#### St Andrew's Wild Weekend





#### **News from Wicken Fen**

Our Nature Trail opens on 1st June, when the fen will be full of lush green foliage and fen flowers. It's a lovely summer walk of 2½ mi. around the ancient Sedge Fen, where you'll also have the chance to see butterflies and dragonflies on the wing. Look out for marsh



orchids, ragged robin, yellow loosestrife and marsh thistle amongst the foliage.

We're still enjoying hearing the male and female cuckoos on the reserve. The male gives the distinctive 'cu-ckoo' call that we all know and love, but you may not have heard the females bubbling call. Listen out next time you are out walking at Wicken Fen. It's great to be able to hear and see these birds when their numbers are declining, and your support helps us maintain their habitats.

Now that we're feeling the warmth of the sun more often, we can really enjoy the outdoors and being closer to nature. Join us for a boat trip along the Wicken Lode if you enjoy a leisurely summer outing, or bring your bike (or hire one from our Cycle Centre) if active exploration is your thing! It's worth calling to book your boat trip at busy times (weekends and school holidays), telephone 01353 720274. Boat trips and cycle hire are available every day until the end of October.

Our programme of adult events continues with **An evening with Tony Juniper** on Friday 14 June 19:30-21:30. Join us for a lively look at the future of conservation in the UK, and how the Wicken Fen Vision is contributing to the way forward, with the newly appointed Natural England chair. There have been a few changes however. Soham Town Council has seen four of its long term members retire, George Ginn, Christopher Palmer, Geoffrey Fisher and Tony Hinsley. Whereas East Cambs District Council has seen two new councillors elected for Soham North. They are Victoria Charlesworth and Alec Jones. Ian Bovingdon and Daniel Schumann retained Soham South.

Other changes have been made within Soham Town Council. Rosemary Aitchison has ended her term as Chairwoman and everyone's gratitude was expressed by a round of generous applause from the public and councillors alike. Her successor is Charles Warner who was the incumbent Vice Chairman to Rosemary. Councillor Elizabeth Johnston is now Vice Chairwoman, and her previous chairmanship of the Community Amenities sub committee, is now ably filled by Councillor David Woricker. The final change is to the chairmanship of the Cemetery and Allotments sub committee, which is now under Councillor Glenn Dyer. ## A View from the Vicarage

#### 2 June 1944

As we commemorate the 75th anniversary of the Soham train explosion, my words seem crass beside those I have read



from that time. The following is an extract from a report in the Newmarket Journal, published on 9 June 1944 and passed to me by George Ginn. The full text will be read at a commemorative Communion service at St Andrew's at 10 am on Sunday 2 June

In a quiet Cambridgeshire town last week I stood amid scenes reminiscent of the London blitz. At 1.45 am an ammunition train was passing through the station when the driver and fireman noticed the following wagon was ablaze. Without hesitation, and heedless of the risk to themselves they uncoupled the rest of the train and began to drive into a siding. They reached a point almost opposite the signalbox when the bombs exploded. The engine was reduced to scrap metal, and where the wagon had stood appeared a crater 40' deep and 100' across. The station and buildings were reduced to rubble, and the track was completely blocked.

The body of the fireman, Mr J Nightall of Littleport was recovered from the wreckage. The driver, Mr Benjamin Gimbert was flung 200 yds and was rushed to hospital with serious injuries. The signalman of the station, Mr Frank Charles Copland Bridges was taken to hospital from the shell of his cabin. He died later in the morning. Others injured and taken to hospital were Mr and Mrs Fuller (who were caught in their collapsing home), Mr Harry George Oliver (station master), Mrs Constance Graham and Mrs Arthur Hobbs.

As daylight came upon the scene the full extent of the damage was revealed. Breakdown gangs and squads of American soldiers toiled amid a sea of bricks and rubble – all that remained of the station. Home guards stood on duty, keeping back crowds of onlookers and dazed local residents. Fields and meadows around and the streets of the town were littered with rubble and shrapnel; in a field nearby, cows and horses grazed unconcernedly, picking their way through the masonry. Firemen who arrived at the scene in darkness met an eerie sight: flames leapt from a nearby gas works throwing dancing shadows on piles of wreckage and gaping roofs. A cottage beside the station stood still – but only just. Gaping holes in the walls revealed a recently deserted interior: sheets had been flung back from a bed, and the dining room clock still ticked on the mantle shelf. At the local parish church I found pews littered with glass and plaster. The licensee of the Railway Hotel told me, 'It was the most terrible thing in my life'. I saw a little fellow who had spent the night with his grandmother. His head was bandaged, but he said he felt nothing until he awoke to find his shirt drenched in blood. The regional Commissioner Sir Will Spence was early on the scene, amid mobile canteens, army vehicles, and people working among the wreckage. Local firms whose offices had become uninhabitable were shifting typewriters and papers to new quarters. The Grammar School and public hall were open as rest centres. The Chairman of the local Council said, 'I have not heard one grouse. The people stood up to their ordeal well. We will be able to find new billets for them all.'

Later that evening I sat in a homely little parlour in Littleport talking to the mother of the hero who would never again come whistling up the garden path. Fireman Nightall was 22 and an only child. His mother told me that at 6 o'clock the previous evening he was at home chopping wood for her. 'He was always ready with a joke,' she said. 'He was not one of the best in my eyes, he was the best. He was a brave lad and I am grateful he gave his life in saving others.'

... Interviewed on Sunday in a Cambridgeshire hospital, the injured driver, whose home is March paid a high tribute to his mate and to the signalman and told how, looking along the train, as all drivers should, to check things, he saw flames coming from the bottom of the first bomb truck. He never thought so quick before, he said... All that concerned Gimbert when interviewed was not his own injuries, but the position of the widow and family of the signalman and the mother of the fireman...

The Council are to purchase two crosses in remembrance of the heroes, and a tablet is to be placed in the church in their honour.
