#### Vicars Letter

Last year we spent a bit of time getting to grips with the Vicarage garden. It's a large garden with a wide lawn. In one corner is what I call the "Japanese Garden" lying in the lee of the house in a pool of perpetual shade. I'm not sure if that was down to the Knights or the Scotts, but it is a lovely corner that has encouraged us to do more. So last year's big project was getting the vegetable patch up and running again. Strawberries, red currants, runner beans, tomatoes, and carrots. I don't eat any of these sadly, so not to be outdone I planted two rows of Maris Piper potatoes. They were the best I've ever eaten and we managed to even save some for Christmas dinner!

Building on last year's success, I decided it was time to branch out with flowers. We dug a new flowerbed along the back fence and revamped the two at the front of the house. Loads of spring bulbs heralded the arrival of spring. Unfortunately the bed at the front was laid over the concrete slab of the driveway which explains why it hasn't done so well. The depth of soil is only a few inches. Out went the idea of roses and in came lavender which copes with the dry soil, not that it has been a dry summer by any reckoning! But something appeared in the flowerbed that I knew I hadn't planted there. It looked like just another weed, but as it grew I was sure it might be something worth keeping.

Over the weeks of rain and some sun it has shot up quickly. I called it the Jack and the Beanstalk as it towers over everything else. When the first bud appeared I knew it was a sunflower. It has a magnificent bloom with several more to come down the stalk. It is the joy of the garden and everyone remarks on it. It has survived pouring rain and heavy winds, standing tall like a sentinel on duty. I hope to have several more next year, this time intentionally planted to make an even greater impact.

What it has taught me is that sometimes the unexpected is much better than anything planned or well-crafted. Chance found a niche where nothing else could flourish and brought forth beauty and joy. Life is by nature tenacious, holding on through the storm waiting for better days. As we approach the 5<sup>th</sup> of September and the longed for next stage in reopening St. John's, we are mindful of all that has been lost, of the best laid plans coming to naught.


But there have also been positive things that were not foreseen that have strengthened us as a congregation. We have come through with a sense of togetherness in spite of lockdown. We've learnt to communicate in new ways using technology in new ways. And still we've been able to care for each other and help those in special need too.

I hope and pray that St. John's will stand again as the sunflower a bold reminder of God's presence at work in this community. Our worship and prayer deeper and more authentic, enriched by the knowledge that we have come through by God's grace. That each one of us may find God calling us by name as we make room at the Lord's Table for all. We did not anticipate what we have been through, but we have held fast and now it's our time to shine again!


### St John's Reading Group September 2021




At our 'zoom' meeting in August we discussed the 'classic' novel by Anthony Trollope entitled 'The Warden', first published in 1855. This novel is the first of the Chronicles of Barsetshire and inspired by a stroll around Salisbury Cathedral. It was quite a sad tale affecting many lives but it was also amusing and satirical in places. It is an interesting reflection on Victorian society, law, the Church and the press. The Warden is

Mr Septimus Harding is the Warden of Hiram's Hospital alms-houses. All is well until the young surgeon, Mr John Bold stirs up a scandal in the press regarding the funding of the alms-houses and Mr Harding is accused of malpractice over his income as the warden. Matters are complicated when Mr Bold has a romantic interest in Eleanor, Mr Harding's daughter. Eleanor persuades Mr Bold to drop the accusations but the damage has been done. An average score of 7/10.

Our choice for the September meeting is the international bestseller 'A Long Petal of the Sea' by Isabel Allende. The young doctor, Victor Dalmau, is forced out of Barcelona at the time of the Spanish Civil War. We learn of the desperate battles with over a million Spanish people losing their lives. Victor flees to Chile with his sister-in-law, Roser and over four generations, a battle ensues between freedom and repression. Isabel Allende was born in Peru but raised in




Chile so her observations will be authentic. Very engrossing story so far.




Looking ahead to October, we have selected 'The Strange Fate of Kitty Easton' by Elizabeth Speller. A former infantryman from WWI, Laurence Bartram, an amateur sleuth, visits the village of Easton Deadall in 1924 and learns about the tragic disappearance of a five-year-old girl in 1911. It has been described as a beautifully written book about loss, love, grief and betrayal. The first book in the series was 'The Return of Captain John Emmett', but

hopefully each book stands on its own.

