A Councillor's Comments

There were two people who took up the slot for public comment time at our January meeting. Janet Metcalf spoke of the number of leaves still left on the paths and also the water and mud around the rear entrance gate at the Weatherall's school and felt that someone should make sure the gullies are cleared out. Ken Cranfield spoke about a proposed Soham Market, but there was no clear information to the public and no consultation with the council.

County and District Council reports: Councillor Hunt gave an account of updates on various projects on behalf of the County; Neighbourhood Cares, with its pilot schemes already operating at the Soham Library and at St Ives, this will later be managed by the county, caring for the needs of people over 18. He mentioned the Ely By-pass which has been delayed but should be completed late summer this year. The removal of the County Archives from Shire Hall to the Strikes site in Ely is going ahead but this is a careful process and could take two years, and this new site will include a Registration Office. The improvement of the A14 is on track. The District councillor spoke of their efforts to establish a day centre for Soham, the refurbishment of the old mill in Spencer's drove, which should be great. They are also looking to provide a sports and leisure facility for the town.

Precept: In the light of the number of ongoing projects and new projects likely in the near future for the benefit of the town, it was decided to raise the precept by 3.5%.

Commons Management: A meeting has been held and proposals made which were put before the council for us to decide upon. The aim is to form a management committee with representatives from all interested parties so that the commons will be maintained to an accepted standard. The commons are an important feature of our town and need to be protected.

Eastern Gateway: No movement on this apart from an archaeological dig from 8th January to 16th February. It is not expected to cause any disturbance to neighbouring properties.

Ambulance Station: This too is at a halt but steps are being taken to move the position on. *Councillor Ginn*

Soham Eastern Gateway

As you may be aware, a planning application for the Soham Eastern Gateway was previously submitted by the County Council in June 2017 and subsequently withdrawn in November 2017 following a number of objections. Development company, This Land TM, will be working on developing the Eastern Gateway area, with an aim to submit a planning application to East Cambridgeshire District Council by May 2018.

Soham Eastern Gateway is located to the east of Weatheralls Primary School, between the town and the A142 bypass, and between the two commons (Qua Fen Common and East Fen Common). It covers approximately 33 hectares.

The area has been identified as an area for development in the 2010 Soham Vision and in the 2015 East Cambridgeshire Local Plan. The masterplan will be planned according to policy outlined in the Local Plan 2015, and it will provide around 550 dwellings, including affordable housing, as well as a local shop, a new GP surgery and open public space available for all Soham residents.

A View from the Vicarage

Love on the Rocks

Last month's Lodestar introduced us (or introduced me, at least) to the Kindness Project's national rock-painting – and



rock-leaving – initiative. Thanks to those many members of our community who have run with this locally, I've enjoyed spotting painted stones around Soham ever since. I've also loved seeing the delight on children's faces as they've found them. There's often a stone by St Andrew's Church door and/or in a niche in the building (please do drop by and have a hunt...).

I imagine it's a co-incidence that most of Soham's rocks have appeared during Lent, but maybe there's a sermon in it ... Rocks often get a mention in the Bible: much of the Holy Land is an arid place; rocks are part of the landscape. On the first Sunday of Lent, we heard the story of Jesus' temptations in the wilderness: 'If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread'. That's Temptation Number One (cf. Matt. 4:3). And Number Two? That comes when Jesus has been led up to the pinnacle of the temple: 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down: for it is written, "He will command his angels concerning you", and "On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone" (Matt. 4: 6). Stones can be frightening things. Few of us like a rocky road.

Back in the Old Testament, when God's people are themselves in the wilderness, another rock features large. God's people are in the midst of their 40-year exodus. Just like Jesus, they're hungry (Matthew says Jesus was 'famished'); food and water are scarce. Unlike Jesus, God's people complain. They lash out at Moses and Aaron: 'Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to this wretched place? ... There is no water to drink'. And what does Moses do? He takes Aaron to one side, away from their detractors and falls on his face before God. Once he's got up, he does what God has told him to do: he takes his staff and hits a rock with it. Water pours out, and God's people and their animals drink (Numbers 20: 1-13). Hundreds of years later, Paul refers back to that story when he writes to the Christians in Corinth. Don't be like God's people back then, he tells them – don't be whingers, don't be idolators, don't put God to the test. And Paul has a punchline: 'the rock was Christ' (1 Cor. 10: 4).

What a thought. Christ who stayed faithful in the wilderness, Christ who lived his own exodus, Christ who rose again from a rock-hewn tomb is himself the rock. Christ is the cornerstone – the living stone – the stone that the builders rejected (1 Peter 2: 4-7); Christ is the rock and the fount of living water: 'Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, and let the one who believes in me drink', he cries in John's Gospel (John 7: 37&38). Love on the rocks is Love from the rocks; Love is The Rock...

Whatever the faith of those who leave them, simple painted pebbles might just be his sign. *Eleanor*
