A Message from Brendan

As these are different times, and it has not been that long since our last Annual Parochial Church Meeting (19 November 2020), this report is a bit different, and rather shorter than usual.

COVID-19 lockdowns and restrictions have altered much of what we have been able to do as a church, but not why we do it. We are here to share with our community, and indeed the whole world, the life-changing love of God in Jesus Christ. This is what St James' has been attempting to continue to do.

Worship

For four of the six months since our last Annual Meeting we have not held in-person worship in church. During the November lockdown public worship was not permitted. In the January - March period, in common with most other churches, we judged our safest and most responsible course of action regrettably was to suspend public worship. During these times worship, thanks to the fantastic work of our tech team, has been held online. We usually gather 50-60 households who watch live and over the week collect 350-400 views of the service.

It was, of course, so good to be able to worship together in church during December and Christmas. As I write, we are preparing for our return on Easter Day. Nothing can replace physically meeting together as God's people. Even though social-distancing restricts what we can do, it is still good being together. We owe a debt of thanks to Jean Heaton and Bob Greene, our Churchwardens, and to Steve Taylor our Health and Safety Officer, for all their work in helping us to gather as safely as we can.

Music is such an important part of worship. We have acutely felt the pain of not been able to sing in church together. Our musicians have responded valiantly, and are to be thanked for doing so. I am grateful to Michael Payne, our Director of Music, who is working out how best we can worship musically.

Digital Mission

Thanks to the incredible generosity of many people we have been able to invest significantly in equipment to enable us to reach people beyond our doors with the Good News of Jesus. Without this investment we would not have been able to broadcast worship from church. During this time, we have been brilliantly served by Ed Taylor and James Cresswell who have meticulously and tirelessly steered us through this technical labyrinth. This is a very significant development in the mission of St James'.

Groups

Some groups have been unable to meet, others have been able to meet on Zoom. The Book Group, house groups, and Lent groups have met. The leaders of these groups are now much more familiar with the intricacies of Zoom than they ever felt they would be. Well done everyone. Jesus' model of teaching was to gather groups to learn together. Such meeting is the context where we learn from one another what it means to follow Jesus.

Prayer

It has been great that during all this time the work of the church has been supported by the beating heart of prayer. Again, on Zoom, each weekday at 9.00am Morning Prayer is prayed, and then at 6.00pm we have been joining together in the Archbishops' call to pray for our nation. I am grateful to the Reverend Janet Cox for diligently hosting this each day.

The church has been open for individual private prayer during all this time. This has been hugely valued by people as they have found the church building to be a place of meeting with God. Our thanks are due to all our welcomers who make this happen.

Pastoral Care

During these months the pastoral care of the church has continued in quiet and in quite remarkable ways. A team of people has been keeping in touch with 60 people via the telephone. Christmas gift bags and Lent Resources have been distributed, and the distribution of Easter gifts is planned. Such care is truly inspirational. I thank Lorna Taylor, Val Lumsden and their team for this fantastic effort.

Conclusion

I wanted to keep this brief. It has been difficult for me to do so. There is much more I could have, and would have liked, to say. I hope you get the picture that the church has not been closed. Far from it, thanks be to God, the church is alive and active.

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PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL (PCC) REPORT

Since the last APCM in November 2020, the PCC have met 3 times and the Standing committee has also met 3 times. Because of COVID-19 restrictions, it has been difficult for the five sub-committees (Finance, Property, Worship & Nurture, Communications, and Joint Personnel to meet but where they have, they have reported to the PCC. It is anticipated that as the restrictions ease the committees will re-start. There are currently 13 elected members, one co-opted member, a Diocesan Synod rep, four Deanery Synod reps and two Licensed Lay Readers on the PCC. With Clergy and Churchwardens, we are a group of 22.

As well as dealing with the normal business of St James' concerning finance, buildings, health and safety, we have spent significant time in discussion on the implementation of the COVID-19 rules and complying with the Government restrictions in order to make public worship as safe as possible. Alongside this, we have also reviewed the replacement of our Children's and Young People's and Family Worker.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Unrestricted Funds (General and Unrestricted Designated Barleyfields Fund)

It is stating the obvious but 2020 was a year like no other so it is difficult to compare 2020 with 2019 but the following are the key notable areas:

- > Standing Order donations held up well (£68,440 compared to £63,299 in 2019). This increase went part way towards offsetting the following:
- reduction in other voluntary giving (envelopes, cash and general fund donations), £24,497 compared with £38081 in 2019.
- Additionally, there was a knock-on effect on tax recovered which was down £1,345 in 2020.
- Other areas of starkly reduced income were wedding and funeral fees, £5,311, and
- Church and Crypt lettings £2,355
- ➤ Rental income from Barleyfields was down £1,078 compared to 2019 because of a vacant period between tenants.

