
Harvest festivals are traditionally held on or near the Sunday of the Harvest Moon. This is the full Moon that occurs closest to the autumn equinox (about Sept. 23). In two years out of three, the Harvest Moon comes in September, but in some years it occurs in October.

#### What are Harvest Festivals?

Harvest Festivals are celebrations of the food grown on the land.

Thanksgiving ceremonies and celebrations for a successful harvest are both worldwide and very ancient. In Britain, we have given thanks for successful harvests since pagan times. We celebrate this day by singing, praying and decorating our churches with baskets of fruit and food in a festival known as 'Harvest Festival'.

This year's Harvest Thanksgiving services supported the work of the local foodbanks and were held outside.

Each season brings something new for us to see and enjoy,


With sunny days and rainy days, our crops grow larger,

### Remembrance Day.....

Remembrance Day is an occasion of national significance, but many parents believe that its adult themes of sacrifice and death aren't appropriate to share with young children. However by helping primary school-aged children to understand why the nation comes to a halt at 11am to remember the war dead – and, from this year, victims of terrorism, too – we can safeguard its future.

Explain that more than 100 years ago, a war began that was the biggest the world had ever seen. Millions of soldiers had to go and fight for their country to make sure that their country and their families were safe. Many, many of these soldiers died. It is these soldiers we remember on Remembrance Day, as well as soldiers from other wars, such as World War 2, the Falklands and Iraq. Most soldiers didn't want to go to war, but they did so because they wanted to fight for what they believed was right. This is called a sacrifice. We remember them to say thank you for what they did.

It wasn't just trained soldiers who went to war, but ordinary men: brothers, sons and fathers. Remembrance Sunday also commemorates civilians who died, too.

Do you know where the war memorial is in the town or village that you live in?

There maybe names on it of the people from that area who died in the First or Second World Wars.

They then dip the bottom of the bottle into the paint and print it onto a piece of paper. Create a poppy picture, or alternatively try putting the poppies in a circle to create a poppy wreath. Children can paint the black centre of each poppy, as well as the green leaves.

Or ask a grown up to cut the bottom off the bottle and then paint it red to make a 3D poppy

Door to door selling of poppies is not allowed this year but there are lots of ways to donate, buy your poppies by post of download a poppy at



Download a poppy to colour and put it in your window to show your support.






This poppy picture was made from thumbprints, why not have a go?

Poppy poppy what do you say? Wear me on Remembrance Day.


Poppy poppy what do you tell? Many soldiers in battle fell.
