if your church hasn't a Communion on a particular Sunday you will be most welcome to attend or go to your own church where there will hopefully be a Morning Prayer or Family Service. If for any reason any particular church cannot offer a service we will endeavour to give congregations two weeks notice.

From Derek Archdeacon of Hereford

Achievement – One of the things I have done as part of my study leave is to walk the Pembrokeshire Coastal Path. I have wanted to do this since I was in my late teens. I actually did around a third of it back in 1986 and have done different parts ever since but never got around to walking the whole path. I can now say that after walking for 16 days I have completed all 186 miles and enjoyed every moment of it! Whilst written out it does not seem quite so challenging, as it was coastal walking it certainly contained a lot of climbing up and down. According to the Coast Path, guide book the ascents and descent are said to be the equivalent of climbing Mount Everest – 35,000 feet! In addition I lost weight and raised with my sister in law £3000 for the Alzheimer's Society. It actually feels like I have achieved something and it got me thinking about the idea of success.

In our society today, we are often measured by how successful we are and whilst we should all aim to do our best and work hard that will not always lead to success. It is so easy for us to try to emulate others or to search out the golden bullet that will change our fortunes but the reality is chasing after superficial success will not help us spiritually.

The same is true in our churches it is far too easy to compare ourselves with others or think that there is a clever solution to our problems. The reality is there is no one way to grow our churches or to be successful because it is God who grows the church not us. When we chase after clever tools and copy other peoples strategies we miss the point completely.

“Come now, you who say, “Today or tomorrow we will go into such and such a town and spend a year there and trade and make a profit”— yet you do not know what tomorrow will bring. What is your life? For you are a mist that appears for a little time and then vanishes. Instead you ought to say, “If the Lord wills, we will live and do this or that.” As it is, you boast in your arrogance. All such boasting is evil. So whoever knows the right thing to do and fails to do it, for him it is sin.”

James 4:13-17

James writing to the early church recognised that it is only God who can create our spiritual growth and grand plans that don't include

God are fruitless. When we chase success for success sake we will simply end up missing what God is about and fool ourselves. James isn't suggesting we have a fatalistic faith but what he is saying is that we need to see what God is doing amongst us and join in with him. So often, we create plans and then invite God to bless them rather than asking God in prayer what he would have us do. James wants the church to be a place that is faithful to the gospel and to listen to God and not chase after success and achievement so we can boast about ourselves. When we put God first in our lives then we will see achievement in a different light. Achievement also does not come without cost and it amazes me how so often we stockpile our resources and then wonder why we don't see more fruit from our church life. Generosity and hospitality are core parts of our faith and yet we often fail to share what God has given us with others. If we truly want to see our churches grow and flourish we have to live out the values of our faith and not allow ourselves to become inward looking. Our faith is not a business transaction where we get what we pay for instead we are called to give ourselves away for the sake of the kingdom. This is what Jesus taught his disciples and it is just as true for us today.

“Don't pile up treasures on earth, where moth and rust can spoil them and thieves can break in and steal. But keep your treasure in Heaven where there is neither moth nor rust to spoil it and nobody can break in and steal. For wherever your treasure is, you may be certain that your heart will be there too!”

Matthew 6:19-21



Reducing energy costs in your home

How can you make savings at home and to how can you fund the work?

Easy first targets

There are a few easy things you can start with, including: installing LED lighting, draught proofing doors and windows, closing your curtains at night, choosing efficient appliances, turning things off when not in use, not overfilling kettles and making sure your boiler is working efficiently, with good temperature controls.

Insulation

The next step is to minimise the heat lost from your property. Cost-effective improvements include:

Loft insulation: If your loft has no, or little, insulation then adding 300mm of loft insulation pays for itself in about 2 years.

Double or triple glazing: The energy saved by installing replacement windows and doors typically pays for the replacement of single glazed windows over about 20 years.

Solid wall insulation: If you have solid walls then installing wall insulation can pay for itself in 5 to 10 years. Internal wall insulation can be installed a room at a time, when redecorating or fitting a new kitchen or bathroom. External wall insulation works best on certain styles of property – or you could just insulate a wall with no windows.

Cavity wall insulation: If you have an older house with suitable cavity walls, which have not been insulated, then cavity wall insulation is very worthwhile, with a fairly short return on investment.

Moisture, damp and ventilation

[When correctly installed, all of the above will reduce damp and mould problems, but care is needed. For example, any moisture barrier should be on the warm side of insulation, or you may get condensation on the inside of a cold moisture barrier. Ensure you take good advice on this.](#)

You always need to control the moisture levels in any house by having sufficient ventilation and limiting how much moisture is released. Extraction fans in kitchens and bathrooms help with this and you should avoid, for example, drying clothing in a house with damp problems.

Boiler efficiency and radiator sizing

The majority of UK homes are heated with gas or oil-fired boilers: most are more efficient, condensing boilers. If you still have a non-condensing boiler, it is worth considering replacing it with either a condensing boiler or a heat pump.

If you have a condensing boiler, check that it is operating efficiently, in condensing mode. This requires the temperature of the water returning from the radiators to be low enough for the steam in the boiler flue to condense.

It's probably not worth installing a heat pump if you still have a condensing boiler in good condition and until your property is sufficiently well insulated. However, if you need to replace a radiator, start to prepare for a heat pump by installing a larger one, sized to work at the lower flow temperature (45°C) needed for heat pumps.

Funding the work

If you have the funds available then all the work outlined above will give you a reasonable payback.

If not, there are two current Energy Company Obligation (ECO) funding schemes for eligible people and properties. Both can be accessed through your (or another) energy supplier, as well as other routes:

ECO 4: provides funding for people on certain benefits.

The Great British insulation scheme (was ECO Plus): will fund improvements to any property with an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rating D-G and within council tax bands A-D, as well as people on other benefits who are not eligible under ECO 4.

There are other funding schemes that you may be able to access.




