

MENZOWN NOVEMBER MEETING

Malcolm Brooke from Stamford Bridge presented an illustrated survey of R.A.F. 49 Squadron. The story begins in Dover in 1916. The aircraft were relatively slight in construction. Crashes were frequent. Disbanded in 1919, the squadron was reformed in 1936. Early work included the dropping of propaganda leaflets by the thousand and mines. The first planes were Hampdens, followed by Manchesters. Both of these posed operational challenges. The more familiar Lancaster bombers were welcomed. Their story is one of both success and losses: airman, missing or dead. 1943 was a particularly bad year. Mr. Brooke indicated how uncertain and precarious a flying mission could be. A change of wind direction was enough to tip the scales from success to loss. He showed photographs of long pipes, laid across Lincolnshire fields, to burn many gallons of precious fuel, to disperse fog, which disrupted so many flights to and from that county's many airfields. After the end of WW2, the Squadron flew many prisoners of war home and worked during the Mau Mau emergency in Kenya. The Squadron was finally disbanded in 1965. A vote of thanks was led by the webmaster David Harrison.

**From 'The Church Window' The Parish magazine for
Kirkbymoorside with Gillamoor and Bransdale with Farndale – July
1956**

"Once upon a time"

Just lately there have been several searchings of the old registers by people looking up their ancestors – and in getting out the registers I found again the old church account book for Kirkbymoorside. There are some interesting things in it – the dedication of the new tower clock in 1894, further back, the balance sheet of the restoration of the church - it cost £1217 – not a great deal considering the work done, but of course labour was cheaper then? Gillamoor and Cockayne (which belonged to Kirkbymoorside parish then) were charged by the Ecclesiastical court at York in 1723 as follows: "the several churchwardens – as also their successors or ever hereafter shall bear defray and pay to the churchwardens of Kirkby Moorside and their successors for ever one third part of all manner of charges and expenses for the repairs of the nave of the said church and steeple of Kirkby Moorside : as also the same towards the repairs of the paving of or laying of the floor thereof : and also towards the glazing of the windows and repairs of the doors thereof"

I wonder if they did!

TWEENAGER'S SATISFACTION

According to its website, the Children's Society "fights for the hope and happiness of young people". It seeks to do this in part by assessing quality research of others, as well as undertaking research itself. Once a year, it produces *The Good Childhood Report*, and the most recent issue tracks trends over the last 10 years of the satisfaction that tweenagers (aged 10-15 years) have with life, friends, school and their appearance.

The survey found that many, perhaps a quarter, of children did not cope well with the changes forced on them by the pandemic. That will include some church children, and if the proportion is the same for them that would mean 160,000 tweenagers in English churches and 18,000 in Scottish churches.

However, while it is easy to suggest the downward life satisfaction trend is because of the pandemic, in reality the various trends have been broadly consistent over the last decade. Furthermore, some years the satisfaction value increases, though never simultaneously across all items. There is also a clear 'pecking order' in tweenagers' concerns with friends coming clearly at the top, followed by life as a whole, then school and then appearance.

A NEW BIBLE FOR ALL YOUR FAMILY

In partnership with Youth for Christ and several other family-focussed organisations, the Bible Society has created an edition of the Bible specifically designed for families.

The Good News Bible – Family Edition has plenty of features to help each member of the family engage with the Bible at their own pace.

The Bible Society says: "We know that doing Bible reading as a group can be difficult, so we have designed this new Bible to be a resource that encourages families to respond creatively to the text, whilst supporting individual preferences for engaging.

Based on the five themes of THINK, CHAT, DO, CREATE and WATCH, the Bible contains "plenty of interactions" to suit every member of a family.

The aim is to allow families "to journey through the Bible together", and in the process come closer to God, and to each other.

ADVENT

Waiting is not popular in our culture, when so much can be obtained simply at the press of a button! Advent, when we wait for the coming of Christmas, is also an opportunity to learn what it means to be waiting for the promised return of Jesus. He says: 'It's like a man going away: he leaves his house and puts his servants in charge, each with their assigned task, and tells the one at the door to keep watch. Therefore, keep watch because you do not know when the owner of the house will come back' (Mark 13:34-35).

We live between Jesus' first and second comings and this parable reminds us of the need to watch and wait, as disciples living faithfully for Him. It reminds us of two kinds of waiting: *passive* and active. Imagine you're at the railway station, awaiting the arrival of a train. On the platform a man is asleep, as he thinks there is plenty of time before the train arrives. He is passively waiting. There is also a small boy on the platform who is excited about the train coming. He can't sit still and constantly looks down the track to see if the train is coming. He is actively waiting, for he expects the train to arrive at any moment.

Advent gives us a choice: *how will we wait for Jesus' coming?* Passive waiting doesn't require much attention on our part. We can live our Christian life pre-occupied with our own concerns, rather than looking to God. However, active waiting involves an eager expectation, as we await Jesus' return or simply look to him coming to us today. All we want is to be found faithful as His disciples. There is nothing more important than being ready to meet our Master!



AMAZED!

Some people like surprises. The pleasant ones, anyway!

When we look at the Christmas story, it is full of surprises. Mary didn't expect to be chosen by God to give birth to His Son. Joseph was surprised and shocked that his fiancée was pregnant. The couple thought they would start married life together in Nazareth, but political circumstances forced them to go to Bethlehem and then into Egypt.

The Bethlehem shepherds were surprised and frightened by the heavenly choir and an angel with a marvellous message. Later, they rejoiced at seeing the Saviour – a new born baby in a manger.

