

POST JULY 19th: CHURCH OF ENGLAND GUIDANCE (followed by responses from both our churches)

MASKS: The Church of England does not instruct churches to enforce mask-wearing but advises: "Although it will no longer be a legal requirement to wear a face covering, the government has stated that it 'expects and recommends' that people wear face coverings in crowded and enclosed settings to protect themselves and others.

"Churches may well decide to continue to ask people to use them and/or to maintain social distancing, especially during busy events. Although such a request will not be legally enforceable it can be positioned as a way of easing the transition back towards prepandemic ways of worshipping whilst showing consideration for others."

SINGING: The Church of England has confirmed that "Yes, from 19th July singing and musical performances of all kinds are allowed in churches, including congregational singing, and choirs and worship groups can perform without legal limitations."

It warns that singing or raised voices can increase the risk and that ventilation, singing outside or wearing a face covering would limit the risk.

"Singing (and generally meeting) outdoors is a safer way of gathering, and where this is possible it could be a good alternative to meeting indoors."

Bell ringers are no longer restricted by social distancing either.

VACCINE STATUS: The C of E guidance says: "It is not a requirement, nor is it appropriate, to ask people if they have been vaccinated."

There is also no legal requirement to show the NHS track and trace QR code from Monday, churches "may still choose to...but you do not have to."

DIFFERENT SERVICES: The Church says different services could be held to accommodate different congregants' attitudes to Covid, for example a service with social distancing and a service without. It also recommends having different rooms, where possible, to separate those with different preferences.

The House of Bishops says: "This is certainly an option, especially if your pattern of worship means you regularly hold multiple services on a Sunday. If you have multiple services one after the other (for example a 9am mass followed by a 10.30am sung service) bear in mind that because Covid 19 particles can remain the air you should have services with more measures before those with less, to minimise the chances of infection and give greater security to those who are continuing to act cautiously. Outdoor worship continues to be safer with regards to the virus spreading than indoor situations and where conditions and circumstances permit is a helpful option."

CHILDREN: When it comes to children's activities, the Church says: "There are no longer any legal restrictions on children and youth groups, and it is no longer required keep children in 'bubbles'. This applies in all contexts, wherever groups are meeting.

"Sensible cleaning and hygiene practices such as hand sanitiser are still a good idea."

CATERING: Food and drink can be provided and church cafés can open with no restrictions in place, although masks are recommended in crowded places. This means 'bring and share' lunches can come back, or evangelistic events with food.

In addition to these specific recommendations, the House of Bishops has suggestions to help church goers who might feel anxious. It advises continuing to provide online worship, having the order of service online so people can download it and providing red, amber or green stickers to indicate someone's social distancing preferences.

ST LUKE'S RESPONSE

Following the publication of the latest guidelines from both the Government and the House of Bishops, we judge that it is too early to make any changes to our existing protocols at St Luke's. There will obviously be differing views within our church on how and when it is sensible to approach the easing of restrictions. To give us time to ensure that we canvass the views of as many of our congregation as possible, and also to take account of the need for certainty in the minds of those organisations which use our church, we recommend to PCC that we retain the existing arrangements for worship and use of the church, pending the outcome of these discussions.

ST CHAD'S RESPONSE

The outcome of the PCC meeting held on Monday 19th July 2021 –

Please note that this is for the safety of all our members. You will all be aware that the Government Step 4 or Freedom-day has now come into action. Having received an 8-page document from the Bishop outlining the church's response to the Step 4 plan the following decisions have been made:

Note: the important parts of the document are that the decision was for each Incumbent to make (with or without the PCC) because they have better knowledge of their own church and community but the advice is to air on the side of caution.

Obviously as we have no incumbent the responsibility for St Chad's lies with the Wardens and the PCC hence the Zoom meeting last night and the unanimously agreed decision that there will be no changes to the current restrictions within the church at this time.

