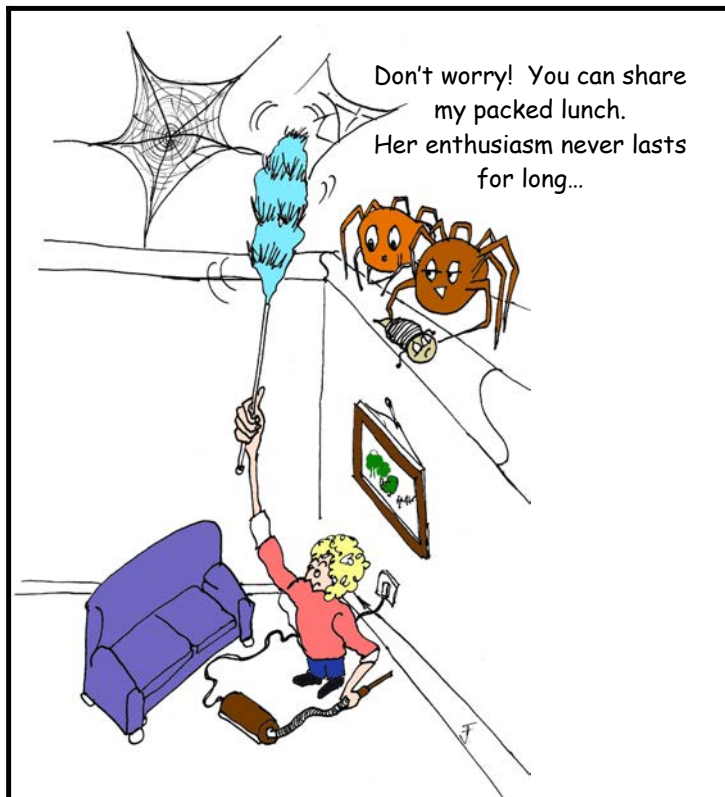

From the Vicarage



This Easter, our sermon series has centred on dramatic episodes from Jesus's life, like his transfiguration on the mountain and his temptation in the wilderness.

On the mountain, Jesus's face shone with a miraculous light. This echoes Moses's encounter with God on Mount Sinai thousands of years prior, when his face also shone. When Moses descended the mountain, he brought the tablets of the law. When Jesus descended the mountain, he brought nothing but himself. Rather than a list of rules for us to do, Jesus offers us himself as the model for how we might be.

In the wilderness, Jesus faced temptation, much like the story of Adam in the Garden of Eden. Adam had all he could ever want but gave in to temptation almost immediately. Jesus, however, having spent 40 days without food or shelter in the opposite of a garden, resists temptation again and again. Jesus is often called the new Adam. The first Adam models a life of do anything. Jesus, as the new Adam, models how to be our best selves.

Jesus blows apart ideas of religion as stuff we do— rituals to perform, rules to follow. The old WWJD (What Would Jesus Do?) bracelets encouraged this mindset. But a better question is: Who Would Jesus Be? His way isn't just about mere actions but about our best selves... our identity.

This Easter may you find time to ask yourself, "Who do I want to be?" Asking this question is what led me to Christ, as he shows again and again what it's like to be my best self: who my creator blessed me to be. Through all of life's ups and downs, my own failings included, I've never looked back. Have a happy Easter!

Farmyard Tails

Spring has sprung and our thoughts and work here on the farm turn to calving and grass growth.

We have 11 Highlands due to calve this year, we took the decision to retire quite a few last year. We have had 4 cows calve to date, 2 heifers and 2 steers so far. These are all doing very well. They are having a run around a small paddock during the day and coming inside at night. As our fold of Highlands get older we keep a close eye on them to determine whether they are strong enough to calve the next year.

The main factor we take into account is how fit the cow is when she is feeding the calf. Some cows “milk off their backs” a term used when the cow uses her own supply of body fat to produce milk for her calf. These cows will then loose weight and body condition quickly during lactation which means they will have to be fed a high protein feed pellet to help them. Other cows stay quite chunky throughout lactation and these are considered to be a better cow and a breeding line worth keeping.

Hopefully next month (April) we will start turning the cows and any calves that have been born out to pasture.

This reduces our workload considerably which is good and means we have more time to do other jobs around the farm.

We have to ensure the difference between daytime and night time temperatures are stable as a large fluctuation can stress a calf and cause pneumonia which can in many cases be fatal if not picked up quickly. We walk around the groups of cattle at least twice a day when they are out checking all is ok. Milking problems, flies around the teats, udder problems etc all have to be addressed should they arise.

It is vitally important to get the cows out onto the spring grass as early as possible. The spring grass is lush and very high in sugars which in turn boosts milk production and calf growth.

The fields will be rolled to flatten any lumps and harrowed to pull out any dead thatch (like a grass rake but on a larger scale) this allows the new fresh grass shoots to emerge.

Some of our fields are for hay production only. We tend to use the fields near to the house as grazing fields as it's not so far to walk to check the cows.

Last years Hedgehog is appearing each night for his cat food and I hope he/she will be joined by another one this year, fingers crossed.

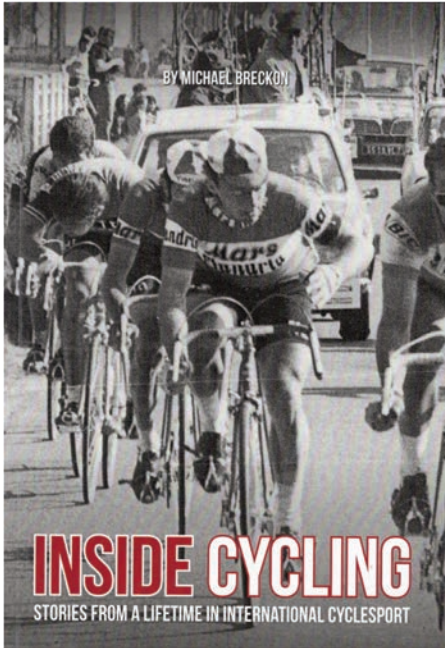
Our Toulouse geese are laying well as are our mixed bunch of hens.

