REPORT OF PCC MEETING



Despite the unwillingness of a number of us, photographs were taken once again of all PCC members at the beginning of our meeting on 20th June. We had an adjourned agenda, which meant we continued going through the agenda of the previous meeting.

One of our main items for discussion was St Paul's Baptism Policy, which was outline for us by Steven Thompson. Our policy remains the same as it has been for a number of years: we continue to expect parents to take the baptism service very seriously and give careful thought to the promises they make at the service. We also discussed our Thanksgiving Services, mainly conducted on Sunday afternoons and seen as an attractive alternative to the baptism service. Jonathan has modified both services and made improvements to them. These were welcomed and approved by members of the PCC.

Jonathan informed us that Marion Farr and Ingrid Walsh would soon be appointed as pastoral assistants at a service to be arranged. As official pastoral assistants, they will be available for visiting in the parish and both have designated areas of ministry they wish to concentrate on. The PCC warmly endorsed their appointment as pastoral assistants. Jonathan explained that Michael Scrase would not be going forward as a pastoral assistant, but it was hoped an alternative ministry would be developed for him. Michael was thanked by the PCC for his pastoral work and his care for the church buildings. We also expressed the hope that his health would improve and that results of various tests he had had recently would be satisfactory.

Jonathan also informed us that it was hoped teaching courses would commence in the autumn. Eight sessions were being planned, four to be staff-led. He and Renée would welcome ideas on topics to be covered.

A meeting of the Standing Committee had taken place the week before the PCC which approved its Terms of Reference.

Members were once again delighted that the meeting ended at a reasonable time - before we were too exhausted!

JONATHAN WRITES

In recent weeks it has been lovely to see a number of families coming forward and asking for a service of baptism or thanksgiving for their child. They want to give thanks to God for the birth of such a special addition to their family, a marvel of creation; and they want to ask God



to bless the child as he/she grows up. And in baptism the parents and godparents are promising they will help their child to grow; not just by giving them the right sort of food and drink so that they grow strong and healthy physically; but by helping them to learn to pray, to know more about God and fellowship with the church family as they worship God, so that their child grows strong and healthy spiritually.

Do we, as members of the church family, make sure that we take in the right food so that we can go on growing spiritually? Can we honestly say that we know God better now than we did a year ago? Is our spiritual life a growing walk with God that reaches to the very centre of our lives? Or is it just one segment of a busy life, rather like a slice of pie, part of our time devoted to God with the rest of our life (the rest of the pie)

unaffected by it?

This Autumn, under the overall heading of "Growing in Faith" we will be providing a variety of opportunities in St Paul's for Christian education, for sharing in fellowship, and for spiritual growth. There will be a Christian Basics course led by Jonathan, a course designed to develop our understanding of the basic foundations of our Christian faith. This informal group would suit those who were confirmed time ago and would like a refresher course, those considering Confirmation, and those who do not yet believe, or who are uncertain of their beliefs.

There will also be a course entitled "A private house of prayer" aimed at helping us to deepen our prayer life and our awareness of God. It is currently planned that there will be 4 sessions in the form of joint meetings which Jonathan, Renée and Steve will lead and provide input for. Alternating with these sessions we shall divide up into housegroups and discuss material prepared by the staff and put into practice some of the

things that we have learnt.

Lauraine is also hoping to lead a course on "Women of the Bible" and the lessons we can learn from them. In addition there will be Focus meetings midweek, the Fellowship prayer meetings, the Tuesday Club, other groups for parents and toddlers and so on. There should be something to

suit everyone's needs.

So, I do hope that you will take a copy of the "Growing in Faith" booklet when it comes out later this month and prayerfully consider which group you might join to help you to grow spiritually. Don't stagnate and remain a stunted Christian; do feed yourself spiritually and remain a growing Christian.





