



2. Jonathan writes



As we enter the season of "mists and mellow fruitfulness" we have a lot to give thanks to God for. For years people have been praying for someone to work with the young people of Northumberland Heath, and Steven Beal is now up and running as Youth Worker to the churches and schools on the Heath, and has made many contacts already in the schools and community.

We have also been trying for a long time to upgrade the curate's house and the Diocese has now bought a lovely town house on the new housing estate off Belmont Road with the proceeds of the sale of the house and garden at 113 Belmont Road. The Diocese has also agreed to let us have a full time curate, starting at the end of September 1999, and Mrs Gwen Smith has been appointed and should be ordained on the last Saturday of September 1999. Her husband Peter has been trained and appointed as an evangelist by the Diocese and should be able to join our staff as an evangelist. The Diocese has also kindly agreed to make a substantial contribution towards the salary of the curate.

In addition, due to some generous giving and a generous legacy and with help from the Inland Revenue (in the form of tax back on Covenants and Gift Aid) we have raised approaching a third of the total cost of £375,000 for our building redevelopment.

I hope that you are encouraged by all this news and that it strengthens your faith in our God, who richly provides for our needs. But it does leave us with two ongoing challenges. The first is to make prayer the basis of our church life. If what we do is not under girded with prayer then we will miss out on many of the blessings which God wants to give us. Do we make a point of praying regularly each week for the life and growth of the church family?

The other challenge is to grow spiritually closer to our Lord, and become more aware of his love for us and his presence with us day by day. It is all too easy to get bogged down in 'busyness' and let our space for God be squeezed out of our daily lives. This is particularly the case in the busy season leading up to Christmas and we mustn't allow additional activities like fund-raising to prevent us having time for God. We can do them with and for God, sensing his

presence at our side. But let us also make sure that when the coming of 3. Jesus in the four weeks of Advent leading up to Christmas we set at least a little time aside for space for our Lord Jesus as we seek to make his presence more of a reality in our lives.





THE WEST AFRICAN EXPERIENCE

(Mauritania/Senegal)

The first thing the intrepid explorer notices in Mauritania is the sand. You find it not only in the usual places, like the beach and the desert, but also in your ears, up your nose, in your socks, in the wind - in a word, everywhere! Sand colour, which we'll call 'camel' for convenience, is equally omnipresent. However, not everything is camel. The white and black Moors, the dominant ethnic group here, have their own particular way of dressing. All the men are clothed in pale blue or white *boubous*, while the women wear brightly coloured dresses covered by an all-enveloping, coloured, transparent veil called a *malafa*.



The visitor to Mauritania cannot avoid seeing the vast differences in lifestyle between the rich and poor - on the one hand the undernourished children in the capital, the nomads in their primitive camps, the patients in the sole general hospital lying on sheetless beds and lacking essential medicines through

no fault of their own, and on the other hand certain wealthy businessmen with their fast cars, their domestic servants (we could equally call them slaves) and their way of looking down their noses at their inferiors.

As far as their spiritual life is concerned, most Mauritanians seem to practise basic Islam without the pagan, or just superstitious, additions widespread over most of the continent. Very ordinary young men who spend their time talking about football, their studies, girls and music, suddenly stop without any embarrassment and say their prayers in front of the guests. Islam has a religious monopoly - no other way is known, allowed or even contemplated. For all that, the majority of Mauritanians are not fanatics and the Christian foreigner does not feel any hostility in their attitude.

How can we help the handful of expatriate workers in Mauritania? By praying, of course, but also by giving, as the needs are enormous. As Paul said to the Romans:

"If your adversary is hungry, feed him; If he is thirsty, give him something to drink..."

Or if you prefer the words of Jesus himself:



"If you show love only to those who love you, what reward do you deserve? Even the pagans do that."

On the other side of the flowing border, known as the Senegal River, we find ourselves in a completely different culture. It even looks different. The

endless camel is replaced by a whole spectrum of colours - even green in the fields! In Senegal, faces are definitely black. We pack away our boubous and malafas in favour of cotton suits in every colour under the sun: black and white for the most sober team member, orange, yellow and green for the most adventurous. The local children look bigger and stronger - though Wolofs may well be naturally bigger than Moors.



