Steph died on 24 October 2020 aged 59 years from breast cancer. She was a member of an old Soham family: the Does came to Soham probably in the 1840s from Suffolk as Journeymen Stone Masons to repair the gargoyles of Soham Church tower and stayed, setting up their own business.

Steph was educated at the Infants and Shade Schools (later becoming The Weatherall's), before going on to The Perse, Cambridge and then to the University of Manchester, where she studied the history of languages.



After her marriage she moved north and taught languages at Warbottle High School for 33 years and eventually became one of the deputy heads.

Steph was always determined and independent from when she crawled from her cradle right through her life.

A tribute to Steph from one of her friends' mothers said: "Beautiful memories, charming, elegant, confident, friendly, helpful, kind, capable, fun, talented, loving, generous, caring, hardworking, thoughtful and many words like this describe Steph".

She will be greatly missed by her husband, brother, children, stepchildren, nephews, nieces and all their partners, her grandchildren, the extended family and many friends.

News from Wicken Fen

Overwintering birds have been steadily arriving at the fen, with winter thrushes such as redwing and fieldfare enjoying the berries around the reserve, and lapwing gathering in numbers on Baker's and Burwell Fens. At the time of writing the first couple of hen harriers have been spotted and we're expecting the arrival of short-eared owls very soon – keep an eye on our social media channels for the latest news.

We've got an exciting new activity planned for the winter period. For families and all fans of Beatrix Potter young and old, we will have a Peter RabbitTM winter activity trail on the Boardwalk. Due to the recent lockdown, the opening date has been postponed, and we are hoping to start the trail in early December. To take part you'll need to book an entry slot for Sedge Fen in the normal way and pick up a children's Peter RabbitTM trail activity pack for £2 when you check in at the Visitor Centre. More information coming to the 'What's On' section of our website soon.

Wrap up warm and pull on your walking boots or wellies for crisp, winter walks throughout the festive season. We'll be open every day apart from Christmas Day, so if you need a peaceful stroll or to walk off the Christmas excess; our car park is open 8:30am to 4:45pm (last entry 3:30pm); the Docky Hut Café is open 10am to 3pm Monday to Friday and 10am to 4pm at weekends; and the Visitor Centre is open from 10am to 4.30pm. This is subject to the latest government guidance, so do check our website before visiting to get the most up to date information.

Tickets are released every Friday for the following week for Sedge Fen walks (Boardwalk and Woodland Walk), and booking details can be found on our website https://www.nationaltrust.org.uk/wicken-fen-nature-reserve

Put the clock back 2000 years: 'How can this be, since I am a virgin?'

The Angel Gabriel, unlike the vicar (and unlike Government ministers) had answers no one could argue with. Lucky him! And it wasn't just Mary who had questions: Joseph, surely, must've had a few of his own...



Gabriel's response to them both is the same. The angel offers reassurance ('Do not be afraid') and he promises God's strengthening presence ('the Holy Spirit will come upon you', 'the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit'). He doesn't talk much about next steps, but what he says is enough for Mary and Joseph to move forward faithfully. These unexpected tidings have disrupted their plans – so much for their dream of an ordinary life – but their heavenly encounters mean they're willing to play their part in the drama of salvation. Each of them says 'OK' (which of course sounds better in the Greek!).

I don't know about you, but I wouldn't mind having a visit from an angel, especially as Christmas approaches. So many uncertainties, so many practicalities still to be worked out. 'Do not be afraid' is as reassuring a message today as ever it was, it seems to me. And 'angel' simply

means 'messenger': God gets through to us, I believe, in all sorts of different ways. God makes his presence felt through the kindness and goodness of friends and strangers.

It goes without saying that Christmas this year won't be the same, but what will still be the same is that enduring presence of God – with us and alongside us, whatever these next few weeks bring.

And a word of encouragement: this year's Crib Service may be on line (available via YouTube and Facebook from 4pm on Christmas Eve), but it WILL be worth waiting for: the Nativity as you've never seen it before. Watch this space!
