From the Clergy

A mild and calm November day brought 1,185 refugees across the channel – women, children and men – a number that's similar to the total population served by this parish magazine. It's the highest number of refugees in one day, in a year that has seen 23,500 people making this dangerous journey, with no guarantee of being granted asylum status at their journey's end.

Jon Featonby, the refugee and asylum policy manager at British Red Cross, said in a recent newspaper article: "It is a brutal, life-threatening journey, especially in the worsening winter weather. The immediate priorities must be to save lives and to ensure anyone who makes it to the UK is met with dignity and compassion – dry clothes, medical care, food, clean water and a safe place to sleep.'

Within days of these landings, I had the joy of retelling the nativity story with a group of Key Stage 1 children (that's infants in old money) at one of our primary schools; it's very special watching children making this ancient story their own.

This year it's not the cosy familiarity of the story that draws me, but its grittiness. A young, unmarried mother facing potential rejection by her community; a young couple compelled by an occupying army to travel to register for a census; Mary, so close to her due date, travelling in harsh conditions for over a week to reach Bethlehem. In spite of Mary's condition, accommodation is in short supply, so she gives birth in poor surroundings, without the support of family a first-time mother might expect; the couple are visited by strangers who offer both gifts and unsettling insights into the future of their new baby. A threat to those in power from his birth, according to St Matthew's account, Jesus and his parents are forced to leave all that's familiar and journey to Egypt as refugees. How many of those travelling across the channel might recognise part of their own story in the story we love to retell at Christmas?

I wanted to play Mary in the nativity. When other Marys were chosen, an angel was a good compromise (great wings), followed by a king (sparkly costume), a shepherd (less attractive costumes but with the benefit of toy sheep). I never had a desire to be the innkeeper (plain costume, too grumpy) but this year I see this character differently. There's no mention of him (or her) in the gospel account, which gives us permission to use our imaginations. I see a busy and harassed person, delighted their inn is full but most likely counting the days to when their guests will clear off home. A woman about to give birth was the last thing they needed but, in spite of this, the innkeeper shows compassion. Mary and Joseph are found some space, perhaps the innkeeper called the local mid-wife, brought clean water, offered a simple meal and some dignity. I hope that in my Christmas busyness, I might not miss the opportunity to be an innkeeper ...

With blessings this Christmas.

MICHAELCHURCH ESCLEY PRIMARY AND PRE SCHOOL

Christmas is fast approaching and this is, as I'm sure you are aware, an incredibly exciting time in primary schools with so much to look forward to. Our youngest children in Squirrel Class will be visiting Father Christmas again at the Madley Environmental Centre. Mr Crocker will be gathering our school Christmas tree with a small group of lucky children, then there is Christmas Decoration Day, the panto at the Courtyard, our delicious school Christmas dinner (with a visit from a white bearded gentleman to follow) and, most excitingly, the return of our Walking Nativity in Michaelchurch to look forward to as well. Last year's nativity could not go ahead because of Covid restrictions. This year, we will be asking everyone who attends to wear a face mask and for all adults and high school pupils attending to have negative lateral flow tests before coming along.

Swimming this term has been a huge success. Because of the closure of swimming pools due to Covid, the majority of children had either done very little or no swimming at all for nearly 2 years. We therefore took the decision to have two of our full-time teachers fully trained as swimming teachers and lifeguards. Consequently, we're able to take groups to the Riverside International Caravan and Leisure Park, Bronllys and make use of their excellent facilities. The groups of children we've taken so far have made excellent progress and we look forward to continuing these sessions in the Spring when the pool re-opens.

Covid has also had a huge impact on children's general physical activity levels and whilst rural children have, on the whole, fared better than children living in urban areas, they have still missed out on organized sporting activities during the past 18 months or so. We have been very keen therefore, to take advantage of as many sporting opportunities as possible for our children. Oak Class children have participated in hockey and football tournaments and all of Sapling Class participated in a small-schools football tournament too. On top of this, Year 6 spent the day in Hereford completing their Bikeability training with the fantastic BikeRight team. Lovely though it is to have a school where the only traffic is just an occasional tractor or cyclist going past the front playground, there are not really sufficient challenges, especially when it comes to dealing with traffic and road junctions, in Michaelchurch. We therefore decided to transport the children, and Mr Crocker, to Hereford so that they could complete their training in a proper, urban environment. Not only did they have a great time, they learnt a tremendous amount which will help them stay safe when they venture out onto the roads.

It's currently time to apply for a primary school place for September 2022. The online application process is open on the Herefordshire website, so if your child was born between 1st Sept 2017 and 31st Aug 2018 you need to make sure you complete this before 15th January 2022. If you're interested in sending your child to our lovely school (!), you're very welcome to contact us for a chat and a visit. We'd love to see you.

20 Years Serving the Community

On 17th December 2021 Hopes of Longtown will celebrate 20 years in business, serving the small community of Longtown.

When the village shop in Longtown closed Christine Hope, backed by her parents and now Business partners Jenny and Philip Hope, developed Hopes of Longtown on the family farm in 2001. Christine saw an opportunity for a vibrant village store which could serve its local community in a variety of ways.

