Let us all continue to pray for the future of St John's, and thank God for God's goodness to us.



St John's Reading Group



At our first meeting of the year we discussed 'The Sixteen Trees of the Somme' by Lars Mytting, a Norwegian author. As Edvard took over the running of his grandfather's farm in Norway, he became aware of the mystery surrounding his parents and his great uncle. Believed to have been killed during the war, Edvard discovers that this was not the case. His curiosity takes him to Shetland where he finds out his grandfather and great uncle fought on different sides in WWII. One a hero and the other a

virtual outcast – explaining why Edvard's childhood was difficult. Wood and walnut trees in particular are described in great detail and are an important theme in the story as they link the characters and develop the idea of a family tree with identity and history. Edvard's journey of discovery takes him to the Somme and Delville Wood. It is here, in the 1970s where his parents met their deaths in mysterious circumstances and Edvard makes some amazing discoveries about his past.



Although in translation, it is a beautifully written book with wonderful descriptions of trees, weather, boats, isolation, and the unpredictable seas around Shetland.


If you are searching for something different and memorable, then this book is for you. We gave it a score of 8/10.

For February, we enter the realm of doctors and the NHS. Described as 'often hilarious, at times horrifying and occasionally heart-breaking

diaries of a former junior doctor, and the story of why he decided to hang up his stethoscope.' Perhaps not for everyone, 'This is Going to Hurt: Secret Diaries of a Junior Doctor' is by Adam Kay. It has sold over a million copies and has been awarded several prizes.

For March, we have selected 'The Librarian' by Salley Vickers. This author has written many of our favourite novels: Miss Garnet's Angel, The Cleaner of Chartres and Mr Golightly's Holiday. 'Chance Encounter'

It was one of those Mondays – many trains cancelled but eventually I arrived at The National Gallery. I really needed that cup of coffee and a large lemon drizzle cake to regain my composure. After reading another few chapters of my book it was time to move on. 'What are you going to look at today?' asked the lady at the adjacent table. 'Well, I shall definitely look at the Impressionists, a few Turners and Constables, and of course, Landseer's Monarch of the Glen' I replied. 'Have you see the free Lotto



Exhibition yet?' she asked. 'No, not yet, but what a good idea!'

So I set off to find the Lorenzo Lotto exhibition and was certainly not disappointed. Most of the works were portraits of middle-class sitters in their fine robes and dresses — but how modern many of these merchants, couples and clerics seemed. Many of these works were painted in the early



1500s, rich in symbolism and amazing perception. These were 'real' people, often surrounded by objects they used or loved – bejewelled and wearing rich damasks and furs, they came alive with Lotto's very individualistic style and skill.

Lotto lived about 1480 - 1556/7 and was trained in Venice. He could not compete with Titian so moved to Bergamo, where he painted several major altarpieces. He later lived in Treviso and later Ancona and finally retired to a religious house in 1552.

Had I not had that chance encounter in the café, I would never have discovered anything about Lotto or his paintings. The exhibition 19 on at The National Gallery until 10th February.


New Electoral Roll

This year we celebrate the Feast of Candlemas on Sunday 3rd February. Forty days after his birth, Jesus is taken to the Temple by Mary and Joseph as is the Jewish custom to present the first-born to God.

At the Temple, Mary and Joseph meet Simeon who declares that Jesus is 'the Light' – the 'Light' that will overcome the darkness – hence the tradition of lighting candles to represent that Light.

We have our service of **Choral Evensong at 4.00pm** when we too have our candle-lit procession around the church. It is a very beautiful service — marking the 'end' of Christmas & Epiphany before we approach Lent.

So, you are invited to join us – 4.00pm on Sunday 3rd February.



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
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
