# Church at Home Thought

Someone once wrote: 'It was the journey of a lifetime. I had a round the world air ticket and was travelling with two friends. During our journey we lived in close proximity and made innumerable decisions. Where would we stay? Whom would we visit? What would we do each day? Would we do things together or apart? Where would we eat? What were the essential places to visit in the limited time available? Which cultural experiences could we not miss and where would we worship? We are long-term friends who have our own homes. Living out of suitcases and sharing bedrooms required all the negotiation and communication skills that we could muster. Afterwards all of us agreed that the journey was wonderful. We learned a lot about the people and places visited but even more about ourselves. We laughed and wept together, exercised patience and tolerance, shared resources, resolved differences, explored our beliefs and had some of them challenged. In a sense we

became more fully human because, sharing as we did, we each found that the rough edges of our personalities were being smoothed down. You could say that through sharing the journey we were becoming more Christ-like; being honed and refined. There were times when I remembered Paul and wondered whether his experiences on his long missionary journeys were similar to ours.'

It is only in western societies do we find people living alone, or in small, private households.

We value **our** individualism, and mainstream culture suggests that we should **look** after number one, sometimes at the expense of community. However, the Christian calling is to live as friends, like brothers and sisters, in the community of God's people - usually a local church that is firmly placed in the world.

In this community we are to be practical friends, with a

common purpose to worship and serve the Lord. We are to recognise that our friendships can have a powerful influence on both good and bad. **Proverbs 13 v. 20** says: '*Whoever walks with the wise will become wise; whoever walks with fools will suffer harm.*'

There are warnings against close friendships with unwise, evil, violent people who are not committed to the way of peaceful friendship (**Proverbs 22 v. 24; 24 v. 1, 2**), yet we are to offer practical friendship to them (**Romans 12 v. 17 - 21**) as we aim to 'conquer evil with good'.

## Friendship in the church

Through a letter, Paul called his friends in Rome (**Romans 12 v. 9 - 21**) to a life of deep, practical love in ways that might remind us of the Sermon on the Mount which can be found in **Matthew 5**.

When you read through **Romans 12 v. 9** you begin to see how intensely practical the guidelines are.

Friendship in the local Christian community had to be worked at and there had to be a degree of knowing one another, of openness and honesty, of

sincerity and respect, of sharing resources, of working and praying together and of '**being there for one another**'.

We are called to let love govern all our attitudes and actions. We are called to love even those we consider to be our enemies. We have all been wronged by others. God's love allows us to forgive them and seek reconciliation. All of us have hurt others. Love calls us to ask for their forgiveness and do what we can to make up for the trouble and pain we have caused.

Often we need to make a special effort to reach out to immediate family members – parents, siblings, children, a spouse. Love sometimes call us to swallow our pride and admit our wrongs to others. When we do, our relationships can be healed by God, and our own spiritual condition can be improved. Through the process of living in friendship in this way, people would be changed and their community life would speak for itself to those outside.

Yet, according to Paul, the community witness was to go even further by extending love and forgiveness to those outside the fellowship, not least to those who might wish them ill (**Romans 12 v. 14, 17**).

# Friendship in my church

Compare what you read with the realities of life in your church that you find yourself in at the moment.. Would you describe it as friendly? Do people actually know each other and share friendship in practical ways? How would a stranger perceive your friendships within the church - would they see people who love one another warmly as Christians? Would they see a church concerned for others and providing practical help for those in other parts of the world?

We are told in **Acts 18 v. 4, 5** that the Macedonian church, aware of Paul's needs, sent gifts and money with Timothy and Silas. Consequently Paul spent more time sharing the good news and less time tent - making to provide for his daily needs. They were practical friends.

Of course, there is no such thing as a perfect church. However, things can improve if there is the will to respond positively to Christ's call to be practical friends.