I have just finished reading the thriller novel 'V2' by Robert Harris — a very good read and very evocative of a very frightening phase of WWII. As with all Robert Harris novels, it is very well researched. If you look up a map of London showing where the V2 rockets landed, it is no wonder that this deadly silent weapon killed so many and destroyed many houses causing great fear as well as homelessness. Definitely one for your reading list.





Inspired by my recent trip to The British Museum's latest exhibition on Thomas à Becket, my next read will be a very dense tome on his life and times by John Guy. Described as 'vivid and extremely readable', I think it will keep me occupied for the rest of the 'summer'.

After all these months of 'zoom' we are hoping to meet 'in person' on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> September, suitably 'masked'. Venue: Church Coffee Lounge. Since March 2020, we have continued to meet 'virtually' and we are very much looking forward to a 'live' session after all these months. #### **Travel News**

#### Standing Room only?

I don't know whether you've picked up on it, but there is currently a consultation in progress about reducing train services on the SWR line from Epsom to Waterloo which includes Worcester Park and Stoneleigh. The link is here:

My view is this is not only poorly timed, because as yet noone knows what the passenger numbers will be post-pandemic, but also takes no account of recent increases in the local population. As far as I can see this is a cost reduction exercise. We're likely to continue standing all the way to Waterloo during the rush hour.

SWR think they will be able to provide services with the same capacity because of the new trains, but these trains, instead of providing seats for most passengers, as any responsible rail company would, mean they will be vertically stacking passengers in order to get them all on board. In other words requiring people to stand all the way as SWR will not be providing sufficient seats. Getting a seat at Worcester Park pre-pandemic was difficult and in future this will not be helped by the reduction in frequency of services both in the rush hour and outside peak times.

It is far too early to estimate what the level of passenger traffic will be in December 2022. There may well be a reduction in expected numbers, but I note the Business Secretary and Chancellor of the Exchequer recently opined that to stand a chance of promotion, people will have to attend their office. Several companies are not going along with staff working from home. Together with the increased numbers of people and houses, this suggests that, despite people wishing to work more from home, rail passenger traffic may well increase on pre-pandemic levels over time.

Apparently this consultation also takes no account of the effect on the environment. If you cut public transport people will continue to use their cars and against COP26 this is hardly a clever move. I have my doubts as to whether a full environmental impact assessment has been carried out.

You might like to write and make your views known. But be quick - this consultation closes in mid-September.

Most counties in England have an annual 'Ride & Stride', on the second Saturday in September, to raise money for church restoration and repair. The idea is that cyclists and walkers are given a list of participating churches in their area. They map out their own route to visit churches by bike or on foot, and then get friends to sponsor them for a fixed amount per church visited.

The money that is collected is divided into two. Half the monies go to the church of the cyclists choice; the other half is retained by the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust for distribution to churches in need (that apply for a grant). In the twenty years that the Ride and Stride has been running in Surrey we have raised over £300,000.

#### **Suggested Routes**

We are compiling a set of suggested routes which riders and walkers might like to consider.

The first route, for seven churches in the centre of Guildford, can be downloaded by clicking this link: <u>Guildford churches</u>

The second route, for eight churches around Wonersh, can be downloaded by clicking this link: Wonersh Cycle

The third route covers 43 churches in <u>mid Surrey</u>. The instructions start at Epsom railway station (although the route may be joined or left at any point). Towns visited include Ashtead, Leatherhead, Great Bookham, Dorking, Tadworth, Banstead, Cheam and Ewell.

The fourth route covers 19 churches through <u>Leatherhead and Cobham</u>. The instructions start at St Mary's Church, Fetcham but the route is circular and can be joined or left at any point. Towns visited include Great Bookham, Effingham, Ockham, Cobham, Stoke d'Abernon and Leatherhead.

The Ride & Stride is a fun way to spend time on a pleasant day in September, whilst at the same time supporting a worthy cause. Why not make up a group and join in this year? 
St John's faces a very difficult financial future as a consequence of the pandemic and has suffered a great loss of income.
