#### Soham Remembers: Thank you

In November a number of events were held to mark the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War.

A major part of this was an exhibition in the church of more than 7000 knitted poppies, flower arrangements, painted rocks and details of all the men who are commemorated on the WW1 part of the Soham War Memorial. SVC pupils provided a very moving video inspired by their trip to the battlefields of the Western Front and St Andrew's pupils brought paper poppies when they came with their teachers to learn about the war. People of all ages came to look around the exhibition, some returning to bring friends and family. Many tears were shed for the young men who had died.

There were also well attended concerts by Soham Comrades Brass Band and St Andrew's year 6 pupils. The week ended with the Remembrance Day parade and service followed in the evening by the lighting of a beacon and bell ringing.



Thank you first to Carol Weyman, Susan Taylor and Linda Palmer (pictured with the Bishop of Ely). Carol had the idea of decorating the church with poppies and coordinated the knitting as well as being present in church for the whole week selling poppies and chatting to visitors. Susan and Linda co-ordinated the flower arranging and refreshments.

Thank you too to all who knitted poppies, arranged flowers, served refreshments, baked cakes, welcomed visitors, rang the bells,

and worked behind the scenes. And thank you to all the organisations who took part: Knit and Knatter, the Royal British Legion, the local schools, Soham Rocks, Ely Air Cadets (for lending us the perspex silhouettes), Soham Comrades Band, Soham Town Council, Soham Heritage & Tourism and the town's uniformed organisations who marched in the parade.

Over £2000 was raised by the exhibition and concert, to be shared between church and the RBL Poppy Appeal and the events brought the community of Soham together in a moving and fitting tribute to the men who lost their lives.


### **Co-op Community Fund**

#### **Carols Galore**

There is, of course, plenty of carol singing planned for December. St Andrews' Candlelit Carol service is a traditional service of readings and carols.

Soham Community Carols is a less formal singalong to popular carols led by Soham Comrades Band. We will also be visiting the local care and nursing homes to sing carols to the residents.



At our November meeting two people used the 15 minutes open for Public Comment Time. Mr. Ken Cranfield spoke about the respect councillors must show to others when addressing an issue, and quoted from the standard that is given to all councillors. Mr. Duff raised the question of affordable houses and the difficulty of most people to be able to afford them. He had prepared a written case for his point, which he handed over to the clerk. In the answers given in response it was pointed out that the answer could lie with the Community Land Trust. A scheme whereby a local trust is able to provide homes for local people at a reasonable cost. We have our own local trust called Thrift who have already built some down the Shade, and hope to extend this provision. The important thing about these homes is that they remain in the control of the community for all time, and remain available for local people.

Development and Sewerage Capacity: The question was brought up yet again about this problem of continued development going on at pace, and the capacity to cope with the sewerage. The district council are keen to pass plans for more houses, but have they got the assurance from Anglia Water that they have the present capacity to cope? In the light of this problem a meeting has been arranged for all parties involved to seek an answer.

Future Cemetery Provision: The time has come when we need to plan for future cemetery provision. We are running out of space, and although we still have some years left we need to seek new land for the future. So a meeting had been arranged with the councillors involved to meet with an authority to plan for this.

Financial Support: This was granted to Air Ambulance; and also to Churches Together for the cost of PA system for their Community Carols to be held in the Churchyard on the 20th December at 6.30.pm. *Councillor Ginn*

#### **News from Wicken Fen**

We're starting to experience some lovely crisp, frosty mornings here at Wicken Fen, and more of our overwintering birds are starting to return. We've had several reports of short-eared owls over on Burwell Fen, so those of you who like to walk in this area may want to take some binoculars with you to see these beautiful birds.



There is a new West Mere hide that has recently been installed and is well worth a visit. It is in a better position to see more of the mere area, and is elevated to offer a fantastic view. Even if you are not a keen bird watcher, it's a lovely place to stop off to soak up the peace and tranquillity of the fen.

By the time you read this article the construction of a temporary viewing platform on the edge of the Sedge Fen should be complete. This platform is part of our Resting the Sedge Fen project, and will allow us

to rest delicate peat soils in this area, while offering visitors spectacular 360° views. We're hoping to build a permanent structure in due course.

December's festive activity for under 5's is part of our Father Christmas at the Fen season: follow a Christmas trail, visit Father Christmas in Fen Cottage and do some festive crafts with our elves. These activities take place on Wednesday, 12<sup>th</sup> and Thursday, 13<sup>th</sup> December from 10:30-12:00, and the cost is £10 per child (normal admission applies for accompanying adults, NT members free). Join one of the rangers on a walk into the reserve, where you will be able to spot winter wildlife, and learn about our grazing herds and how they contribute to the fen landscape. It's the perfect way to

A View from the Vicarage

#### Hark the Herald

Say you've heard or seen an angel, and you'll probably end up down the Medical Centre - or being escorted to the

manse/vicarage. In the Bible stories we hear in the run up to Christmas, however, angels pop up all the time. Their presence provokes fear, but not accusations of insanity. Angels in the Bible are heralds (the word 'angel' comes from the Greek for 'messenger'). They act as runners between God and humankind.



William Blake, artist and poet, saw angels all his life. Born in 1757, his first vision came when he was about 8. He told his mum he'd seen a tree filled with angels 'bespangling every bough like stars'. She gave him a good thrashing - but she didn't succeed in beating out the visions. In his mid-40s, living at Felpham on the Sussex coast, Blake saw angels descending on a ladder from heaven to his cottage. He painted what he saw, mused on the connection between earth and heaven, and sat down to write 'Jerusalem': 'And did those feet in ancient time, walk upon England's mountains green?

And was the holy Lamb of God, on England's pleasant pastures seen?'. Since I've been here in Soham, I've been struck by how often 'Jerusalem' is chosen as a hymn for weddings and funerals. One groom-to-be told me he'd picked it 'because of

the cricket', but I think for many of us (and perhaps for him and his now wife, too) it's about more than that. 'Jerusalem' encapsulates an experience or an inkling we can't quite define. The Bible sums it up as 'God with us'.



And if that's all a bit deep, here's the counterbalance from Churches Together: thanks to the brainwave of Rev. Colin Watkins, distributors from Soham Rocks and knitters in and around Soham who wouldn't hear of stopping at over 7000 poppies (wasn't the exhibition just MARVELLOUS? Thank you so much to all who made it happen, and to all who came along and supported it), angels will soon be appearing on a street near you. Keep your eyes open, and if you come across one, either adopt it or help it fly elsewhere. He/she (it's hard to tell with angels...) will be there to spread the glad tidings of this year's Community Carols event (Thursday 20 December, 6.30pm in St Andrew's Churchyard – or in church if it's wet – accompanied by Soham Comrades Band), and, we hope, to spread a bit of festive cheer more generally. 'Bespangling every bough like stars' they might not be – not quite, and not this year, anyway – but from tiny acorns oak trees grow. Who knows what might happen in 2019? God is with us and amongst us.
