November is traditionally the time of year when you start hearing arguments about when to put up the Christmas decorations. Some people get the lights out and tree up before Remembrance Day (I don't think this is particularly appropriate). Others will talk wistfully of the old tradition that the Christmas tree was put up on Christmas Eve – and not before!



I'm not keen on the ever-expanding commercialisation of the season as Dobbies (other garden centres are available – and as guilty) starts Christmas as soon as the first autumn leaf falls. But the Bible has nothing to say about this argument, so I don't think it's something that should become a serious dispute among Christians.

Instead, I like to focus on the opportunities that the season of Advent presents to us. A time of anticipation, of hopefulness, of looking forward. Yes, there is certainly all of that with regard to Christmas, and recovering the sense of anticipation of the birth of Messiah. But more, this is about looking forward to the fullness of the Kingdom of God.

In the darkening days of winter (and, it seems, the darkening of our times) it is good to be reminded that God's unconquerable light shines on in the darkness, bringing hope for what is yet to be.

THE LITTLE THINGS

Much is written nowadays about the wonders of nature – wild swimming, forest bathing and the like. The benefits of spending time in Nature are well documented. However, it is my experience that such benefits can be found closer to home. It is not necessary to go far to find joy and simple pleasure in the little things.

I lean my arms on the kitchen worktop, settle myself, and watch and wait. Here he is with his hippety - hoppity flight from the holly tree to the apple tree. I see the sudden flash of red streak across the lichen covered branches once strewn with apples. The camouflage of green, from spring and summer, is long gone. The wee bird feeder in the shape of a bird house dangles from one of the branches. I topped it up earlier with crumbs of fruit loaf and cheese. I watch as the robin settles himself securely on a limb. His dull brown feathers ruffle in the breeze and his squat body seems to expand. His magnificent red streak however remains on display. Head up, alert, he watches all around checking out his surroundings. I can see his claws tighten on his branch then suddenly he swoops onto the platform of the bird feeder. He eats, peck, peck, pecking away then swiftly returns to his branch and I assume he has taken a tasty morsel back with him. His eager, beady eye seems to meet mine. I tell him he is special and with his head cocked to one side seems to nod in agreement. I lean further over the worktop ready to continue the conversation but he darts away, hippety hoppity as swiftly as he came. This visit brings me joy.

Next to arrive are the sparrows who emerge from the holly tree in a chattering cluster. They are in perpetual motion as they feed. Like wee contortionists they move into the most unlikely positions. Pecking furiously, they scatter morsels everywhere, all the time chitter chattering to each other. Are they deciding who goes next in their own relay team? They seem oblivious to my stares but just content to have breakfast provided for them. I am happy to do that.

Meanwhile on the ground Fatty Pigeon struts his stuff, hoovering up all that is being scattered from above. He bobs about, placing one foot in front of the other, like a dancer but with no sense of rhythm. He ruffles his grey feathers and his wee head disappears into his neck. He stands, feet planted and he gobbles the bounty on the ground. His beady eye darts about. He takes a break and parades up and down the grass. Then back to the trees, positioning himself under the sparrows, he starts again, pecking voraciously. He looks in my direction.

"Good morning," I say and I like to think he replies!

My other morning visitors include the blackbird, starlings, coal tits, blue tits, magpies and my pair of collared doves. Their fawn, grey plumage adds to their gentle appearance and often it is only their black collar which makes them visible. One feeds, one stands guard, then they swap as though they are protecting each other. Their calm movements and gentle appearance adds to their shyness. I try, telepathically through the glass, to make them look my way but it seems they only have eyes for each other.

Watching the birds in the garden gives me great pleasure. It's a calming start to my day. I don't need to go far to find wonder. It's right here, observed from my kitchen worktop. Gillian Cook

The Story of Panbride Old Parish Church

As this year draws to a close, we prepare for the sale of Panbride Church. Over the past two years, a group of people have worked tirelessly recording the contents of our church and then packing all the items ready for removal to Newton Church. It has been a time of mixed emotions for everyone. Many people from the wider community have expressed their feelings too, particularly in regard to the items which we must leave behind due to Panbride being a listed building.

With this in mind, I took the decision to write a book about our church. This book includes information about the Maule family and some of the gifts they gave us. It also mentions the Maule minister who was deposed by the Arbroath Presbytery for Jacobitism! There is a chapter on the burial aisle (crypt) and details about the inhabitants. Items of interest in the grounds of the church are also covered.

Within the church sanctuary, there are details about the people remembered on the plaques and also the Maule Crest. These are items which cannot be removed but, by recording them in this way, I hope they can be a legacy for future generations. Of course, there are so many other interesting items, too many to mention here! I have added an appendix at the end of the book listing the names and details of the men who lost their lives in both wars from our parish.

Although I have now completed the book, it is with the designer and will then be passed to the printer. I would like to say that we shall have it for Christmas but it may well be January. The book will be A4 size and fully illustrated in colour. I shall keep you informed via the church and through Facebook.

It has been a privilege to write this book and I appreciate the help and advice from colleagues.


