

Thank you for your donations for March which amounted to 105kg.

We were not open over Easter weekend, having taken the decision to close on Good Friday. However, I was at the Foodbank in case anyone turned up – and ended up fulfilling three vouchers and advising two other clients who had turned up with the hope of seeing Citizens Advice and Adullam Housing. I think overall it was the right decision not to open, and gave the volunteers a very well earned rest. The trend for a reduced number of clients continues, although, as I discussed in a conversation with one of our referral agents earlier today, those clients we are seeing seem to be more “stuck” in their respective financial situations. We are obviously trying to do as much as we can to help by referral to the most appropriate partnership agencies, but none of us have a magic wand to make insufficient income cover ever increasing outgoings.

Here are the numbers for March 2024, with March 2023 in brackets:

Total vouchers fulfilled	= 97 (125)
No. of Adults fed	= 134 (167)
No. of Children fed	= 57 (91)
Total no. fed	= 191 (258)

During the month, 71 clients had 1 voucher, 10 clients had 2 vouchers, and 2 clients had 3 vouchers. This is a reflection of my earlier comment, and for some high usage clients, we are becoming their only source of food. I continue to monitor those who are frequent visitors, but, in reality, their circumstances are unlikely to change in the near future, and we need to continue to support them as best we can.

We were blessed with very generous donations of Easter eggs from Leek Town Football Club and Leek Building Society, along with some bars of Easter chocolate from Cadburys, so all who have visited the Foodbank during March have been able to leave with a chocolate treat of some description, which has certainly brought a smile to many faces! And we’ve still got some left.....! We also gave some to St Edward’s and St Paul’s churches in Leek, for them to distribute with their school holiday meal provision. So, thank you so much to both organisations for enabling us to help so many people in the Leek area.

On 15th March I attended an event at the Council Offices, organised by the North Staffordshire Financial Inclusion Group. This was set up in 2020 with the following purpose – “We are a group of partners in Stoke on Trent and Newcastle under Lyme who work together and individually to deliver consistently high quality support to people who have money issues.” Since then, the services the partner organisations provide have expanded into Staffordshire Moorlands, and the purpose of this event was to ensure that everyone knows who everyone is, what they do, and how to access their help. It was a really good networking event, and hopefully, now, any organisation who comes into contact with anyone in financial difficulties will know where to signpost them directly. One of the organisations present at the event was Residential Energy Services - <https://residentialenergyservices.co.uk/> - who can advise people on how to make their homes more energy efficient, and also look into the availability of grants to make any adaptations. They can work with homeowners and tenants, and will be doing their first drop in session at the Foodbank on Tuesday 9th April.

Those of you who live in the Staffordshire Moorlands will have hopefully received your copy of the Worrying about Money leaflet – along with your council tax bill! This is the leaflet that has been produced by the Independent Food Aid Network in conjunction with local councils across the UK -

<https://www.foodaidnetwork.org.uk/cash-first-leaflet-information> - with the aim of encouraging people to look at maximising their income and accessing financial entitlements, rather than relying entirely on charitable food, which can only ever be a short term solution. Although I may be a little cynical at times about the amount/quality of help that is available, I do think that this is a very worthwhile piece of work, and the production of the leaflet has been the result of some very useful and informative partnership working. Following on from this, we will also be hosting one of the District Councillors and one of the SMDC Officers at the Foodbank on Tuesday 9th April, who will chat to the clients and answer any questions they might have.

One of the more light-hearted highlights of the month was another visit from the 4th Leek Beavers. They are a truly delightful group, and we love the organised chaos that reigns for an hour and a half! This year we split them into three groups, with one group sorting and dating donations, one group making up food parcels, and the third group doing some exercises on how to budget, and the difference between “want” and “need” when it comes to spending money – they all got a turn at everything! I was so delighted to hear that they do actually do this as part of the work for their Money Skills badge, as it is something that everyone should really learn at an early age. Especially in light of the following, a little nugget of knowledge I picked up at the Financial Inclusion Group event – “Research from Cambridge University has revealed that our approach to money is basically set by the age of seven. Behaviour experts from Cambridge reviewed previous studies to determine how children learn in general, and in particular, how they learn about money. They concluded that money habits, including the ability to plan ahead, are usually formed in early childhood. The study found that most people’s money habits are formed from zero to 7 years of age, and that once formed it’s difficult to reverse those habits later on in life.” Surprising – and alarming.

