A Message from Rev Sam Funnell

Dear Friends,

As we share this latest edition of TNV, we are approaching the end of my first year with you. It's not been like any other first year in a new appointment and for those that continued in ministry in their existing place, it's been equally strange.

We've wrestled with a variety of lockdowns coming and going; mask-wearing; services in church and on the live stream, or via Zoom; pastoral contact mainly having to be by phone, email or a chat on the doorstep; the suspension of our fellowship and social gatherings and not being able to sing in church!

It's been hard – especially for those that were ill, or lost loved ones; for those living alone or having to shield indoors and any working in the care sector or other vulnerable, front-line work, or having close family of friends doing so.

We've kept our distance, covered our faces, elbow-bumped instead of shaking hands and hugging? Well, out of the question!

And yet – we have kept going.

You have made me welcome and together we have welcomed others in. We have kept our hope alive, along with our candles at Christmas into Candlemas, and we are not defeated – weary of much of it, yes but not giving up – NEVER!

A few weeks back the set gospel reading for the day was Mark 4:26-34 where Jesus talks about what the Kingdom

of God is like with the parables of the growing seed and the mustard seed. I'm always so taken with the aspect of growth contained within passages such as this, that I sometimes miss other details but not this time. In Mark 4:32, when Jesus is talking about the mustard seed growing to make a great shrub, the gospel writer records Jesus saying:

'[It] puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade.'

Forgetting for a moment how large a shrub we actually think a mustard seed might create (and perhaps we should just take Jesus at his most 'pictorial' here – small seed, large bush!), the end result is a plant that offers a safe place, a home, a chance for growth and a shade from the heat of the day.

Even if life has been very different for many of us, and the going has been tough at lots of points over the last year, if we can still be offering a safe place for people to connect (even if it is over the phone or by email), a worshipping home (on Zoom, via the live stream, or socially-distanced, mask-wearing, communion-pot-juggling in church), a chance to grow together as a fellowship (on-line bible studies, prayer meetings by Zoom or WhatsApp) and a shade and shelter from the heat of life (in our pastoral care, careful conversation and support for organisations like Woking Mind along with our Foundry planning and ROC groups) – then I think we're doing what God wants us to. Then, in our own small way, we are playing our part in the in-breaking of the Kingdom of God, right here in Woking, even in the strangest of years.

Thanks for being my 'mustard seed partners in the gospel of Good News'. May God continue to bless and guide us!

Trinity tomorrow

We have been working really hard to get Trinity ready for Tomorrow and whatever that might bring, and a great deal has been achieved.

So many people have prayed about the financial appeal that we launched and have taken it right to their hearts. It has been really successful and against a target of £20,000, have raised over £28,500! When we claim the Gift Aid due on many of the donations we expect the total to be around £33,500. A great big thank you to everyone for their generous donations and for working so hard in so many different ways.

The Plant and Craft sale (see page xx) raised over £750 which is fantastic but the Gold Star must go to Daisy the



Dog for leading Rev Sam to walk over 180 miles and between them, they raised over £4000 in sponsorship!! Amazing.

So, the good news is that this money should cover the shortfall we were anticipating

for the current year, and also give us a good start for next year.

As we look confidently towards 'tomorrow' we anticipate that there will be a wider range of activities taking place in the Sanctuary. As well as worship on Sundays, it is

already used for concerts and bible study groups and Holiday Clubs, we expect there will also be conferences and social welfare sessions using it because it is a fantastic space. It is also now equipped with some fantastic new equipment.

- The new lighting is energy efficient, easy to control and capable of many different effects when required.
- Volunteers managed to redirect the many cables running through unsightly conduit on the walls. It is now beneath the raised stage area and through different routes, so that the conduit has gone.
- Volunteers removed the carpet tiles and parquet flooring and then channelled new routes in the floor for sound, IT and electric cables so that the church is much better equipped.
- The sound control system has been installed within a purpose-built technical desk which was designed and built by volunteers.
- The Narthex ceiling was re-plastered and decorated before the new carpet was laid.



We are learning to use the new equipment to best effect, but to complete the Project we need to install an additional TV Screen about where the clock currently is. We also need to improve the acoustic so that it is suitable for the wide range of events I have already mentioned. As part of that we are selecting material through a local contractor to replace the long drapes at the front of the church and then will work with Sound Analysts to install acoustic panelling on some of the concrete beams.