Just to say we praise and thank our Lord for the restoration of sight to Frank's left eye and for all the prayer, help and support we have been given by the people of St Paul's Church during a difficult time for us both - we now look forward in faith to a successful outcome of an operation on Frank's right eye which we hope may not be too long in coming. Thank you all.



In recent months I have travelled to Denmark, Hong Kong, Australia, Russia and Lithuania. I have been asked to write a little piece about my impressions - so here it is:

My travelling was work related and so I can only give general impressions rather than specific insight into the church and its situation.

Denmark has very few hills and a mainly agricultural economy. Despite being famous for its bacon, I saw no pigs at all! This is because they are all kept in sheds and their biggest pollution problem is disposal of pig dung. There is only so much you can fertilise the fields with and the remainder must go somewhere. Latest investigations involve using it to fuel power stations. I visited Copenhagen and Aalborg and was impressed by the cleanliness of the cities. They have few traffic problems as they have a subsidised bus service and cycle lanes everywhere. Cyclists have right of way in most situations and there are plenty of them. Thus, they keep both healthy and pollution free. I also visited the north tip of Jutland. It was cold and windy with ice on the beaches, even in March. I thought of the sea battles in the World Wars and could imagine what it must have been like.

Hong Kong is a hive of activity. High rise buildings, people everywhere and space at a premium. The flight path skims the tops of tall buildings that have sheds, gardens and even tennis courts and swimming pools on their roofs. No time, no space and so busy making money that the 1997 hand over of the colony to China is of little concern: only the British press and Christopher Patten seem worried by it. Melbourne in Victoria State, Australia was very restful in comparison. The people are very friendly and strike up a conversation on the tram without inhibitions. Wide streets and very spread out, it was very welcome after the bustle of Hong Kong.

In Russia I visited Moscow and then Sochi on the Black Sea. The country is in turmoil. Four years ago there were £4 to the Rouble, now there are 1400 Roubles to the £. The parks are overgrown and uncared for, roads full of potholes and buildings in need of repair. The saddest sight was to see women standing outside the underground station at the Red Square selling old bottles of drink or home made loaves of bread for


a few pence. Meanwhile the politicians and civil servants seem to be involved in a constant power struggle. No doubt it will sort itself out in time. Lithuania, on the other hand, having, as they put it, "freed itself from the Russian occupation", are busy building and setting up businesses at a fast rate. Lithuania is covered in forest and lakes and is very pretty. The City of Vilnius has both ancient and modern buildings and is gradually getting repaired after 50 years of neglect, but has still much to do.

At the time you read this I will probably be back in Russia. I'll be thinking of you.

The New Bishop of Rochester

(extracted from Church Times, C of E Newspaper and Independent.)



The Church of England has announced the appointment of its first ever non-white diocesan Bishop, the Rt Rev Dr Michael Nazir-Ali, 44, who is currently general secretary of CMS. His appointment has been welcomed as a sign that the days of racial prejudice are over, and it is hoped that minority ethnic groups will feel more welcome in Anglican Churches as a result. Dr Nazir-Ali, is an expert on Christian-Muslim relations and writes poetry in English and Persian. He took a degree in economics and sociology in Karachi before coming to Britain in 1972 to study Theology at Cambridge and Oxford. He

was ordained in 1974 and in 1984 was consecrated Bishop of Raiwind in Northern India, the youngest Bishop in the Anglican Communion. He is part of the Anglican delegation in standing talks about visible unity with

Rome, a director of Christian Aid and a trustee of Traidcraft.

There is already one black Anglican bishop in the country; the Rt Rev Wilfred Wood, who has been Suffragen bishop of Croydon since 1985, but Dr Nazir-Ali will be the first to have full control of a Diocese. He has a wife, Valerie, and two teenage sons. His interests include cricket, hockey and table tennis, Scrabble, music and television. He has said that he hopes his appointment will be a marker for the globalisation of Christianity in this country. Three of Dr Nazir-Ali's books have been concerned with the difficulties posed for Christianity by the rise of Islam. We look forward to an opportunity to meet our new Bishop in the near future and we congratulate him on his appointment.