The above normal activities, in isolation, resulted in reduced income of £18,532 compared with 2019 but the unrestricted fund gross balances actually increased by £9,040 in 2020 due to positive factors and reduced expenditure initiatives.

- PCC received a legacy of £5000 to the General Fund.
- ▶ PCC received £6,640 in Coronavirus Job Retention Grants from the Government.
- Voluntary Reduction in staff working hours, £414
- Church closure resulted in Utility savings of £1,047 and a Local Authority Discretionary Grant of £1,154 was received
- ➤ With the prior knowledge, and agreement, of the Diocese £98,790 only was paid in Parish Share compared to £107,152 in 2019; a reduction of £8,362
- ➤ Ministry costs £3,778
- ➤ Barleyfields spending was up £3,323 due to required refurbishment work.

The above amounts to savings of £10,278 and in addition there is the legacy of £5,000 and grants totalling £7,794 i.e. £23,073

There are of course, other areas where the restrictions imposed by COVID-19 had reduced activities generating income and costs, but these are individual amounts minor compared to the above.

The General Fund on 31st December was £315,267, including the Barleyfields property at £270,000, and £4,372 in the Unrestricted Designated Barleyfields Fund.

Worship Support in Wetherby Fund - Restricted Fund

Excluding grants (see below) donations into the Worship Fund in 2020 totalled £2,958 compared with £2,682 in 2019 which included a legacy of £1,000 Without the Christmas Bazaar and a reduced income from the Sunday Morning Service refreshment other income was down £2,047 on 2019. Excluding non-recurring grants (see below) therefore, other income was down £1,770.

With the Church closed to services for much of the year service and music costs were lower in 2020 by £1,457 excluding salaries.

The biggest cost to Fund is the Musical Directors salary, but this was substantially offset in 2020 by the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme (CJRS) grant of £3,085.

The net result was a deficit in the fund of £641 (2019 -£3,237) leaving a balance of £2,128. While this is low projected income includes a donation of £6,000 and CJRS grants totalling which will continue to end September, albeit at a reducing level.

Mission Support in Wetherby Fund - Restricted Fund

This fund also suffered from the reduced activities because of the COVID 19 restrictions.

However, the fund benefitted from a legacy for £5,000 and £4,098 under CJRS. Salary costs were also substantially down with the Youth Worker resigning in March

The net result was that the fund made a surplus over the year of £3,708 compared with £3,443 in 2019 and as at the 31st December stood at £19,675.

Audio Visual and Digital Mission Funds - Restricted Funds

Income into the Audio-Visual Fund suffered from reduced numbers of weddings and funerals. Even so, the fund made a surplus of £55 over the year. As at 31st December the fund had a balance of £1,488, made up of a computer valued at £391 and bank £1.097.

With Gift Aid £10,005 was raised for the Digital Mission Fund and although there was spending of £2,076 there is further spending planned for early 2021.

The balance of the Digital Mission Fund on 31st December stood at £7,928 which is made up of a computer valued at £1,456 and bank £6,472

REPORT ON THE FABRIC, GOODS AND ORNAMENTS OF ST JAMES' CHURCH

The Property Committee, because of the COVID 19 pandemic only managed one committee meeting during the year with Alan Grimes continuing in the chair.

The Quinquennial Inspection was undertaken in November being brought forward by 12 months due to the retirement of our Inspecting Surveyor

Other work undertaken included:

- All testing of electrical equipment was completed on schedule and annual testing of the tower Lightning Protection System was completed.
- The Church Health and Safety policy, Risk assessment and Fire Risk assessments have all been reviewed and updated.
- Testing of electrical equipment was completed on schedule and annual testing of the tower Lightning Protection System was completed.
- 53 Barleyfields Road. The tenants left after 10 years in residence and a new tenant took up residence in November

As part of the Church of England target of achieving Net Zero Carbon by 2030 St James has applied for funding from the Rural Community Energy Fund (RCEF). This is a government fund supporting rural communities to develop renewable energy projects. The aim being to reduce/eliminate our reliance on carbon producing fossil fuels

DIOCESAN SYNOD

With the pandemic, only two Synods were held in 2020, in September and November, both via zoom. The meetings worked better, in my view, then physical assembly. More people attend (no long journeys) and more feel able to express their opinions.

