
Message from the Manse...

“The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands.” Psalm 19

I really do enjoy a clear sky and the opportunity to look up to view the moon, planets, stars and galaxies. Recently I've been trying to take some photographs of these various celestial bodies which means I am viewing the scenes in much more detail and the wonderful thing is that the more I look the more I am beginning to see. The more I see the more I am astonished and astounded by the wonder of God's creation in the heavens. It is beautiful and it is vast, so vast in fact that the psalmist's question comes to mind:



“Lord, what are human beings that you care for them, mere mortals that you think of them?” Psalm 144 verse 3

In the midst of the whole created universe physically we are as nothing, yet part of the wonder of our God is that, contrary to what we might imagine, we are everything to Him. Yes we are part of the created order but there is something special about men and women – we are made in the image of God. We are each precious and special in His sight and He longs to be in a loving relationship with us.

In this period running up to Easter we recall together the life, death and resurrection of Jesus and as we do

we gain an insight into something of the depths of our God's longing to restore and re-establish what had been lost. Paul writes

“The Son is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. For in Him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible ...He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together.... He is the beginning and the firstborn from among the dead, so that in everything He might have the supremacy..., and through Him to reconcile to Himself all things, whether things on earth or things in heaven, by making peace through His blood, shed on the cross. Once you were alienated from God and were enemies in your minds because of your evil behaviour. But now He has reconciled you by Christ's physical body through death to present you holy in His sight, without blemish and free from accusation”

1 Colossians 15

What Jesus was willing to do for me (and for you) is awesome. The one who created everything who was also willing to die for us is hard to comprehend but it speaks of a love which is enormous.

I stand looking at the night sky with wonder but more wonderful still is thinking on the God who looks down at me and sees someone worth dying for. I pray that this Easter you will be filled with wonder and that you will be moved to worship. Our God is an awesome God!

STORING UP TREASURE

Here is a new batch of Memory Verses that are worth a place in your already over-crowded brain! They all relate to vital events in Christ's ministry, or the earlier days of the Church.

April: Mark 10 Vs. 45

Here Jesus is on his final journey to Jerusalem, where he will face trial and ultimately death. James and John ask him to promise them the highest places in Glory. Declining this Jesus points out that the standards of the kingdom are not like that, but are built around the service and even sacrifice. He is their leader but he too serves and suffers...

"For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many"

May: Luke 24 Vs. 29 & 31

Here we have the loveliest of all the resurrection accounts. These two men are joined by Jesus as they leave Jerusalem in despair. Not recognising him, they travel all day in his company and as they arrive at their destination they invite him to stay with them. Only then does he disclose his true identity as their risen Lord...

"But they urged him strongly, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening: the day is almost over," so he went in to stay with them."

Vs. 31 "Then their eyes were opened and they recognised him."

June: Acts 2 Vs. 39

After the sorrow of seeing Jesus die, the early Church is dispirited and lost. However, they discover he is alive and they are told to wait for the promise. Then on the Day of Pentecost it happens. The Holy Spirit falls on them and they are wonderfully transformed and with great courage, Peter, their leader, begins to preach the truth of Christ. Amazingly, Peter can tell those who want to join them that the same gift of the Spirit is also for them.

"The promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off - for all whom the Lord our God shall call,"

We invite you to take one of these and work through these passages at your own speed. If you would like more help there is a bigger more detailed book that has additional notes giving explanations and outlining the selection process which led to these particular passages being chosen. If you ask the person on duty they will make sure you get what you need.

BIBLE HELPS

We also have a booklet produced by the Gideons, which has a very useful list of references to help you find appropriate passages you can refer to when you are facing any of the big decisions in life or when you are facing real problems or indeed when you have special reasons for giving thanks.

These Bible helps have proved to be just that for many thousands of people over the years and we want to let you have access to them believing that they could be helpful in your life and faith too. Please take one if you think it would be useful to you.

THE PRAYER CORNER AT WORK

Finally to remind you that you can either fill in one of the Prayer Cards and place it in the box by the Prayer Corner (In total confidence) or you can gather there at the close of the service where you can take a moment to pray without anyone noticing. 

The Story behind the Hymn *All Things Bright and Beautiful*



The words to this hymn were written by Mrs. Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-1895), the wife of William Alexander, the Anglican Bishop of Ireland.

Mrs. Alexander was a prolific author, and a number of her books and writings were published during her lifetime.

She was inspired to write this hymn when trying, with difficulty, to teach a group of children the meaning of the Apostles' Creed. When traditional teaching methods failed, she decided to write a series of hymns based on various phrases of the creed. She based this hymn on the phrase, "I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth." It was those last words, "maker of heaven and earth," that particularly inspired her. The hymn celebrates "Each little flower that opens" and "Each little bird that sings." It speaks of "glowing colours" and "tiny wings." But, most of all, it affirms that "The Lord God made them all."



