Vicar's Letter July 2021

What a disappointment it is to see our plans for St. John's Day get postponed as the Prime Minister puts reopening the nation on hold. We hope and pray that things may come right for July 25th and we can finally have the opportunity to gather again in number to reconnect and enjoy one another's company again. It has been a comfort and a joy to have people again in Church on a Sunday, for the Eucharist was never intended to be celebrated alone and the building itself feels cold and empty without everyone there. It is that vision of gathering again in number that has been the "light at the end of the tunnel" for me personally these many months as we wend our way back to the "new" normal. The winter ahead may challenge us as Covid continues looking for a foothold and flu season begins, but for now I am clinging on to what summer will bring us when we finally celebrate all that we are as St. John's.

The postponement comes with a cost. The longer we have to wait the harder it will be for us to get back on track. So much ground has been lost and time wasted when we could have been well on our way in the next phase of our Church's life. Covid has derailed so much, nothing has escaped unscathed the privation and limitations the pandemic has imposed. My hope is that this time has given us pause for thought and that there will be a new energy and vitality released when restrictions end that we can make up lost time. Changes will continue to shape the world of work, education, and family life. New patterns have emerged that may well continue in the future and I have no doubt that our use of technology as a Church will continue to grow. How many of you have been able to join our worship at home in the comfort of your dressing gown and slippers? Now you need not miss anything. The emphasis on improving communication in our Mission Action Plan has served us well as necessity spurred us on to find new ways of staying connected. A new Communications Committee is in the wings to carry this forward and improve the way we share our message further afield. The "Home Church" initiative will also keep people in the loop who are no longer able to join us in person on a Sunday, serving our membership even as disability or advancing age limit their mobility. If you or anyone you know might like to be part of this, please let us know.

As we step out into the new day post-pandemic, I do hope that we can use the wisdom we have gained during lockdown. My prayer is that as a society and in our community and Church, we may become gentler with one another, more understanding, and always willing to help those in need. I have heard it said that a crisis only passes once we have learnt the lessons it has to teach us. We have passed through a time of darkness and trial, but we are emerging into the light led by God himself. As we wait for restrictions to be lifted, we look forward in confidence and hope. The time for healing has come as we long to be together once again, to share our joys and sorrows in His light and love. Michael

St John's Reading Group July 2021





Have you ever wondered what your life would have been like if you had made different decisions at crucial moments? I would imagine that most of us would not have wished to change things so drastically but there is always the 'what if?'

If this all seems beyond the remit of the reading group — then just read **The Midnight Library** by Matt Haig. When we discussed this book at our recent meeting — it was met with varying views and scored one 8/10 and the remainder mostly 5 or 6.

For the main character, Nora Seed, life has not been going too well – the final straw comes when she believes that her cat has been run over by a car. Nora takes an overdose and in that time at midnight, she finds herself between life and the imaginary 'Midnight Library' where everything can change. As she contemplates her life – would she have been happily married to Dan running a pub in the country, or maybe an Olympic swimmer or famous scientist – she faces new

possibilities. This has been a very popular novel in the best-seller lists — so any more views on it would be interesting. Let me know....

For July, we shall be reading 'The Confession' by Jessie Burton. We enjoyed 'The Miniaturist' and 'The Muse' by this author so we hope that this novel will be another interesting read. An emotional read which will draw you in so that you will find it difficult to put down.



For August we have selected a 'classic' – no, not Dickens or Austen this time, but a novel by Anthony Trollope entitled 'The Warden'. This novel is the first of the Chronicles of Barsetshire and inspired by a stroll around Salisbury Cathedral. On the back cover of my very ancient copy, the story is described as follows: 'The Warden is a sympathetic account of a man struggling to do his best when society proves unbending'. It does not appear to be a long novel – but then the print in my copy does appear to be incredibly small. Has to be read outside in the garden I think!



I finished Douglas Stuart's Shuggie Bain — it was a very heart-rending story of love and survival and a harsh glimpse of life in 1980s-1990s Glasgow. Tough but a really memorable read. Prepare to shed a tear or two.

