Meanwhile the members of the Guild wish you a Blessed Christmas and a Happy New Year.



Festive Stuffing Recipe

As an alternative to the usual sage and onion, we invite readers to try a new stuffing recipe for their Christmas menu. This was found in Lady Claire MacDonald's book, but the amounts have been halved as it looked like creating a mountain!

Ingredients

1 lb (450g) fresh white breadcrumbs
½ lb (225g) shredded suet
2 oz (50g) butter
1 large onion peeled & finely chopped
1 or 2 cloves garlic
Grated rind and juice of a lemon
2 eggs, beaten
2 rounded tablespoons of finely chopped parsley
Salt and pepper.



Mix the breadcrumbs and suet in a bowl.

Melt the butter and cook the onions & garlic in it gently until they're translucent and soft. Allow to cool.

Add to the breadcrumb mix in the bowl stir in all the other ingredients.

Do not be tempted to add more egg if the mixture seems dry, this will make the stuffing stodgy. When completely cool pack in a bag and freeze until required for stuffing the bird.

You can vary the amounts to your own requirements – just remember you need twice the quantity of breadcrumbs to suet.

Remembrance Sunday

The Warm Home Discount is a yearly payment of £150 to support with the cost of heating your home over the winter. It was introduced by the government to provide additional support to eligible customers living on low incomes or pensions.

There are two main groups that are eligible for the Warm Home Discount in Scotland:

1. Households receiving the Guarantee Credit element of Pension Credit: If you or your partner receive the Guarantee Credit element of Pension Credit, the Department for Work and Pensions should have written to you in November 2023 to confirm that you are eligible for the scheme. You will automatically receive the Warm Homes Discount via your energy bill, or if you have a pre-payment meter, you will be sent a voucher to redeem at your local Post Office branch.
2. Households receiving certain benefit combinations: Customers living in Scotland who do not qualify for the Core Group¹, but who receive one of the following benefit combinations, will need to apply via Good Energy to receive the Warm Homes Discount.

Income support

Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (IRESA)

Income based Job Seekers' Allowance

Universal Credit and have earned income less than £1,418 in at least one month since 1st October 2021

Housing benefit

Gross taxable annual household Income* of less than £17,005

Is in the receipt of a disabled child premium

WWF Tips for Sustainable Christmas Shopping

Remove packaging: Reduce waste by buying gifts with little or no packaging. Sometimes shopping locally can help with this, especially if you have a local refill shop. If you must use packaging, use recycled, or recyclable, materials. Choose sustainable gifts made from recycled or FSC-certified materials, avoid single-use plastics, and consider Fairtrade, Organic-certified, or second-hand options like vintage clothes, home furnishings, and refurbished technology.

Eat seasonally: Make your shopping basket more sustainable by buying seasonal products, locally produced where possible. Doing so reduces the energy spent growing foods out of season or flying food to the UK. Support UK farmers by eating fruit and vegetables that are in season.

Make your own decorations: Save yourself some money by upcycling old decorations. Or make your own using spare material around the house, like turning old paper into paperchains (remember them?!)

Shop small Buy from small businesses and ethical brands rather than retail giants.

Think before you buy: Waste increases by 25% between Black Friday and the New Year, and some of this waste comes from unused/unwanted items.