Mrs. Alexander wrote other hymns to illustrate other phrases of the Apostles' Creed. They include "Once in Royal David's City" — "There Is a Green Hill Far Away" — and "He Is Coming! He Is Coming!" She thought of these as children's hymns, and published them in a collection of hymns entitled *Hymns for Little Children*



in 1848. It was a fabulously successful hymnal that went through nearly seventy editions during her lifetime and one hundred editions altogether.

Mrs. Alexander was quite generous with her time and money. She donated the profits from *Hymns for Little Children* to a school for the deaf.

She was active in a ministry to unwed mothers, and was also instrumental in establishing a nursing service in her area.



While this hymn maintained its popularity through the years, it received a big boost when the English veterinarian, James Herriot, at the suggestion of his young daughter, named his first book, *All Creatures Great and Small*, after a phrase from the first verse of this hymn. He subsequently wrote three additional books that he named after the other three lines of the first verse of this hymn — *All Things Bright and Beautiful* — *All Things Wise and Wonderful* — and *The Lord God Made Them All*. His books became quite popular, and inspired a movie as well as a long-running television series. The piece can be sung to several melodies, in particular the 17th-century English melody "Royal Oak", adapted by [Martin Shaw](#), and "All Things Bright and Beautiful" by [William Henry Monk](#). There have also been other adaptations, such as a full choral piece by [John Rutter](#). In earlier editions of the Church of Scotland's Church Hymnary, the tunes "God in Nature" by John Stainer and "All Things Bright" by Frederick Arthur Gore Ouseley had been used.

We were on the bus from Whangarei (pronounced Fun-ga- ray in Maori) where my daughter lives, to Auckland and the plane home. This lady, of mature age, joined us at our tea table during our comfort stop. Two or three sentences were all it needed for us to realise that we all knew Kilsyth and Christine Johnston! She had stayed at Christine's house for one year on a Teacher Exchange Programme many years ago. Well this time we went to visit her. It was an Irish visit - unannounced; we simply drove sixty miles hoping she would be at home in Keri Keri. She was in and she was really pleased to see us. While Liz chatted to her I was able to do some work out in her garden cutting the roots of a tree. She lives in a lovely little bungalow within walking distance of the wee town. We all enjoyed the visit. When we had tea together she produced some Anderson mugs which she been given during her stay and was still using. You can see the Church on the mugs in the picture.



Dorothy sends her regards. She is very involved in the Episcopal Church in Keri Keri (and the whole of New Zealand in the past). She had the other one sent to her (we think) by Charlie and Margaret Waddell who, with others in the congregation, keep in touch with her. She showed it to

If you wish to donate, items can be left in the vestibule of the church on a Sunday or at the Drop-in on a Friday.



After hearing about this quilt one night at the Guild, I thought I would share it with you

COLOURFUL STORY: The Kilsyth Historic Quilt has been a labour of love for heritage lovers at Garrell Vale, and now there's a poem to explain just what all those pictures and symbols mean



KILSYTH QUILT *By Anne Russell and the Optimists Group*

This quilt was made in Garrell Vale for a "Journey of Discovery".
Contained within it are some scenes denoting part of our history.
It starts in the centre with "The Optimists" and a golden crown.

This is part of the Coat of Arms pertaining to our town.

The material that surrounds it, Kilsyth Tartan as it's shown,
Was donated by Willie Chalmers, the creator, who's well known,
Gazing at the corners, these symbols, if you look,

Crossed swords and miners lamp, shuttles and the open book.

In section one, the "Garrell Glen" runs down from Kilsyth Hills,

Where many of us picnicked when we were boys and girls,

In two we have the "Banton Loch" where many men were killed,

The site of Kilsyth Battle before it was infilled.

In three we see "The Curlers" play their game upon the ice,

This represents the fact that Curling started in Kilsyth,

In four, the Romans left their mark ay Croy and Twechar hills,

With remains of the fort, well and wall at Castlehill and Barrhill.

In five there is a "Miner" coming off his shift at daybreak,

After digging underground all night, whilst his bones and body ached,

In six, there are the walled gardens and a pond within "Colzium Estate",

Where once there stood a castle, reputed to be great.

In seven we have "The Bandstand" in our town centre for all to see,

This renewed place of beauty was once known as "bleaching greens",

In eight, we recollect, the Miners and Weavers Rows,

With outside wash houses and toilets, not so long ago.

In nine, there's agriculture and the Farms all round about,

How many of us 'howked tatties' to spin the money out?

In ten, we have the Canal where once sailed the Gypsy Queen,

Also the place for transporting goods before roads and trains.

In eleven, "The Churches the Gither", where each can congregate,

To worship God Almighty in whichever way they may,