We will review the situation again nearing the end of August, therefore

- social distancing will remain
- masks to be worn inside the building
- everyone must sanitise hands on entering/leaving the building

We feel this is appropriate for our members and we hope you appreciate the reasoning behind this decision. The only difference will be that we can sing with our masks on, though now it is legal!!

Come follow Christ in the footsteps of St Chad

AUGUST IS PERHAPS THE MONTH WE MOST ASSOCIATE WITH OVERSEAS EXPERIENCES, AND REV'D PHILIP SWAN RECOLLECTS SOME HOME-FROM-HOME MOMENTS

Working with the Biggest Corporation in the World – the Church

Can you guess the source of this headline? It is in fact taken from a recent article in The Guardian which went on to say that even 'China Petro-Chemical, the largest corporation in the world with a labour force of around 1,190,000 employees, is still at least a thousand times smaller than this global movement'. In 2020 there were an estimated 2.4 billion Christians, making up approximately a third of the world's population.

We are accustomed to receiving global news instantly and the current pandemic and the climate crisis underline our interdependence with everyone on this planet. And yet many of us find it hard to see the bigger picture. Milton Jones, a comedian who is something of an expert in humorous one-liners and a recurring guest panellist on 'Mock the Week' suggested poignantly that "The biggest question the church is asking the world is: Can we have some money for a new roof?"

I remember celebrating Easter Morning on the border of Uganda with a congregation of Anglican Christians. There were no church roofs to worry about — we met in the shade of some large trees. Many had walked considerable distances from the surrounding villages to be there and brought with them costly and sacrificial gifts such as eggs, chickens, cassava and in some cases money for the much-extended time of joy-filled offering. Afterwards we shared in a magnificent feast at which all were welcome.

I have been so blessed and enriched through my friendships and encounters with the world-wide church. Lichfield Diocese has for many years taken very seriously its part in the world- wide Anglican Communion through partnerships and links with other dioceses. Currently, as I anticipate my impending retirement from what has been a wonderfully fulfilling and rewarding job as World Mission Enabler in this diocese, we have been running a number of Zoom sessions with our global companions from S. Africa, S.E. Asia, Ireland, Canada and Northern Germany. We have celebrated our shared past, become informed about our present realities and committed ourselves to journeying together into God's future.

A former General Secretary of the Church Mission Society, Max Warren said, 'It takes the whole world to know the whole Christ'. In other words the insights we gain from new and different perspectives and from the experiences of others in following Christ across different cultures and contexts help shed light on God in human form — and so we are not just stuck with our particular and limited view of things. Let's work with the biggest corporation in the world — it's a win-win.

Froghoppers and Cuckoo Spit!

Have you ever wondered what makes the white, frothy clumps of bubbles that you sometimes see on plants during the summer? Known as Cuckoo spit, Frog spit or Snake spit this is not actually spittle at all, but is produced by juvenile Froghoppers or Spittlebugs. The larva feeds on



plant sap and much of the liquid passes through its little body and out again, under pressure. The grub blows a little air into the sticky sap and it bubbles up to form the clump



of bubbles. These bubbles provide excellent protection for the growing bug, insulating it from changes in temperature and from drying out. It is also a deterrent against predators. If you look inside the protecting bubbles you will find a single young froghopper, pale green like the plant on which it feeds. Adult Froghoppers have a

different system for avoiding predation, as their name suggests, they hop, sometimes jumping up to 70cm vertically, over 100 times their own length of between 5 and 7mm! They are often brown in colour, and thought to look a little like frogs.

Churchyards and cemeteries can hold a wide range of insect species, in part because of the lack of insecticides used. Most burial grounds have changed little over the decades and centuries, and this has allowed a wide range of insect species to build up. It is not uncommon for entomologists to find rarities in these special places. You can help insects by having differently managed areas within your churchyard. How about some short grass for solitary bees and wasps, longer grass for bees, butterflies and froghoppers and also an area of coarse or tussocky grass and plants such as cow parsley, perhaps against a hedge or wall. This will provide overwintering places for all sorts of animals as well as insects.
