For others, it

may be sitting still and soaking up His grace. What is so great is that we are all individual and experience things on different levels and in different ways. God knows us so intimately that he meets us where we are and speaks in ways he knows we will recognise. It's so important in our hectic lives to invest in time with Him, whether that's first thing in the morning, on a commute to work, whilst walking the dog or in the bath. When we spend invest this time our relationship with God becomes deeper.

For those of us for which this new term is one of challenge, my prayer is that in seeking an intimate relationship with our living heavenly Father God, you will receive his peace; that you will have the courage to face this new stage with renewed strength, in the knowledge that you are fearfully and wonderfully made by the creator God who knows your challenges and holds you close.

International Justice Mission

After eight years consisting of two league wins, a change of league, and promotion to the top flight, the boys have finally finished. The team ended their final campaign with a successful battle against relegation where they managed to scrape just enough points to keep their dignity for the season.

Over the eight years I have seen players change and mature both from my team and others'; seen the impact of the 30-40 teams and churches who regularly play in this league on the community; seen the evolution of Christian football; and made good relationships both within my team and with other teams.

The next chapter for me is joining a different team in the league - New Generation Church - where I will still be playing with my brother Dave Still and friend Anthony Lobo from St Stephen's Church, Welling. They have asked me to have a slightly senior involvement in the team in order to maintain the Christian ethos of the side.

I have always *really* cared about my and others' actions being fair and just, since I was a child. It didn't always come out in a good way! But Jesus was profoundly good and just - in thought and action - and he is the true image of the invisible God.

For many years, I have heard stories of awful injustice around the world, and eventually my anger at it and desire to see it stop was too much to simply be something about which I heard or prayed. It needed to become work. And so, in addition to studying for my masters in International Human Rights Law, I started working for IJM at the beginning of August.

Working to free the poorest of the world's peoples from slavery, sex trafficking, citizenship rights abuse, police corruption, property theft, sexual abuse and cybersex trafficking, IJM have rescued over 40,000 men, women and children. But it doesn't stop there. With teams of social workers, investigators, lawyers, and in partnership with governments, police, courts and other organisations, we work for victims' healing and for criminals to be properly punished for their actions. And as we train law enforcers in how to implement law, we are seeing justice properly upheld and millions protected.

A few weeks ago I was

reading about the trans-Atlantic slave trade and it properly broke me. Underground at Elmina Castle in Ghana, slaves were kept in cramped, claustrophobic conditions where many died. To get through the church door, churchgoers would literally have to walk over the grate which provided the only light and air these slaves had. As the trapped people screamed out for help, they were not only ignored, but members of the church would sing louder during their services to drown out the screams.

What sickening, disgusting behaviour. Thank goodness that the Holy Spirit moved his people to act to end the slave trade. And that's what he's continuing to do now: moving his people to pray and to act to bring an end to modern-day slavery for those unprotected by law.

Come and pray with us on the 4th November. Prayer is tipping the scales on to the side of justice.

Louise at L'Arche

I'm spending a year living and working in a L'Arche community in France for adults with learning disabilities.

When there's too much for me to process, and therefore write coherently, I'm tempted not to write at all for others to read. I'll never be able to capture the essence of L'Arche, but here are some of my thoughts after my first month.

- Everyone's characters are vivid here - residents and assistants alike - like in a well-written novel. It's a product of a well-developed culture of valuing people as they are, weaknesses included.
- I love French food. We eat well, with 2-3 courses for lunch and dinner. Meals are a ritual which bring us together as a community - a concept with strong



roots in both French and Christian tradition.

- Operating in a foreign language is truly exhausting and has been a real knock to my confidence. Every time I open my mouth, I make mistakes. I don't like making mistakes. It is gradually getting easier - both to understand what's going on and to make mistakes!
- God is helping me so much, every day - it's almost tangible. He turns my anxieties and fatigue into a joy and a sense of adventure as I anticipate how He will turn around each daily challenge.
- I've just about learnt how to follow the Catholic Mass service in French. It's our tradition to hold hands for the Lord's Prayer within the L'Arche community, and I love that we automatically do the same in services out at the local churches. L'Arche is

Catholic in foundation, but ecumenical in its welcome. I'm looking forward to leading some storytelling and prayer in the daily morning prayer times.

- This is a place of welcome. The residents are called *personnes accueillies* - 'welcomed persons' - but it is in fact they who show the most beautiful welcome to the new assistants every year.
- I'm out of the boat - my comfort zone - and you helped me get here. I was overwhelmed by the amount of love and encouragement shown to me by you as my Church family whilst I was making my decision to go and before I left. Thank you so much.

If you're interested in finding out more, a film all about L'Arche, *Summer in the Forest*, was shown in UK cinemas earlier this year and is now available to buy and stream online - I recommend it!

St Werburgh's Derby

For those of you who don't know me, I'm Estelle Woodcock's son, Andy Bond. My wife Rachel and I were members of St John's for a very long time before I went to train for ordination. We, along with our kids Tibby and Caleb, got to join you on the parish weekend which was great and a number were asking what we are now up to, so here's a little update:


I have just finished my curacy at Holy Trinity SE20 in Penge and we are now part of a team planting St Werburgh's Church in the centre of Derby. St Werburgh's was a church that was built in the 1700s and once had a thriving congregation in the mid 20th Century. However the building became a burden and in the 1980s the congregation was joined and moved to St Alkmund's Church. The building was sold off. St Werburgh's was deconsecrated and used as an indoor market and even a Chinese restaurant but for the last 7 years has been entirely closed. It is in the centre of the city, a short walk from the cathedral and next to lots of restaurants and clubs.

Fast forward to 2017..... The Church Commissioners are the trust that manages all the Church of England's historic investments. They have billions of pounds under management; however there is a stipulation that monies cannot be used



to privilege one generation over another and that the monies always have to be available to fund the ministry of the CoE. However, there has been recent recognition that as a denomination we are in a hole and there are significant monies being released to dioceses for mission projects (i.e. not for just mending a church roof or to prop up a struggling church). A couple of years ago Ric Thorpe was installed in a newly created post as Bishop of Islington and one of his roles is to oversee the creation of new worshipping communities - including fresh expressions of church and church plants.

One of the main players in this Church of England movement of starting (planting) or grafting (significantly resourcing an existing church) is Holy Trinity Brompton (HTB of Alpha fame) and churches in its network. Up until about 8 years ago HTB had planted a number of churches in London and then they had a go in Brighton where St Peter's was planted. Since then there have been major plants into many English cities and St Peter's itself (and others) has started planting. The aim is to plant churches which then themselves plant churches. This term the HTB network is starting 5 new churches: Crawley, Coventry, Fiveways in Brighton, West Molesey and DERBY!!!!



And so Rach and I join a team of 22 (including children) starting this church in Derby.

We launched on 17th September and had an

incredible turnout of friends, local church members and potential congregation. Our aim: "We want to build an authentic community, which is Christ centred, that plays our part in transforming the city and beyond." We fully recognise that there are some great churches already in Derby, we are not coming in to "save the city" and God is already at work here, so we want to join in with Him and His mission to this city.

As a family we are excited about moving to a new place, being close to the peak district and not feeling as claustrophobic as in Penge! At the same time, it is the furthest north we have ever lived, Tibby is having to change schools and we will be quite a distance from family and most of our established friends. We would of course be grateful for your prayers as without prayer and the power of the Holy Spirit, the money, the resources and the network are a waste of time!
