We have twinned our toilets in the vicarage – and someone has twinned our new accessible toilet in church. It costs £60 and enables Tearfund to provide toilets in places where there are none.

What a privilege it is for us to have a new toilet in church – to have maybe 2 or 3 at home... I cannot imagine the horror of not



having what we consider to be a basic human right! Could you twin yours?

There are about 50 days to the 19th November – that's about 200 trips to the loo (a low guess!) which