As the whisky advert says - 'Born in 1916 and still going strong!' So the George Christie story begins in Glasgow a short distance from the Hampden Stadium of International Football fame. George has always had a great love of sport and first played golf at the age of 5. He learned to play on the West Coast just outside Troon, where

his sister Helen still lives today. As a young lad he was a keen member of Boy's Brigade at Battlefield Church. After his education at Mount Florida and then Queen's Park Secondary, he went on a 5 year apprenticeship to become a golf professional and became an Assistant on a course outside Glasgow. As the club could not afford to keep him on during the winter months, George's father - an engineer got him a job with Beardmores making armaments. The family by now had moved to Troon and George stayed at the YMCA in Glasgow to continue his work as a fitter. He clearly remembers Sunday 3rd September 1939 when he and a friend volunteered to "join up". Both his father and grandfather had been soldiers and George wanted to follow the tradition. He was sent to Clay Cross for training in the Army Service Corps attached to the Artillery. From there he was sent to Belfast and vividly recalls having to clear up after the Blitz. He was further posted around the country and eventually joined a convoy to Africa for four years. He remembers arriving back in Liverpool on the 3rd January 1946 in full tropical kit to find 9 inches of snow on the ground! He was demobbed and went home to recover from Malaria.

Next Murcar Golf Club in Aberdeen offered him a position as professional until 1949 when he travelled to Iceland for a year to coach. Before the war he had entered Golf Tournaments, but was now much more interested in teaching golf and so he spent the next 8 years in beautiful Sweden. It was a country of few Golf courses and definitely a rich man's game, but George was a forerunner introducing the game to the country on a wider scale. When he returned to England he was offered 'pro' at Barnehurst Golf Club and you've probably guessed that one of his pupils was the lovely Nina who he quickly whisked off her feet at a club dance and they 1960, at St Paul's. Nina hastens to add she has not played golf since! When Moyra was born, George decided to give up being a pro as the hours were not conducive to family life. He saw an advert in the Times for a post with Swaine, Adeney and Brigg who are famed for expensive quality umbrellas (By Royal Appointment) and the Royal family are kitted out for most of their equestrian equipment.

George had a very happy time working there but decided to retire at 70! Another happy occasion at St Paul's was the wedding of Moyra to Steve Thompson our Reader, and they have further added to George and Nina's happiness with the arrival of Charlotte, Lucy and James. It is also a tremendous joy to George to have three generations in the Church Choir on Sundays.

And now to George's faith. He was brought up in a lovely Christian family in the Church of Scotland, and taught to respect the belief. When war broke out and following his safe return, he feels his sentiments were merely if you can come through a war, someone is looking after you. Sundays were often busy days in the golfing fraternity and his faith was dormant. One day however whilst working for Swaine, Adeney and Brigg, he was walking across Trafalgar Square at the traffic lights en route to Charing Cross when without thinking he nearly stepped off the pavement into the oncoming traffic. He felt a hand on his shoulder holding him back, but no one was there. He gave this event much time and thought and then gave thanks to God. It was Steve who encouraged him to attend a Men's Breakfast with Jim Smith, with whom he was most impressed and it has changed his life. He has a real love for St Paul's and it's family and has many friends. He enjoys singing in the choir, being a Person and meeting and greeting everyone. He really loves music and plays the piano. His favourite hymns are all those with a good Bass part, stirring and rousing, such as Onward Christian Soldiers and Cwm Rhondda. He remembers an old hymn from his childhood, 'Will your anchor hold in the storms of life?' and the all time favourite Crimond - The Lord's my Shepherd. He has a tremendous admiration for Alan Hunt and for all his weekly efforts to bring music to our services in such a caring and quiet way. George still enjoys a couple of rounds of golf a week, and tries to keep fit and healthy. 'Lang may yer lum reek!' - dear George, we thank you.

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
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
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