Michael Breckon

A Lifetime in International Cycling

One of my lovely neighbours is Michael Breckon, a most unassuming man with a fascinating and great history in the world of international cycling. He has completed and self published a 230 page book about his times in this sport. There is an accompanying web site that contains images collected over 50 years of the “greats” in cycling, many of which have not been previously made public.

Michael was born in Kent and by the age of 10 lived in Harrogate, Yorkshire. In 1953, aged 16, he bought a bike and thought nothing of cycling 204 miles to London overnight to join in the Coronation celebrations. After National Service he started to compete in road time trials with The Yorkshire Road Club, winning several titles and getting best results. Not having a university degree resulted in limited career options so Michael and his wife emigrated to Montreal in Canada in 1962. He got involved in organising cycling championships, planning

routes etc as well as commentating on national TV about the sport. He became Marketing Director for Air Canada. This involved a lot of international travel - one week experiencing 16 time changes and 12,000 air miles before a national road race championship at the weekend. He also managed the Canadian Cycling Team at the ill fated Munich Olympics.

Returning to the UK Michael was asked to create and manage the Team Raleigh cycling team, which went on to achieve great results. In his last year of racing, at the age of 63, he managed a 25 mile time trial in 58 minutes and in a

12 hour race he cycled 220 miles. As well as being involved in Tour de France and many other prestigious cycling events, Michael found time to create routes on the UK National Cycling Network enjoyed by many people today.

Michael is now enjoying a well earned rest in Fulbeck with his wife Carole. What a life!!

Kathleen's Kitchen

I took this to our WI Art & Craft Group & it was so popular, that there was none left. I was asked if I could put the recipe in our Parish Magazine, so here it is.

Fruit Tea Loaf (All weights & measures are approximate)

Ingredients

12oz/350 grams mixed dried fruit (I used Raisins, Sultanas, Glacé Cherries & Crystallised Pineapple). Or any fruit, divided into whatever quantities preferred.
6oz/180 grams Dark Brown Sugar (f you want it sweeter, use 8oz)
1/2 pint/300 ml of hot & very strong tea (I used Yorkshire tea using 3 tea bags,
10oz/275 grams of Self-raising Flour or Plain Flour & 2 tsp of Baking Powder
Zest of a lemon (I squeezed some of the juice into the mixture after zesting)
1 large egg - beaten

Instructions

Put the dried fruit and sugar in a bowl and pour over the hot tea.

Leave to soak overnight, or if you can't wait that long, then do it for 3 hours.

Heat the oven to 150C/130C fan/gas 2

Line a 900g/2lb loaf tin with baking parchment or use a loaf tin liner

Add the flour, lemon zest and beaten egg and stir with a spoon till mixed through.

Bake for 60 mins to 90 mins (Ovens vary, so do it until it is well risen, firm to the touch and a skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean).

Leave to cool in the tin for 15 - 20 minutes then turn out onto a wire rack to cool.

Once cooled serve sliced (we had it without butter)

This freezes well - defrost the night before you need it.

The Green Page

In the UK alone we have already lost around 13 species of bee, as well as 35 other species that are facing the risk of extinction. This decline affects us all, due to the fact that bees are responsible for pollinating the very food that makes our diets healthy.

But what is causing a decline in bee populations? The increased use of pesticides in farming - especially the use of neonicotinoids. However, neonicotinoids are banned in the UK and in January of this year, the government announced that this pesticide will not even be used in an emergency situation - hooray!

Although, pesticides are not the only cause of bee decline. There's also considerably less shelter for bees due to habitat loss. Not to mention, there aren't enough flowers for our bees meaning they are losing their access to food, as well as the ability to nest in these flowers.

Climate change is also hitting bees hard. The weather being wetter or drier than it is supposed to be means that bees may not get access to food as the timing of the flowers they are relying on shifts. Bees could end up becoming inactive at the time when those flowers begin to bloom. So, how can we help our bees? We have banned a harmful pesticide but there is still a long way to go until the threat for these bees is decreased significantly. Planting more flowers in your garden is a good place to start - this will encourage visitation!

Don't worry if this isn't something available to you - there's always the option of supporting local beekeepers! Keep an eye out for locally produced honey and beeswax! To leave this on a positive note - bees raised by dedicated beekeepers are healthier and more likely to withstand environmental changes!

Greater Lincolnshire Combined County Authority Mayoral Election and Lincolnshire County Council Elections - Thursday 1 May 2025

The scheduled election of all councillors for Lincolnshire County Council will be held on 1 May 2025, together with the first election of Mayor of the Greater Lincolnshire Combined County Authority. Polling stations across the South Kesteven District Council area will open at 7am and close at 10pm on this day.

Greater Lincolnshire Combined County Authority Mayoral Election.

Voters across the Greater Lincolnshire area, which includes the area covered by Lincolnshire County Council together with the areas of North East Lincolnshire and North Lincs, will vote for the first elected mayor for the Combined County Authority on 1 May.

Lincolnshire County Council Elections.

The election of the Lincolnshire County Councillors who represent the 14 county divisions within South Kesteven will also take place on 1 May;

The electoral divisions within the South Kesteven area are: Bourne North and Morton, Bourne South and Thurlby, Colsterworth Rural, Deepings East, Deepings West and Rural, Folkingham Rural, Grantham Barrowby, Grantham East, Grantham North, Grantham South, Grantham West, Hough, Stamford East and Stamford West.
