#### St Andrew's Church Services

As most of you know already, I hope, St Andrew's Church services are all back on at the usual times. We've recently added Morning Prayer to the list of regular services. It's short, and includes psalms, readings and formal prayers. It takes place in the chancel Tuesday – Friday at 9am and is always over by 9.20. If you'd like to join me and Hannah, please do. We sit in silence until it's time to start: a peaceful way to begin (or continue) the day.

Less peacefully, I suspect, but equally joyfully, our children and young people are preparing an on-line pet service, helped, where necessary, by Hannah. The service should appear on YouTube and Facebook sometime on Sunday 6 September. If you've got the technology, do tune in! This photo of Pippa and her pony gives a flavour of what's in store ...



Also designed for children and young people, Hannah and I are recording weekly children's activities and Bible stories designed to run in parallel with the 10am Sunday service. These go up on YouTube and

Facebook on the Friday before the Sunday, and – for the moment – are as close as we can get to Sunday School (school assemblies will appear from mid-September as well). Children are more than welcome to come to church, of course, but with all the toys and books put away and no access to the craft cupboards, they might want to bring something with them. If they want to watch the recording in advance and arrive with all they need to complete it, that's fine: whatever helps them engage. Alternatively, you

might like to join in the service from home (we're livestreaming via Facebook at 10am, and service recordings are available on YouTube after lunch). However old or young you are, look out for Hannah's incredible Playmobil Bible stories: once seen, never forgotten. Hello all,

Well ... I can't quite believe it has only been six weeks since Simon and I moved to Soham ... what a six weeks it's been! I'm not sure my feet have touched the floor yet, but I mean that in the best way! Since arriving here I've moved house, unpacked, recorded

services, preached, helped at the foodbank, done Baptism visits, had Zoom meetings, planned an online pet service, and helped (mostly chatted and made tea) at the Church & Churchyard Clear-up. All of this in six weeks (plus a lot more besides) seems almost unbelievable, but I have absolutely loved getting involved and being part of this fabulous church and community from day one.



I have to say, I think there is something rather distinct about Soham... I've lived in a few different places now, and yet have never felt they were truly "my place". I've always felt like a visitor. Now obviously being a curate means that this is a transitionary time, I won't be here for that long in the grand scheme of things, but I already have a feeling of having been here forever! I'm not sure there are many places that have the same level of welcome, support, and community feel any more; but Soham certainly has that.

When I was training, often curates would come back and visit Westcott and they would all tell me how tough the first months are and how uncertain they felt... and to be honest I have to disagree! In my experience so far, although there are of course challenging things, and although I haven't yet started the terrifying stuff like baptising babies without dropping them in the font, I've not once felt uncertain in my role or in my decision to come here to serve my curacy.

It has, of course, been a very odd start; having not been ordained there are things I can't do, there are some of you who I am yet to meet because coming to church isn't possible yet, and though I am trying to make my way around the parish it's not quite as straight forward as it would have been without the pandemic. But we'll get there.

I expected this start to my curacy to be more difficult: I thought I would be more frustrated by the limitations I have to contend with, but actually the welcome, support, and care I have had from the church and from the community, the fact that you have all welcomed me as curate without needing the dog collar, has made it all really positive. 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I am, of course, looking forward to Ordination immensely, and there is something rather special about having already been a part of St Andrew's Church before it happens. I know that when I am ordained (on Friday 25th September – it will be live streamed so check the church website and Facebook pages for details nearer the time) I will be held in prayer and support by all of you.

In the coming weeks I look forward to meeting more of you, and to introducing Wilson (our sausage dog puppy) to you all when he arrives!

## A View from the Vicarage

#### **Lifting the Loam**

When – as the Far Side cartoon puts it – my brain is full, I do the garden. I've barely touched the garden in the last three years. That might well be proof I've generally got a pretty empty head ...



This afternoon, though, in a last ditch attempt to order my thoughts to write this article, I've been out in the garden three hours. I've started clearing ivy off a fence. Inspired by my 18-month-old nephew's love of flowers, I'm preparing to create a border, and my border's going to need some light. I don't know much about borders, but I admire other people's as I sit in their back gardens, and now I'm hankering after one of my own.

As luck would have it, a conversation before a Zoom meeting the other evening turned out to be all about borders: I'm not the only one of our number who's making one. Happily for me, my ally in border-construction is several steps ahead of me: he's already dug his, and he's researched what needs to go in it. He's emailed me a list of the plants he thinks will thrive, and he says they should be fine in my border too: our soils are similar (so he tells me). There's no point re-inventing the wheel!

Wielding my secateurs as I've been doing – the horticultural equivalent of limbering up – it's struck me that I've no idea how things will turn out. I've got the list of plants, but I confess I don't know what most of them are. I don't know what they look like. What I do know is that, once I've started digging, the garden won't look the same. I won't feel the same either.

'It's not the same' is a phrase I keep hearing. It's true. Lots of things just aren't the same. Church, we all know, isn't the same; pre-schools, schools, colleges and universities won't be the same when staff and students return to them over the course of these next few weeks. September for Soham's uniformed organisations and for the many other groups and clubs we might belong too won't be the same. There'll be people we won't see, things we won't do. So much isn't and won't be the same.

But it's how it is. I read a diary column yesterday where the writer (Canon Mark Oakley, Dean of St John's College, Cambridge) quoted what he said is an Austrian phrase: 'Das Leben ist kein Zuckerschlecken'. He translated it literally as 'life is no sugar-licking': sometimes life sucks; it's sour. His column concluded 'you just have to get on with it'.

I'm determined to get on with my border. If putting in the pond is anything to go by, the digging will half kill me, and I'm sure when I've mixed in the chicken muck Belle will roll all over it and then roll all over the carpet ... Then there'll be autumn and winter to sit through: I won't have much to show for my labours through all that.

But think of next summer! Flowers, bees, ladybirds – the lot. I might even be pleased I did it. Eleanor