Jonathan Wood is the new Diocesan Secretary – a breath of fresh air.

The Leeds Diocesan Board of Finance has been reconstituted, with all Synod members acting as 'members' of the company. There was a deficit forecast for 2020 of £2m (on a turnover of £20m).

Triennial elections are coming up. The size of the Synod has been reduced from 100 to 70 in both houses (clergy and laity).

Initiatives include 'Wellsprings Together' Rhythm of Life' 'Living in Love and Faith'. And a covenant for the wellbeing of clergy.

I have been appointed to the Diocesan Advisory Committee for the Care of Churches (advising the Chancellor, Archdeacons and parishes on architecture, archaeology, art and history and all changes to buildings), and to its Environmental sub-committee. I am also a member of the Diocesan Patronage Board.

DEANERY SYNOD

The Harrogate Deanery Synod representatives were Rev. Brendan Giblin, Elaine Hainsworth, Rosemary Rooke, Robert Haskins and Val Lumsden.

The Deanery Synod exists to further the mission and ministry of the Church and to build relationships between neighbouring parishes. The synod takes decisions about issues involving our deanery and these may then be taken to the diocesan synod if necessary.

As a result of the Covid 19 Lockdowns there were only two meetings held during the year, both of which were held via Zoom.

1st December 2020 - MAIN SPEAKER: Jonathan Wood, Diocesan Secretary/Chief Executive By way of introduction, Jonathan spoke about having been in post since March, meaning that he was only able to spend 4 days in the diocesan office before the 1st lockdown began, and the challenges this had brought. He identified 3 priorities he had focused on since then:

- **Supporting parishes** through the pandemic with the aim of helping ministry to flourish even in these difficult times.
- Finance he spoke of how he had thought a lot of the hard work had been done in putting
 diocesan finances in order over the last few years, and how the pandemic had changed
 everything and how it had led to a significant drop in diocesan income and hence a significant
 deficit was expected for this year. A re-thinking of some priorities had taken place as a result.
- **Diocesan Strategy** he shared on screen a diagram which outlined the diocesan strategy



Goal 1: Thriving as a distinctive diocese whose culture is shaped by a shared vision and values
Goal 2: Reimagining ministry
Goal 3: Nurturing lay discipleship
Goal 4: Building leadership pathways
Goal 5: Growing young poople as Christians

He said an important part of his role was to make the strategy more reality-driven and therefore achievable in the light of the radical shift in circumstances from 2019 when the strategy was drawn up compared to now.

He then invited questions, (abridged questions/answers below)

- Robert Haskins, Wetherby, asked whether or not the diocese was 'top heavy' and if savings could be made. Jonathan replied that the entirety of share payments made by parishes were spent on clergy salaries and housing.
- Rev John Smith commented that it was legitimate as progress on implementing the diocesan strategy had slowed. Jonathan agreed saying 2020 was not the year for planning new things and that hopefully this would now take place in 2021.
- Rev Dr Alan Garrow asked how the diocesan strategy might relate to the national strategy document, and how parishes might relate to both. Jonathan acknowledged the need not to have competing visions and the need to build on our common ground which essentially was being a Christ-centred, Jesus shaped church which was indeed simpler, bolder, humbler, younger and more diverse. He said he was of the view that the diocesan vision sat comfortably within the national vision and was also of the view that vision could not be imposed from the top; nevertheless a national vision should help give focus and direction.

 Rev John Smith asked how the diocese might help parishes get back onto a sound financial footing after the pandemic. Jonathan's answer was that he and the central staff would keep asking, 'How can we help?' and then do what they could.

Diocesan Rhythm of Life initiative

The area dean drew our attention to the diocesan Rhythm of Life initiative, which is about joining together in a shared rule of life – he led the meeting through the web pages from the diocesan learning platform https://learning.leeds.anglican.org/rol/ and encouraged parishes and people to use and publicise this resource.

Cut in foreign aid John Smith introduced the subject of the recently announced cut in foreign aid. Synod agreed that the lay chair, Justin Brett, should write to our various local MPs on our behalf expressing our opposition to the cuts and asking that they be reconsidered. (This has been done)

Good news from the Deanery

A video was shown about the work of the youth interns at Kairos Network church. Ben Askew introduced the two interns, Freya and Ethan and said how the programme was part of the New Wine Discipleship year. He encouraged any other churches who were interested in joining the programme to contact him for more details.