If you have been following our reading of Andrew Taylor's historical crime series set in Restoration London, then **The Last Protector** (book 4) is available in paperback. The new Book 5 in the series, **The Royal Secret**, has just been published in hardback.

If you prefer Tudor England, then Hilary Mantel's tome The Mirror and the Light' is now in paperback. The demise of Thomas Cromwell becomes inevitable as he makes more enemies at court and he loses the trust of the King.

I still have seven books in the Winston Graham Poldark series to read — so must resist new purchases for a while, catch up with Poldark & Co and imagine being on a beach in Cornwall. Perhaps the next best thing...


Archiving the Old Malden News

Every month an Old Malden News appears much as it has for over 100 years — in one form or another. St.

John's Church holds a very valuable archive of this great account of social history with an emphasis on the local area. I feel fortunate in being able to help bind the last 20 or so years worth into library copies which will protect the pages and enable future readers to



get a glimpse into what was happening in the early twenty-first century in Old Malden.



Each monthly magazine is destapled, pierced and then sewn with linen thread into a complete year, my own hand marbled end-papers are added and a book cloth cover with gilt titles are pasted to the text block to complete the tome.

This year there is a very slight change, so slight indeed that it will go un-noticed by everyone. I am a part time spinner of wool and to a lesser degree of flax, one of my contacts in Austria offered me some dowry stricks of flax. These were prepared over 70 years by a girl called



Berta as part of her "bottom drawer" prior to her marriage. This was a very common practice back then, 2 large wooden trunks were almost expected with the marriage, flax and linen was valuable and could either be used or sold in hard times. It seems that it was never needed, and after her death last year, the family was keen that it should be given away to be used by anyone who would value it. I was offered a few stricks either to use in my teaching in schools or how I choose the best way. I spun a



it, and that will keep me in bookbinding thread for some time and there has been hardly a dip in the quantity I still have, and plenty to show and tell my primary school children the story.

BARBARA C.L. WEBB

(Biologist, Teacher, Conservationist, Author) sadly died this May 2021.



Barbara lived most of her life in Old Malden, attending Rosebery School in Epsom and then as a Biology Teacher at Nonsuch School for Girls, retiring in 1989.

Barbara was involved in establishing the two Conservation Areas in Old Malden, (one of the first to be set up by the Borough of Kingston upon Thames in 1971) - Plough Green with pub and pond, and St. John the Baptist Church and Manor House area. Conservation Areas are "areas of special architectural or historic interest, the character of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance".

As a biologist Barbara was actively involved with nature conservation management of the Hogsmill/Bonesgate river corridor. She helped to establish a walk along the Hogsmill from its source in Ewell to its confluence in Kingston,

together with a guide leaflet which includes points of historical interest along the route. Following this research she became interested in the artist Millais and wanted to discover the exact spot where the background to his famous 'Ophelia' was painted. Her findings were published in 1997 in her booklet 'Millais and the Hogsmill River'. The booklet also contains a detailed walk retracing the footsteps of Millais.

Barbara then became interested in local history. She had always been aware that the one important person associated with Malden was 'Walter de Merton', the founder of Merton College Oxford. When leading walks in the area she was often asked 'What did Walter de Merton do in Malden?', which she found difficult to

answer, so she decided to research the matter and produce a simple, nontechnical account of what Walter de Merton did here in Malden between 1262 and 1274. This booklet was published in 2000.

Barbara was pleased when St. John's opened its doors each September for Heritage Open Days as at the same time she organised and led walks around the area entitled 'Put the Domesday Village of Malden into Historical Context'.

Barbara was a member of Malden and Coombe Heritage Society and on their website is her slide show of Millais and the Hogsmill. She was also a member of the local U3A choir. I first met her when I became involved with the Christmas Day Event in the early 1980s. At that time Barbara organised the afternoon tea and entertainment bringing along several of her musical friends. She also did a lot of work with Surrey Wildlife and on one occasion invited me to bring along the Guides to see the work being done in Nower Wood, Leatherhead.

