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## READING Psalm 46

God is our shelter and strength, always ready to help in times of trouble. (So we will not be afraid, even if the earth is shaken and mountains fall into the ocean depths; even if the seas roar and rage, and the hills are shaken by the violence). There is a river that brings joy to the city of God, to the sacred house of the Most High. God is in that city, and it will never be destroyed; at early dawn he will come to its aid. Nations are terrified, kingdoms are shaken; God thunders, and the earth dissolves. The LORD Almighty is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge. Come and see what the LORD has done. See what amazing things he has done on earth. He stops wars all over the world; he breaks bows, destroys spears, and sets shields on fire. *"Stop fighting,"* he says, *"and know that I am God, supreme among the nations, supreme over the world."* The LORD Almighty is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge.

## READING 1 John 3 v11-24 (GNB)

The message you heard from the very beginning is this: we must love one another. We must not be like Cain; he belonged to the Evil One and murdered his own brother Abel. Why did Cain murder him? Because the things he himself did were wrong, and the things his brother did were right. So do not be surprised, my friends, if the people of the world hate you. We know that we have left death and come over into life; we know it because we love others. Those who do not love are still under the power of death. Those who hate others are murderers, and you know that murderers do not have eternal life in them. This is how we know what love is: Christ gave his life for us. We too, then, ought to give our lives for others! If we are rich and see others in need, yet close our hearts against them, how can we claim that we love God? My children, our love should not be just words and talk; it must be true love, which shows itself in action. This, then, is how we will know that we belong to the truth; this is how we will be confident in God's presence. If our conscience condemns us, we know that God is greater than our conscience and that he knows everything. And so, my dear friends, if our conscience does not condemn us, we have courage in God's presence. We receive from him whatever we ask, because we obey his commands and do what pleases him. What he commands is that we believe in his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as Christ commanded us. Those who obey God's commands live in union with God and God lives in union with them. And because of the Spirit that God has given us we know that God lives in union with us. *Thanks be to God*

## REFLECTION

Over time, individual words tend to get devalued: they become less powerful and meaningful than they were originally intended to be. Take the word *'naughty'*, for example. At one time, if you were told that you were *'noughty'*, you were being told that you were a *'nought'* – a *'nothing'*; someone of no account. Over the years it's just come to mean that you're being mischievous.

Then there's the word *'literally'*. I grew up understanding that *'literally'* meant that the words being used were to be taken at face value. Nowadays it's most often used just to emphasise what's being said.

It seems to me that the same process has been applied to the word *'love'*. We tend to use it willy-nilly to express how committed we are to something. I really do feel, though, that advertisers are being a bit offensive when they tell me that the TV company they're advertising will provide *'The channels you love'*. As far as I'm concerned, TV channels are just pieces of technology to use or ignore, like the laptop or the phone. I have NO emotional attachment to them at all.

So, if that's what the word *'love'* has come to, where does that leave *Christian love*? Is it in the same category as a TV channel – something you can just turn off and on as the fancy takes you?

Mind you, it has to be admitted that *'love'* is incredibly difficult to define. For one thing, my own understanding of what love is has changed from the days of my youth, mainly because of the kaleidoscope of ways I've seen it expressed over the years.

The situation is complicated no end, though, by the fact that English has just the one word to express a whole myriad of thoughts and feelings. The Greeks, on the other hand, had three words. The one the New Testament writers use to talk of Christian love – *agape* – essentially meant having good relationships with other people. Christians expanded that to talk about people having good relationships with God.

Now we're getting into deep waters, thinking about what good, loving relationships with people and God really looks like. St Paul, in the 13 chapter of his first letter to the Christians in Corinth, has a pretty good stab at describing it. Even then, a fair bit of his description tells us what love *isn't* rather than what it *is*. He says

that it isn't jealous or conceited or proud; it's not ill-mannered or selfish or irritable; it doesn't keep a record of wrongs; and it's not happy with evil.

We'll never fully define the meaning of Christian love. The word itself is too complex and, more to the point, our journey of discovery of all that it means will last a lifetime - in this world and the next. All we can do here is to explore a little more, through the eyes of John's letter, one or two things love may mean for us in our Christian lives.

For one thing, John does here what Paul does in his letter: he compares what love *is* with what love *isn't*. he says: (15) *Those who hate others are murderers, and you know that murderers do not have eternal life in them.* That sounds more than a little harsh, but it's an echo of an image Jesus uses when he talks about adultery. Jesus says: Matthew 5 v27-28 *"You have heard that it was said, 'Do not commit adultery.' But now I tell you: anyone who looks at a woman and wants to possess her is guilty of committing adultery with her in his heart.* In other words: if you want to judge others because of what you see *them doing* – then you need to judge *yourself* for what you're *thinking* of doing.

You may say that you're full of Christian love but then hate or detest or reject other people. As John graphically puts it, you're murdering them in your hearts. Since it's all tied up in your feelings of anger and hurt, what can you do about it? Obviously, as a Christian, you can feel guilty about it, but that doesn't take your anger and hatred away. We need to keep on asking God's forgiveness for our guilt. We need to confront our own feelings and place them in the hands of Christ. We need to try to find ways of being reconciled with anyone we hate. And, finally, we need to let go of that anger and forgive ourselves as God forgives us. It may take a very long time to deal with that hatred and for us to find that freedom of forgiveness but, until we do, our claims to be *filled* with the love of God are holed.

I say that because of what else John says: (14) *We know that we have left death and come over into life; we know it because we love others.* In Christ, love and new life belong together. If we truly have Christ's love and new life within us then we'll show it in the way we love everyone, everywhere, no matter how difficult we may find some people and however much we feel hurt by them.

John roots it all in the death of Christ himself. Did he hate Pilate or Herod? Does he hate us because we make such a mess of things? Does he reject us because of the way we treat him? Sometimes the way we behave makes it seem as if it's *us* at the foot of the cross when he looks down and says to us; *'Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do.'* With that image in our minds, it's not surprising that John says: (16) *'This is how we know what love is: Christ gave his life for us.'*

We'll never define the meaning of love in words. The only *complete* definition of love is Christ's self-sacrifice to forgive us and set us free.

If we know nothing else that God's love demands of us, we do know this: that he calls us to do two things. The first is to face up to, and deal with, our hatred, anger, resentment and rejection of other people: to lay it all at his feet and receive his forgiveness. The second is to demonstrate to ourselves and the world that, as John puts it, *'we have left death and come over into life; we know it because we love others'.*