Hopes of Longtown is more than just a village shop: not only do they stock a range of high-quality local produce, gifts and essentials, but they also provide support to local people. They act as a local food bank and offer a refill service allowing people to shop in an environmentally friendly way. More recently they have developed a Covid secure shopping environment to suit their customers differing needs, going the extra mile by offering an individual appointment service, popular at Christmas, allowing customers to shop at their leisure without feeling pressured. The Post Office, which opened at Hopes of Longtown in 2003 is an essential service for this rural community. It provides a much needed banking service at a time when an increasing number of banks are closing their doors in rural towns.

Just a stone's throw from the Welsh border, Hopes of Longtown utilises the vast number of small businesses that exist locally, stocking wonderful produce and gifts. #ShopLocal30 was the brainchild of Christine, who wanted to put local produce at the centre of the shopping basket. It is Christine's way of contributing to the local economy. By encouraging customers to shop locally, jobs in the area can be sustained and maybe even new ones created. Produce from within 30 miles of the shop is signposted, so that customers can easily see which products come from the local area.

Crucial to the success of Hopes of Longtown is its staff, a passionate team of people who value their community. During the recent pandemic the team went above and beyond for their customers, supporting them in whatever way they could, ranging from a quick chat, to taking their orders over the phone and delivering them in person on the same day. Hopes Of Longtown has acquired many awards and accolades over the years, but Christine prefers to measure success by how happy her customers are. She never stands still, always looking for new ways to add value and offer something more to her customers.

Due to the ongoing pandemic, there won't be a birthday party, but rather some small gestures to celebrate 20 years in serving a rural community.

Christine, Jenny and Philip agree, 'We're over the moon to reach this milestone! We've come a long way and couldn't have done it without the support of the local community, and members of the family coming to our rescue'.

UPDATE FROM LONGTOWN OUTDOOR LEARNING TRUST

The centre team were delighted to welcome back schools, children's homes, charities, youth groups and families to the centre throughout the summer months. Initial fears about the post-lockdown 'appetite' of many schools quickly subsided as residential bookings came in thick and fast. It soon became apparent that we would need additional manpower to keep pace with demand. Despite successful apprentice recruitment, the recruitment environment for other staff was (and remains) challenging. Matt Freer, our Chair of Trustees, suggested we made an appeal to the local community for help to enable us to get through our busiest time. We are indebted to the local community volunteers who volunteered their time to assist with the huge task of washing up for up to 120 people twice a day!

The centre's Coronavirus operating procedures kept pace with the DfE's expectations for schools throughout this period. Measures such as lateral flow testing for staff, additional cleaning routines for accommodation and equipment, quarantine routines for some equipment, additional ventilation in minibuses and face mask wearing in buses / certain rooms (and caves!) became commonplace.

One of the June weeks was the busiest the centre has ever experienced with an unprecedented number of children, schools and representative counties all having the opportunity to experience the great outdoors. Although there were many pressure points on our systems (staffing, resources, catering) a fantastic team effort ensured the success of the summer programmes.

The centre's Bell Tents and campground really proved their worth, not only providing surge capacity for accommodation but a more affordable means for many children to have their first experience of the great outdoors. They also proved very popular with local children at two different Adventure Club camps. The summer holidays not only provided the opportunity for us to offer our Bell Tents to hire for family camp groups from across the UK but also a chance to work with a diverse and inspirational range of groups including the Ellen McArthur Cancer Trust, Jamie's Farm and the Hope charity. We also ran holiday activities for 30 local children and over 50 children funded by Herefordshire Council's Holiday Activities and Food programme, ensuring that the children had a range of healthy activities and a healthy meal each day.

The centre was very fortunate to be able to harness some of the Government's recovery funding to attract three new apprentices to join our team for the coming year. We have been joined by Giles from Bradford, Emma from Bristol and Michael from St. Albans. They have quickly immersed themselves in our busy Autumn programme.

Despite alarmingly low bookings initially, this Autumn has seen an unprecedented number of new residential bookings including bookings from schools in Oxfordshire, Monmouthshire, London and Cardiff. We have also hosted the regular monthly sessions of the Abbey Dore Deanery Grow Strong project for local young people, a number of Scout groups and the Limbpower charity Family weekend. This inspirational weekend for family members with limb deficiencies was a huge success for all concerned. We were thrilled to hear that one of the Limbpower ambassadors who

had attended a previous Longtown weekend had just returned from Tokyo with a Paralympic swimming Silver medal!

We are also currently working with primary schools in Garway, Kingstone, Llanvihangel Crucorney and Longtown and run after school clubs in at least one school every evening. These clubs remain very popular but plans are now being made for the Spring term so do check the centre website www.longtownoutdoorlearning.co.uk to find out whether there are still any vacancies for the club at your school. We have also increased the day time P.E. sessions we do with local schools and are currently delivering weekly kayaking and rock climbing sessions for Longtown Primary and Hidelow Grange School pupils. It is exciting to think that some Olympians and Paralympians of the future may be taking their first steps in two outdoor sports whilst at the centre.

As a result of the expansion of bookings we are now recruiting to fill a number of posts in preparation for a busy year in 2022. The posts on offer are Catering assistant, Domestic assistant, Activity instructor and Outdoor Learning Tutor. Flexible employment hours are possible for all posts which will be considered on both an employed and freelance basis. Further information and application packs for all posts are available on the Trust's website.