15 February 2021 Chair – Justin Brett

Main Topics: Training – Lay Training Officers Marion Russell & Julia Robertson spoke to us about some of the many, newly launched, exciting training opportunities available across the Diocese of Leeds, ranging from regular worship to one-off events right through to more sustained courses, all offered by Leeds School of Ministry. Reflections & Feedback on the past year in small group breakout rooms

It has been recognized that in many parishes more people are 'attending' a virtual Sunday Service than ever attended church in person before lockdown. This also seems to be the case with the various Zoom Prayer gatherings, such as Morning Prayer, Prayer for the Nation. There also seems to have been a good take up of the on-line 'Rhythm of Life Lent Course'. Some Parishes have also held the Online Alpha Course, which again has proved popular.

Book Clubs, Bible Study groups, Virtual coffee times, Virtual Bingo and Virtual Quiz nights, have been established within the Deanery churches and all seem very popular.

Many, if not all, of the Deanery churches appear to have set up small groups to ensure their congregations and wider communities have been contacted, helped to feel connected and informed of relevant information needed in these strange times.

These are just a few examples of how the use of modern technology and the good old-fashioned use of the telephone and 'note writing' is enabling churches to keep in touch and also spread the Good News.

The Worship Group is small in number at the moment. We would welcome any instrumentalists or singers. Instrumentalists would ideally be about Grade 3 standard or above as some of the music is hard to navigate. We enjoy playing a variety of contemporary worship songs.

PASTORAL CARE AND WORSHIP IN THE COMMUNITY

As we all know one of the church's main areas of ministry is pastoral care but the usual ways of undertaking this ministry have been significantly affected by COVID-19 and the usual route of face-to-face visiting has not been possible in most situations, so we have had to adapt very quickly and find new ways to keep in touch and to offer care where and when it is needed. And thanks to a bank of volunteers we have been able to do this

Initially there was a great need for people who could shop, pickup prescriptions etc. This need has reduced as more and more people are now shopping online and many are having medicines delivered. However, as time has gone on, we are aware that many people are feeling really disconnected, and the individual needs have changed significantly at different times during lockdown, for example the number of people needing a bit of extra support fluctuates depending on whether we have public worship or not. We have now identified a list of around 65 people who are not on-line or don't use email, who sadly, when church is closed, miss out on joining worship on-line or even receiving Brendan's regular updates. Thanks to another team of around 20 volunteers committed to keeping regular contact as part of the 'Telephone Contacts Team', we are able to keep this group of people in the loop. It's great to hear about new friendships being formed across the various age groups and congregations at church. The people on the 'Practical Help Team' and 'Telephone Contacts team' also feedback any other areas where individuals may need help or if there are any concerns. We have had a few seasonal initiatives during lockdown which we hope helped those people who find it difficult to come to church or to access on-line worship, to feel connected in the life of the church.

- Church was open at harvest but we distributed around 30 bags containing homemade jam, marmalade, chutney, plants, butterflies, and harvest prayers to those we knew of who couldn't come to church.
- During Advent we distributed Advent Prayer/Reflections and Candles to 50 people who were not able to join us on line or in church.
- At Christmas we made up 50 bags of various Christmas goodies, made or donated by volunteers together with the C of E booklet, Comfort and Joy' Christmas Card.
- During Lent we provided a booklet of reflections, prayers and readings based on the Diocesan material 'Rhythm of Life, the material which we are also using in our St James Lent Groups.

- For Easter we delivered 62 bags which included a palm cross, Easter Prayers, Easter cards
 made by children, hand-made Easter crosses and forget-me-knots, Chocolate Bunnies,
 daffodils, a big thank you to all who provided the contents. In order to keep the Covid-19 risk
 factor down to a minimum we can only use a small team of people to deliver and we hope
 these visits bring as much joy to the recipients as they do to us.
- We are also in regular contact with the Activities Managers at the various Care Homes in Wetherby, and most of them receive Brendan's Weekly Update and are able to join our services via Facebook or Zoom and also, we can now provide the Services on DVD.

None of the above would happen without the help of the many people who shop, pick-up prescriptions, make regular telephone calls, knit, crotchet, give lifts to hospital and doctor's appointments, etc., all of which is underpinned by prayer, which we can all do and without which nothing would happen.

The list and needs are constantly changing, but the aim remains the same -" that Just because folk are out of sight, we don't want anyone to feel out of mind", so, if you are reading this and you, or anyone you know, needs a bit of practical support or just someone to have a regular chat with, please do let us know.

Bereavement Support Team – the team offers post-funeral visits to support bereaved families.

Annual Service of Service – this service takes place each December and sees Church members out in Wetherby litter picking, offering prayer, delivering gifts or singing.
