Dear Friends,

In the following extract from his poem 'Kneeling', the poet priest R.S Thomas is on his knees before an altar in a country church, 'waiting for the God/To speak. In an echo of St Augustine's request 'Save me God, but not yet'. Thomas says 'Prompt me God/but not yet'. He knows that God could speak through him, as a priest, but that is not what he wants. The last line reveals, paradoxically, that for him 'The meaning is the waiting'. Not the fulfilment. In terms of relevance for us, maybe the experience of lockdown has deepened our understanding of 'waiting'. There were those who felt that it enabled us to live more fully in the present, giving time for ourselves and for God, without rushing to the next goal, or seeking instant gratification of our desires and needs.

It is possible that the easing of lockdown has not brought the sense of fulfilment and release that were anticipated. When the pace of life reasserts itself again, we could, like Thomas, continue to take time to seek God's voice in the stillness of the present moment. Roger.

Cantus in Memoriam Benjamin Britten - Arvo Pärt (b.1935)



The **Cantus in Memoriam Benjamin Britten** was composed as an elegy to mourn the death of the English composer Benjamin Britten in 1976. Pärt greatly admired Britten and described him as possessing the "unusual purity" that he himself sought as a composer. When Britten died, Pärt felt that he had lost hope of meeting the only contemporary composer whose musical outlook, he believed, resembled his own.

Cantus is an early example of Pärt's Tintinnabuli style, which he based on his reactions to early chant music. Its appeal is often ascribed to its relative simplicity; a single melodic motif dominates and it both begins and ends with scored silence. However, as the critic Ivan Hewett observes, while it "may be simple in concept...the concept produces a tangle of lines which is hard for the ear to unravel. And even where the music really is simple in its audible features, the expressive import of those features is anything but".
