

Role description for Messy Church Youth Volunteer

"Messy Church is a form of church for children and adults that involves creativity, celebration and hospitality"

Role: To provide an opportunity for friendship, fellowship, worship, a first encounter with God, spiritual nurture and growth, for those who are outside and inside the church; and with a particular focus on children and families.

Role Requirements:

To be:

To be a person of prayer and worship, called by God and approved by All Saints church, who leads in a gracious, Christ-like manner; and who treats each member of the Messy Church community with respect and dignity, as a unique individual created in the image of God.

To do any/all of the following (by agreement with the Messy Church co-ordinator):

- To help to lead services which have been agreed by the Messy Church planning team, and approved by the incumbent
- To support the worship via teaching, prayer, music and action
- To lead activities/games related to the theme for the event
- To offer hospitality via a meal
- To play a part in preparation for and clearing away after the event

To do all of the following:

- To receive appropriate support and supervision from the Messy Church co-ordinator
- To attend an initial meeting with the Messy Church co-ordinator to plan volunteering and a follow-up meeting after volunteering period
- To attend Messy Church planning meetings under the leadership of the Messy Church co-ordinator
- To read and adhere to all aspects of the All Saints Safeguarding Policy (<u>www.cofeguildford.org.uk/safeguardingpolicy</u>), including recruitment and training requirements; and all other Policies of All Saints Church
