Poem of the week

Laurie Lee was born in Stroud, Gloucestershire in 1914 and lived for the first twenty years of his life in the village of Slad. During his teens he played the violin in a local dance band and, after leaving school at 15, became an errand boy at a firm of chartered accountants in Stroud. He left home at 20 and got a job in London as a builder's labourer. He went to Spain in 1935, eking out a living as he travelled across the country by playing his violin, and then volunteered in the Spanish Civil War for the International Brigade. During the Second World War, he made documentary films for the GPO Film Unit in London and was caption–writer–in–chief for the Festival of Britain in 1951, for which work he was appointed MBE. He is perhaps most famous for his autobiographical trilogy, whose first volume, *Cider with Rosie*, describing his childhood in Slad, was published in 1959 to great acclaim. He also began writing poetry in 1944 and is remembered for his nature poems. *Field of Autumn* is one of his lesser–known poems, but is one I like and find particularly meaningful at this time of the year.

Field of Autumn

Slow moves the acid breath of noon over the copper-coated hill, slow from the wild crab's bearded breast the palsied apples fall.

Like coloured smoke the day hangs fire, taking the village without sound; the vulture-headed sun lies low chained to the violet ground.

The horse upon the rocky height rolls all the valley in his eye, but dares not raise his foot or move his shoulder from the fly.

The sheep, snail-backed against the wall, lifts her blind face but does not know the cry her blackened tongue gives forth is the first bleat of snow.

Each bird and stone, each roof and well, feels the gold foot of autumn pass; each spider binds with glittering snare the splintered bones of grass.

Slow moves the hour that sucks our life, slow drops the late wasp from the pear, the rose tree's thread of scent draws thin – and snaps upon the air.

The Constable's Installation



On Wednesday 5th October, we witnessed the Installation of the 161st Constable at the Tower of London, General Sir Gordon Messenger. The office of the Constable of the Tower is one of the oldest in England dating back to within a few years of the Norman Conquest, and is an honour given by the Monarch.

In this case, Her Majesty, The late Queen Elizabeth II, appointed General Messenger last summer but the Keys to the Tower, passed to the Constable during the ceremony, were The King's.

The Installation was a terrific spectacle, with a marching band, fanfares, soldiers drilled on parade and the Yeoman Body in full ceremonial dress.

General Sir Gordon Messenger is the first Royal Marine to hold the post, which has been recruited from senior ranks of the Army since 1784.

Also on parade were The Royal Marines, The Royal Marines Band, 1st Battalion, The Royal Regiment of Fusiliers and The Honourable Artillery Company.