This article shows the extent to which Barbara was involved with the local community and how much she loved its surroundings. Thank you Barbara for all you have done and hopefully future generations will continue to be aware of, and take care of, this very special area of suburbia – Old Malden.

Come and See

When Philip met Jesus we are told that he immediately found his friend Nathaniel and told him that he had met the Messiah, Jesus of Nazareth. Nathaniel was sceptical: "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?", he asked. To which Philip replied, "Come and see"!

So I want, as a minor echo of that, to recommend a film series that is currently ongoing, is crowd-funded so as to be potentially free to all viewers, and available via a free App available for all smart mobile phones. The film series, and the App, is called "The Chosen".

This can be "streamed" or "cast", again for free, using the mobile App to see it on a Smart TV screen. It definitely needs to be seen on a screen larger than your mobile's. Viewers are invited to help fund free-to-view future episodes for their own and others' benefit, but only if they are able to do so and with no obligation.

If you do register and fund a suggested minimum \$14.99, via the App or the website below, you can then ALSO watch at least a whole Series (ie 8 Episodes, 7+ hours) "for free" anytime thereafter on your computer. That website, which you can find on Google Search for The Chosen, is:

Why make the effort? Here are some introductory encouragements:

- It is an ambitious project to once again try to make the Gospel records of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John come alive. As I write they are showing up to Episode 5 of its so-called Season 2, and raising funds for Season 3. They have a stated aim, God willing and as pay-it-forward funding etc allows, to complete 7 "Seasons" each of 8 Episodes. Each Episode is about 55 minutes long. So it should end up 51 hours or so long, in total, over several years.
- One strong distinctive is that it tries to imagine characters for each of the 12 apostles
 AND for some of the female followers of Jesus, as well as some Romans and some
 Jewish religious leaders, interwoven around actual Biblical recorded words and events.
 The humanity of Jesus, along with His deity, is thereby explored more fully. His
 followers are each also given distinct and varied personalities, which should allow a
 wide range of viewers to identify in one way or another with the developing story.
- Its prayerful aim is to reach 1 billion viewers worldwide. The dialogue for completed episodes is being translated into more and more languages to help enable this.

- Another helpful distinctive is that the actors have been chosen to be, or appear and sound to be, of ethnically middle-eastern roots (while still speaking clear English). This is to remove, hopefully, too much white or English-speaking bias. The director is indeed American but sort of stumbled (was led) into developing the series in ways you can explore via their App.
- The series matches our times, ie the current "Smartphone" and "Streaming" era. It speaks to our generation. DVD's are also coming available, but are quite expensive.
- It is dramatically powerful, as you may well experience for yourself if you persevere just to the end of Season 1 Episode 1. Persevere, because it is painting a picture which slowly comes into focus. And that is true of the whole series ... the episodes are intended to build on one another. I, for one, was moved deeply by that first episode.

Are there any concerns I feel as I watch the series?

- In the very nature of the series a whole lot of imagination is being employed and that is someone else's human imagination, of course. It certainly did not happen "just like that", in all the secondary details they suggest. But I have found it useful to stimulate my own imagination and understanding of Jesus's Person for my own walk of trust in following Him. I try to avoid, of course, "boxing Him in" to what is portrayed.
- The Gospels do not provide any visual description or image of Jesus. This series (with Biblical scholars also involved in advisory capacity) may capture clothing and hair-styles and cultural settings of the time reasonably well, and it is tempting to take the actor representing Jesus as a definitive portrayal. But, just as icons, or Dürer's self-portrait, or da Vinci's Salvator Mundi, give impressions of Christ, so here: I must take what is helpful and "rings true" to the Spirit of the Gospel records, and discard anything that jars. So far, very little of the latter.

So, if you too end up sampling or following the series, I would love to hear how you find it. If you like it, you may wish to recommend it to others too! I think it honours the Gospel, and should appeal to all adult ages, and perhaps especially to our tech-savvy younger generations (we heard of it from one of our sons). Us older ones may need their help with the technology ...


St John's faces a very difficult financial future as a consequence of the pandemic and has suffered a great loss of income.