It is only thanks to a lot of very hard work by some skilled volunteers, we have achieved an excellent result within the agreed budget. Without the countless hours that were freely given, we would not have met the several deadlines that inevitably occur throughout a complex project such as this.

All I can say, is a HUGE thankyou to everyone for their part in what we have achieved recently and I know we can be confident about the future of Trinity.

Foundry as Focus for Mission

At a recent Leadership Team meeting (now comprising Church Stewards & Staff), it was agreed that missional activities of Trinity would be focussed through the Foundry. We’re still working this through, but if occasionally you wonder why something now appears under a Foundry heading, that is probably why.

Foundry Worship

Louisa, Graham, Andy, Annie, Sue – and I’m sure there’ll be others soon. I’m referring to those who lead the music at Foundry Worship. At a time when we still can’t sing together, God has blessed us with our musicians. Each service we have a short message – thoughts from one of us to make us think. We have recently completed a themed series based on Our Calling – Worship, Learning & Caring, Service and Evangelism. Sadly we are still a little compromised by masks and distance – I am so looking forward to being properly together again – not long now!

Intergenerational Music Making (IMM)

We are hosting a series of six IMM sessions at Trinity starting on 23rd June. These involve getting groups of children and adults together to make music. Look IMM up on the internet to see some videos of what they do. At the time of writing I am hoping the delay to ‘Freedom Day’ won’t impact us too much. Since our premises are

particularly suited to this type of event, we are hoping that this event will be the first of many. And a special thank you to Trinity members who have already volunteered to form our IMM hosting team.

Neighbourhood Party (NP)

It is nearly two years since we held the last one. The current plan is to hold the next on 24th October. There has been some deliberation about the future of the NP. I'm not sure of the full history, but it must have been running for 30+ years. During this time we have entertained many guests, who have been served by an amazing team of volunteers. But time moves on. So in October we plan to celebrate all that has been achieved in the past. We will also anticipate a refresh as we move the NP forward into the future. Please mark the afternoon of the 24th in your diary – this is a chance for the whole church to celebrate together – noting that many who would have been organising many years ago can now attend as honoured guests.

The Digital Age arrives . . .

OK, so even at Trinity it arrived several decades ago. I also realise that this headline probably doesn't excite most readers of TNV, but can I urge you to read on? You see, things are changing - I've noticed that more members have quietly gained e-mail capability. And if you can receive an e-mail, it is only a tiny leap to greater things. As an example, during lockdown I helped 'stream' a couple of funerals. By sending a link in an email, anyone could join the services by simply clicking on the link – generally the computer does the rest automatically. Some tried this for the first time– apparently it worked!

In a similar manner we stream services – some Sundays as many people view our morning service on-line as attend in person. So over the next few months we are going to increasingly start generating more visually based content. Look out for it. Share the links (forward by email). Even give us your ideas – it is surprisingly easy to generate content in this way using a mobile phone. But a library of visual content is only just the start, because with this comes the

ability to better use social networks to reach out – getting our mission into the digital space it needs to be in if we are to communicate effectively with the younger generations. So over the next few months look out for changes to the website, digital display boards and more – and let us have your ideas and feedback.

Eco Church and Climate Sunday

On June 6th our morning service focused on our planet in all its richness and beauty, vulnerability and need. For many of us environmental issues are at the heart of our beings and everyday lives and the service sought to mark and honour that, as well as encouraging us all individually and as a church community to try to speak up a bit more often and call those who are in positions of power and influence to do more to save our planet. As Sam quoted in her opening there is no plan B, there is no planet B.

Daphne introduced the theme with these words:

"When I was a child my family used to play a game where one person left the room and a small object would be hidden. The point of the game was to come back into the room and find the hidden thing. To help, the family would sing "How green you are" to the tune of "Auld Land Syne" getting louder the nearer you got to the object and going quieter if you moved away. The "green" then meant you were a bit slow on the uptake!"

If someone today said "How green you are" it would have a very different meaning and is linked to climate change and how "Eco" you are. Some time ago Trinity was an Eco Church but over the last few years we slipped a little, (through no fault of our own) and the Leadership Team asked me to look at regaining our Eco church status. This involved contacting a Christian voluntary organization called A Rocha who are the body who monitor and award the highly coveted gold, silver or bronze attainment awards. A Rocha have a questionnaire which asks how

'eco' you are in various aspects of Church life: the buildings, the garden, worship and teaching etc. In most categories we were nearly silver and close to gold in one or two. The questionnaire has now been completed and taking all the categories into consideration overall they will award us a Bronze certificate. This is really good news as it shows we are on the way and gives us something to work towards to improve our Eco status.