The population is Muslim, but fetishes and grigris (good luck charms) can be seen more easily than people at prayer. A sect which provides a mixture of nationalism and extremist Islam is gaining a lot of supporters. The Christian minority (which is very small in the north of the country, where we were) is tolerated but not exactly encouraged. Nevertheless, we were able to go to church, to sing hymns in Wolof and to listen to the testimonies of a few local believers. Foreign missionaries can reveal the reason for their presence with no fear of reprisals. The astonishing thing here is the absence of missionaries and evangelists. Christians are free to tell people about Jesus, but very few actually do so. We can quite understand that the north of Senegal is not the prettiest or most agreeable place in the world - but then neither is Manchester, Huddersfield or Thamesmead. You can live there cheaply with very few problems. May the Lord send labourers into his harvest field!

Dear friends,

We are writing to update you on our news and to ask you to pray for Bangladesh as the country has been enduring the most devastating floods in over 100 years. There has been continuous flooding for over two months, and millions of lives are affected. In the last couple of days the waters have begun to slowly recede, but it will be some time before things are back to normal. Rice crops have been destroyed all over the country, so the suffering has only just begun. In many places there will be no harvest this year. Houses, roads, highways and many other vital services have been damaged or destroyed. It will take years for the nation to recover from the floods of 1998. Please pray for the people in their suffering, giving thanks for their amazing patience and resilience, and pray that relief efforts will be well supported, well coordinated and effective.

Many areas of Dhaka have been flooded, but we have not personally been affected. The area where we live has remained dry thanks to a dike which was built to protect the area after the 1988 floods. The area where the children's schools are located has some flooding, but the schools have managed to remain open. The buses have to plough



through water, and we have had to cancel all other activities on that side of town because of the almost impassable roads. But our slight inconvenience is nothing compared to what the majority of the population is going through.

It is hard continuing our normal lives when so much devastation is being reported. At least Nathaniel, Hannah and Beth have been able to get involved a little. Last weekend Nathaniel went with a relief team to a district south of Dhaka which is almost totally submerged in water. They spent three days in



a boat giving out food and water to victims of the floods, many of whom were stranded on their rooftops. Hannah worked a couple of weeks at a nutrition centre for children and helped package some relief goods. Beth's class at school has taken up a project to help at a refuge centre for mothers and children. The rest of us are just watching, praying and supporting other people's activities.

Other than the strain of observing the floods and their effects, we are all well. Beth, Sarah and Andrew started back to school in mid-August and are fully into the school routine. There was some talk of the schools closing because of flooded roads, but the buses have managed to get through, although the journey each way takes longer because of the terrific traffic jams. Beth is gone from 7 in the morning and doesn't get home until nearly 5 in the afternoon - 3 hours of that spent on the bus! Diane is teaching four days a week at Sarah's and Andrew's school, supporting children who have limited English. Hannah left for England last Sunday to start her 4-year degree course in Nursing and Health Visiting at the University of Manchester, and Nathaniel leaves this coming Sunday (in the early morning of his 21st birthday) to continue his studies at the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS) in London. We are really going to miss them.

Back in March, I started looking at other employment possibilities for myself in Bangladesh. A friend had e-mailed me information about a position with UNICEF as Chief of the Education Section in Bangladesh which had been circulated within the United Nations agencies. I sent a letter of application in mid-March but was not surprised when I heard nothing in reply. I was very surprised when I suddenly heard from them in June inviting me to an interview in their Dhaka office. In July I suddenly heard from them again asking for more information and within a few days I was offered the job and will start at UNICEF officially from 1st October.

Besides being overall responsible for two large education projects - one nonformal for working children and one to improve the quality of primary school teaching - I will be involved in developing and implementing policies, working with other donors and with the Government. There are no doubt a lot of challenges ahead and I thank God for this opportunity!

Thank you for your prayers. I hope this will find you well. If you are going through a hard time, just keep trusting and look to God for your strength. Please keep praying for us and for Bangladesh. God keep you.

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
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
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Wellingtons Celebrate 100 Years