The Wise Men were surprised to see a unique star, and so they followed it all the way to Jerusalem. They thought a royal birth would be in a city and in

Herod's Palace. They were surprised again, to be redirected to a remote village called Bethlehem. Herod too was surprised that a new king had come, and felt his position and authority were being threatened.

WHEN SOMEONE YOU LOVED IS DEAD

Following on from last month, the other lessons that I learned following my wife's death were:

11. That it helps to talk about your loss and the person you have lost. Sharing helps you to put things together in your mind and is healing in itself.
12. Don't be afraid of pain, and don't anaesthetise it or avoid it – acknowledge it, face it, and you will heal more quickly.
13. That crying is normal, even for men, and it is a healing part of the grief process. Don't be afraid of this, even in public.
14. It may surprise you, to discover which people draw near to you in your grief, and who steps away. Appreciate those who come closer, without judging those who hold back.
15. Not everything people say to you about grief and your response will be helpful. Decide for yourself what is important for you, and let the rest go.
16. That grief may expose some of your inner fault-lines, but don't be afraid of this – learning more about yourself is a gift that comes with grieving.
17. No-one grieves perfectly. Following the death of your loved one, you will make mistakes, bad choices, and errors of judgment. This is normal, so forgive yourself.
18. That hope will rise again within you. The human spirit, in combination with God's grace, has its own remarkable resilience.
19. Don't be afraid to live again. God has a good purpose for you, and a plan for your life.
20. That your faith is an asset, not a liability. When you are tempted to be angry with God, remember that He is an ever-present help in time of need. Lean on Him.
21. That you have a part to play in your grief journey, so don't be passive and allow it to overwhelm you – begin to do what you can to rebuild your life.



A CHRISTMAS GIFT

It's not easy getting the right Christmas present for others, especially in these uncertain times. However, the Magi's gifts were entirely appropriate and help us to understand God's gift of Jesus to us.

'On coming to the house, they saw the child with His mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped Him. Then they opened their treasures and presented Him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh.' (Matt 2:11). These were the expensive kind of gifts that visitors from the east would bring: gold, frankincense (a plant gum resin used in incense) and myrrh (another resin used in perfumes).

Who is He?

Gold is a gift for a king. In Jesus, we see a king in baby clothes. The worship of the wise men was costly, not only in terms of their gifts but for their lives.

Why did He come?

Frankincense was used by the priests in the temple in offering sacrifices. Jesus, as the ultimate priest, is the one who came to bring God and man together. He could do this because He is both divine and human.

What did it cost Him?

Myrrh was used to embalm the dead. This gift reminds us that the baby of Bethlehem would die on the cross to give His life for us. The wood of the crib and the cross are the same wood!

What are we going to offer Him this Christmas?

Jesus is *Christ*, the king who comes to rule our lives; He's Lord, the One who knows what it's like to be human as well as divine; and He's Saviour, who enables us to be friends of God.

BE KIND TO YOUR NEIGHBOUR

This Christmas, why not make an extra effort to be kind to your neighbours? It seems that neighbourly distrust has grown more than fivefold since the summer of 2020, with one in five of us now saying that relations in our community have soured.

On the plus side, there are still 25 per cent of us who report greater trust in our neighbourhoods. But on the debit side, now 22 per cent of us, up from just four per cent, have reported a deterioration.

The research was carried out at University College London (UCL), who found that one in five of us now feel less cohesive with our neighbours, feeling that we have fewer shared values with them.

As one researcher put it, “Much has changed over the last 18 months, with limits to our freedom, how we interact with other, and changes to how we shop and travel. Perhaps these restrictions have caused some to feel less satisfied with life in their community.”

Proverbs 11:12 advises: ‘Whoever derides their neighbour has no sense, but the one who has understanding holds their tongue.’ Proverbs 27:10 advises: ‘Do not go to your relative’s house when disaster strikes you— better a neighbour nearby than a relative far away.’

TREES ARE

How many Christmas trees will you have this year? Last year many bored families, stuck at home during the festive season, decided to branch out and set up two or more Christmas trees – often one in a pot for the front of the house, and a bigger one inside.

It seems that two trees helped people to feel more festive. According to John Lewis and Waitrose, more than 268,000 feet of Christmas trees were purchased last Christmas – equivalent to nine times the height of Mount Everest. That takes a lot of fairy lights and baubles!

BATTLE OF THE THERMOSTAT

If you and your partner have rows about how hot the house should be this Christmas, bear this in mind: women really do need the heat turned up more than men do. Recent research has found that the difference in the sexes also applies to other species, from mammals to birds.

As one scientist at Tel Aviv's University's College of Zoology said, "among many species of birds and mammals, females prefer a warmer environment, and at times these preferences cause segregation between the sexes. In the human realm, this difference in thermal sensation did not come about so that we could argue with our partners over the heating, but rather the opposite: it is meant to make the couple take distance from each other so that each individual can enjoy some peace and quiet."



DWINDLING WILDLIFE IN BRITAIN

Be kind to the wildlife in your garden – what little of it remains. The UK is one of the world's most nature-depleted countries, and it may not even have enough biodiversity – variety of plant and animal life – to prevent an ecological meltdown.

That is the finding of new data by the Natural History Museum. It says that the UK has an average of only 53 per cent of its natural biodiversity left, well below the global average of 75 per cent.

Worldwide, scientists warn that the variety of plant and animal life of earth is dwindling fast. It will have a serious impact on human life: "those systems have lost enough to mean that we have to be careful about relying on them functioning in the way that we need them to."