Along with the questionnaire A Rocha suggested that with the G7 meeting and then the COP26 Climate Change summit later in the year both taking place in the

UK, that every Church should hold a "Climate Sunday" service where we could think and pray about this precious planet of ours and how we impact on it and try to improve our relationship with the world around us. We held our climate service on 6th June where Glen had written a song especially for the service (see page 14 [Ed]) and also the quartet sang a song suggested by A Rocha ('Have mercy Lord'). (The lyrics of both songs are on pages 15-16 [Ed])

If you have any ideas about how we at Trinity can become even more Eco conscious then do let us know – even a simple thing like more car sharing can make quite a difference."



Glen writes - With Climate Change very much in the news recently, because of the G7 Summit in Carbis Bay, Cornwall, it seemed like a good time to release our latest song "Show Us The Way Lord". The song, which uses ideas from Psalm 25, Lev 26 v3 and Amos 4 v 6-11, was written specifically for our Climate Change Service at Trinity and was shared there then. 

On Saturday 16th October Trinity will host the **Circuit Mission Day**. We are privileged to welcome **Andrew Roberts** to lead the session. Andrew is a Methodist minister, formerly part of the Fresh Expressions team. He developed a programme of 'holy habits', practices which we can all adopt as part of daily life, based on St Luke's description of the early church in Acts 2. In 2016 **Holy Habits** was published in book form and has gained widespread acclaim as a model for Christian living and an inspiration to deeper discipleship. More details of the event to follow.

To risk or not to risk – that is the question!

At the start of lockdown I like to think I'd have scored 75%ish in a test on 'what are the lockdown rules?' Today I think I'd be doing well to get 50%. I am suffering risk confusion. I struggle to understand why a few dozen vaccinated people in a spacious church are not allowed to sing, whilst football fans shout and sing in their 1000's. The logical part of me is challenged!

Speaking recently to a Vicar, she related problems getting her congregation back into their 'safe' church. Meanwhile she regularly encountered them in the supermarket. We shared notes on the illogicality of it all. Maybe her congregation were right - don't do things you don't have to – which makes for some interesting thinking about the relative importance of physical and spiritual food and where we get our supplies!



What concerned 'Vicar' and I was the impact a heightened sense of risk has on how people feel. Many seem anxious and fearful where objectively they don't need to be. It's as

if Covid anxiety is infectious into other areas of our lives. Someone who before lockdown regularly walked alone told me they now feared doing so in case they were attacked. What's happening?

Sharing these thoughts at a ROC meeting, someone said they thought it would take a couple of years for our sense of risk to get back to 'normal'. We speculated whether the government would run a campaign to help society get back there quicker. I don't think we were filled with optimism! I also raised the issue with a contact in Woking Borough Council, who confirmed that similar concerns were being shared.

Is there anything we can do as a church community? At the time of writing we are giving thought to this. An idea is to hold a 'de-mystifying risk' event. We'd find a few experts, and in a light-hearted and engaging way explore and compare different risks with a view to re-calibrating our sense of what is risky and what is not. So can I request some feedback? If you think you or people you know would be interested in such an event (think 'fun quiz' with time to chat rather than 'lecture'), can you let me know? Perhaps this is something we should consider doing?

Some readers will have heard of Artaban, the rock musical which Daphne and friends have created. It tells the story of the fourth wise man who failed to make the journey to Bethlehem with the others because he was repeatedly waylaid by deeds to help the needy. Down-hearted by having to give away the gifts that he had intended for the baby Jesus (three gemstones – sapphire, ruby and pearl) he nevertheless perseveres, fired by a conviction that there is to be a new king who will bring light back into the world. Ultimately he reaches Jerusalem at the time of the crucifixion and comes to realise that, far from failing in his quest, he has achieved all that God could ask of him by the kindness and care he has shown for others.

It is an uplifting story (originally written by an American author Henry van Dyke over a hundred years ago). Daphne has written the libretto with song lyrics and music by two friends. A short workshop event was held in Pimlico in 2019 and now, delayed by lockdowns, the team are staging a showcase production at the Actor's Church in Covent Garden in November with a professional cast and director. Needless to say it would be great to see friends from Trinity in the audience. Details of dates, times and how to obtain tickets are on the flyer on the next page.
