




The Chapels Royal of St Peter ad Vincula and St John the Evangelist

Dear friends,

This Sunday, we move into the most important week in the Christian year. We start with Palm Sunday. Here is a moving picture by Spanish artist Pedro de Orrento (1580-1645) and a poem by Giles Fletcher (1586-1623) both of which, in their different ways, set the scene for Palm Sunday.

And now, no King, but only Caesar they will have.

A Palm Sunday thought

In many churches, Palm Sunday begins with an open-air procession where everyone carries a palm cross. This leads us into the beginning of Holy Week and our spiritual journey towards the Cross and Easter. I was reminded that, here in London, I have on occasion found myself caught up in either a procession or a protest, simply because I have been trying to get from A to B. Similarly, in the last week, innocent people have found themselves caught up in the French protests and processions against the planned rise in retirement age. I suspect that on what we now call Palm Sunday, many local people, whether by accident or design, found themselves joining the procession that Jesus made into Jerusalem. The church has, at times, condemned all those taking part in that procession, and it made me think how careful we need to be about judging the motives of individuals in crowds. As the crowd moved from shouting 'Hosanna to the Son of David' on that first Palm Sunday to 'Crucify him' on Good Friday, at least some of those in the 'multitude' would have been innocent bystanders. We need to think carefully about how we form judgements about others and try not to lump them together indiscriminately. I suspect that there might be some amongst those watching us as we make our Palm Sunday procession here in The Tower of London on Sunday who, whether through ignorance or prejudice, might come to some quite strange judgements about our motives and purpose. For our part, however, we can be clear that we are echoing the joyful crowd at our Lord's triumphant entry into Jerusalem.

Poem of the week

Malcolm Guite is a poet, singer-songwriter, academic and Anglican priest, whose wife is also an Anglican priest. Although now retired from full-time ministry, he still lectures and writes regularly in the Church Times, where his poems can be read in 'Poet's Corner'. He is very well-known in poetry circles and is often quoted by the former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, who has praised his 'brevity, clarity and capacity for paradox'. Because of Malcolm Guite's detailed research into the work of CS Lewis, he was interviewed as a guest on Radio 4's *Great Lives Series* in 2017, where the historian Professor Suzannah Lipscomb talked to him about CS Lewis, whose works had inspired her life.

Palm Sunday is one of a series of sonnets written for Holy Week, and published in 2012.

Now to the gate of my Jerusalem,
The seething holy city of my heart,
The saviour comes. But will I welcome him?
Oh crowds of easy feelings make a start;
They raise their hands, get caught up in the singing,
And think the battle won. Too soon they'll find
The challenge, the reversal he is bringing
Changes their tune. I know what lies behind
The surface flourish that so quickly fades;
Self-interest, and fearful guardedness,
The hardness of the heart, its barricades,
And at the core, the dreadful emptiness
Of a perverted temple. Jesus come
Break my resistance and make me your home.