Our needs remain pretty much the same, with a particular request for tinned meat, as this is a relatively high cost item and not often donated. If only we could return some of our beans and ask for meat instead! Anything like minced beef and onions, Irish stew, stewing steak, chicken in white sauce or mild chilli or curry would be really welcome. Thank you.

PIONEERING PARISHES – CREATIVELY CONNECTING CHURCH AND COMMUNITY



Pioneering Parishes

Maybe you have a great idea for how your parish church could connect more with its local community, but you don't know how to make this vision a reality? Maybe you'd love to be more focused on mission, but your church seems to be using up all their energy on supporting day-to-day ministry? Or maybe you find the term 'pioneering' rather mysterious and question its relevance to parish life? The Pioneering Parishes programme enables participants with questions just like these to discover how to become more outward looking, moving energy from inside the church to mission within our parish communities. Through involvement in a series of webinars and learning spaces, connection and conversation with parishioners, pioneers and priests will help explore how pioneering is integral to parish life. Clergy and congregation members will be inspired and equipped to shift church culture to enable the cure of souls to be extended into all the parish.

Pioneering Parishes is a project run through the Church Mission Society (CMS) and led by a team that deeply understands and inhabits both pioneering and parish ministry. Lichfield Diocese is excited to be partnering with Pioneering Parishes from April 2024 to facilitate the delivery of on-line webinars and in-house training, supporting the development of fresh expressions and new worshipping communities across city, urban and rural settings.

The Pioneering Parishes team facilitates a series of 90-minute webinars for individuals from parishes or, even better, groups can sign up and explore ideas and learning together. You can find out more about the programme and read inspiring stories of how parishes have developed mission in their specific contexts on the website: <https://churchmissionsociety.org/pioneering-parishes/>

One story describes how churches in Cosham, Portsmouth, set up a community larder; the Vicar, Revd Amy Webb saying of Pioneering Parishes "the training ...helped us to develop a 'let's give it a go' attitude and challenged us to set about changing the culture of our church, which over time had become very inward looking.

"This then meant that during the pandemic, when a secular charity asked us if we would be willing to set up and run a food pantry in a local park, we felt able to say yes. And we said 'yes' without us having any financial or human resources to speak of, or any firm plan as to how this would be possible.

"Step by step we worked it out. This was our opportunity to be the body of Christ out in our community, to share the love of God, build relationships and see what might develop from that'." Read more here: <https://churchmissionsociety.org/stories/feeding-hearts-and-souls-as-well-as-tummies/>.






Seeking Slowworms

There's often a secret to be found within a churchyard or cemetery, slowworms may be living there, rarely seen by visitors as they tend to hide within the vegetation and don't emerge to bask in the sun like other reptiles. Slowworms are not particularly slow and they are not worms, neither are they snakes. They are actually lizards without legs and, when warmed up and active

can be pretty nippy! Slowworms hunt in hidden places such as compost heaps, thick vegetation at the base of a wall or hedge and within piles of logs or stones. They catch slower moving prey like slugs and can 'drop' their tails to escape predators, a characteristic of all lizards.



May is a good time to look for them and the easiest way to do this is to put out some pieces of old roofing material, about 50cm square. You can use corrugated tin, but this can have sharp edges, onduline is better and a supplier may give you some offcuts for free. Following a conversation with those who manage the site, place a few of these squares in areas that catch the morning sun and are away from paths, perhaps in rougher vegetation such as tussocky grass. Slowworms will go under the squares to warm up in the mornings before going out to hunt and may be there at any time of day in colder weather.

Check the squares about once a week, lifting one side carefully and looking underneath. Try and check between 8:00 and 10:00am for best results as this is when the animals are warming up. You may be rewarded by a slowworm and also many other creatures such as worms, beetles or woodlice. Why not take a quick picture as the square is lifted, before too much scurries or slithers off! It may take animals a while to find the squares so be patient, having more squares gives a better chance of seeing slowworms.

Churchyards and cemeteries are havens for reptiles and also amphibians such as frogs, toads and newts and we're collecting information to better understand just how important they are for these animals. Please take a photo using the iNaturalist app or let us know what you've seen via email if you don't use iNaturalist. You can keep checking for slowworms from April or May through to September. Why not include a peep under the square as part of a Churches Count on Nature event during Love Your Burial Ground week - 8th and 16th June.
