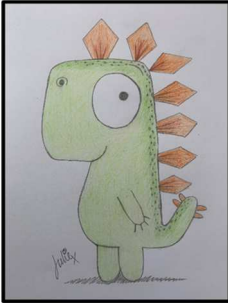

how to draw the characters from his picture books under the hashtag #drawwithrob. The link can be found here,

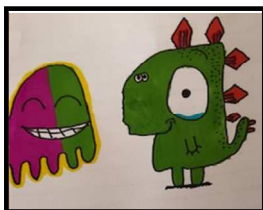

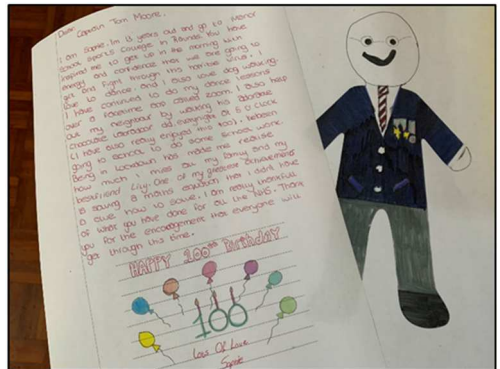

My report this month is rather brief due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Obviously all one to one contact with our church groups and schools is suspended during these unusual times. It does mean though that I am still able to serve our community but in a different way. I am working answering the telephone in the mornings (usually Mondays and Wednesday) taking calls from vulnerable members our community who need shopping or prescriptions collecting. Then in the afternoons Rev. Jon will email the volunteers across our Benefice for those that need shopping and then I go collecting the prescriptions and delivering them to those predominantly in the Raunds area. I'm getting quite well known in Meadow Lane Pharmacy all whilst avoiding the bees nest!!

We have collectively managed to assist over 200 households in 3 weeks which I think is a great thing to be able to do for our communities.

I have been trying to maintain contact with our regular groups, for example with Little Sunbeams we are holding a virtual coffee and chat session via Facebook on Tuesday mornings and for Messy Church we sent out a 'Spot the Easter Egg' picture. It's not the same as being able to meet together properly but it is still good to maintain contact and just be there to talk to people.

Please join me in praying for our communities as we all learn to adjust to these strange times.

Lessons From the Past

What a strange Easter! Locked down, no family or friends visiting and church closed! Who would have thought we would have settling down in front of the computer to watch a live stream from the vicarage or in front of the TV for a televised service instead of walking up the steps or along the path to St Peter's?

Churches being closed is such an extraordinary idea it made me wonder whether there have been other times in the past that this has happened. A quick google search led me to the 1918-19 influenza pandemic when an estimated 20 to 40 million people died worldwide. Coming so soon after the end of the war, the country struggled to cope and it is reported that many theatres, dancehall, churches and other public gathering places were closed for months. I wonder if Raunds St Peter's was?

A famous example of church services being moved in times of illness comes from Eyam in the Derbyshire Dales in the times of the 1665 plague outbreak. The rector introduced a number of precautions to limit the spread of the illness including relocating church services to the natural amphitheatre of Cucklett Delph which allowed "social distancing" (although I think that is a 21st century expression!)

Of course, churches can close if they are no longer needed for worship. They may be converted to a suitable alternative use, demolished or preserved by the Churches Conservation Trust. St Peter's Church (the one on a grass mound opposite the train station), Northampton is an example of the latter. You used to be able to go to the Ibis Hotel and borrow the huge key and look inside. Not sure if you still can but it is beautifully decorated and now used as a concert venue and rehearsal space.

Eight hundred years ago, the most important person in the land, Pope Innocent III, who although didn't live in England had huge influence, ordered all churches to close as he and King John disputed who was to be the next Archbishop.

This "lockdown" lasted for 6 years. Let's hope ours is considerably shorter!



Raunds Food Bank—April 2020

Raunds Foodbank has remained open and we have seen a growing need. Most clients have come as referrals with very few dropping in. Raunds Area Volunteers are delivering the parcels for us, and also helping to collect donations. We are covering a wider area, and clients have been from Titchmarsh, Woodford as well as Raunds and Thrapston.

We have been overwhelmed with people's generosity- both financially and with food. We were given a lot of fresh produce from Burger King, Greggs at Thrapston, Subway and Howdens canteen when they closed. Also, QD and Podington Garden Centre gave a lot of Easter produce and we were able to make up hampers for the staff and clients at the care homes in Raunds. A couple filled a trolley at Raunds Co-op with £200 of items and left it to be collected for the Foodbank. A big thank you goes to Toni Wright who has offered to act as a collection point and helps promote us on social media.

LOCKDOWN

Living with Lockdown

We will all have different experiences of this period. For me, the past month has been extremely busy and isolation has been easy to maintain. Calving, lambing and the good weather enabling fieldwork have coincided this year. I realise I am so blessed to be outside much of the time, even if it is often hard work.

My closest family live abroad but we have been able to keep in touch using Zoom, to all chat together (although the time differences can make it difficult). We have taken part in "pub quizzes", the teams coming from different parts of the world. My niece lives in Rome, one of the first places to be put in strict lockdown. She is a teacher and they were given a couple of days warning to set up remote teaching (all the pupils had school laptops). She lives in a flat with her partner who also works remotely from home. They only go out to walk the dog and for shopping in the local shops. They have a good social life (remotely) and remain positive despite the length of time. In Alberta, Canada the lockdown came early on with schools and public parks closed. Towns in the Rockies banned outsiders and ski resorts closed. My other daughter is a doctor in A and E in New Zealand. A strict lockdown was put in place early on with severe penalties for disregarding the rules. Those entering the country had to spend their 14 days in quarantine at a designated place, not at home. At the hospital all non-urgent surgery was cancelled, and the departments well set up for Covid and non Covid patients. This seems to have paid off as there have been very few deaths and hospital staff haven't been busy. In fact, the lockdown is being lifted slightly to allow domestic flights and some construction work.