**Romans 12 v. 9 - 21** is an extremely hard – hitting passage of Scripture. It is as though Paul

is firing exhortations at us like bullets - twenty-four of them in total, dealing with the Christian's attitude to the Lord (**v. 11**), the church (**v. 13**), his neighbour (**v. 16**), his enemy (**v. 20**) and himself (**v. 9, 11**). From these far-reaching statements, we can focus on some that are relevant to us today in relation to Friendship in the Christian Community.

There are many things here which challenge us as to the kind of friendship we ought to practise within own church.

Here are four '**bullets**' that maybe we need to bite if we aim to make our Christian friendships count:

## THE BULLET OF LOVE (Romans 12 v. 9, 10)

Love is at the heart of any meaningful human relationship, for love is at the heart of all that God is. '**God is love**' and, because of this, he '**so loved the world**' (**John 3 v. 16**) that he sent his Son, Jesus, to save the world.

Love is forever looking outward to others; by its very nature it cannot be self-centred. Paul begins this section with a clarion call to Christians to '**be genuine**'

in their love for others. We are not to be hypocritical, pretending to love, so he provides some examples of what loving involves:

- **Hate evil.** As Christians we have to learn that there are judgements to be made in life which will affect our spirits. Evil is anything destructive of God's purposes in the world, like pride, bitterness and discrimination against others. These are inconsistent with God's love.
- **Hold fast to what is good.** Everything wholesome is to be embraced. We are to give ourselves to actions that are healthy and character building: encouragement, support and service to those around us.
- **Show affection.** The Bible distinguishes between the '**agape**' love to be offered to all, Christians and non-Christians alike, and the '**brotherly affection**' which is reserved for our closer friends and fellow believers. '**Agape**' love is offered from the will and aims at the good of the individual, even an enemy (**Luke 6 v. 27**); brotherly affection, however, springs from the heart and results in a bonding of two or more individuals.
- **'Outdo one another'** in showing honour. No matter what our rank, position or status, each

believer is a child of God and deserves to be honoured as such within the family of the church. Even the wealthy Philemon was to receive his errant slave Onesimus back as a Christian brother (**Philemon 1 v. 15, 16**).

If this were truly practised, it would transform our attitude to each other, and in turn transform our churches.

## THE BULLET OF CARE (**Romans 12 v. 13**)

Christian love has a practical side to it as well; sometimes evident in compassion (**as felt by Jesus**) and sometimes expressed in practical care (**as shown by Jesus**). Christians need to be demonstrating practical expressions of their new - found friendships wherever they see the need arising. Again, Paul suggests ways in which this should be evident:

- **Giving to one another.** Situations continually arise in which some among us will need practical support, and not just in obvious ways - clothes, food,

books, music, furnishings (1 John 3 v. 17).

- **Sharing our home in hospitality.** Some may find this easier than others, but the rewards of doing so are enormous. Friendships are cemented, burdens halved, and hopes are shared. It may not be possible at the moment to do this, but why not open up your home? You may even find yourself entertaining an angel (**Hebrews 13 v. 2**)!

## THE BULLET OF HUMILITY (Romans 12 v. 15, 16)

Harmony should be increasingly evident amongst friends and within the local church. Paul again, ever practical, suggests:

- **Do not be proud or conceited.** Both these words refer to a kind of snobbish superiority which is occasionally apparent in some of us. This is a barrier which has to be removed if we are to practise Christian love and befriend those who are different from us.

- **Make a point of associating with 'the lowly'.** No matter whether or not you feel you are among 'the lowly', ours is a culture in which image, designer labels, attending the right places and knowing the right people are seen as increasingly important. The Christian ethic therefore makes real demands upon us. It involves going out of our way to meet and befriend others of a different class, who live in a different area or move in a different social group.

We are called to be part of a Christian counterculture.

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## THE BULLET OF PEACE (Romans 12 v. 18 – 20)

If making friends is an important Christian duty, so is maintaining them. Friendships have to be kept in good repair.

- We are to make sure we live at peace with our neighbour, our friend, our associates, our boss, our spouse, our children, our enemy - with everyone! If there is a disagreement or dispute, the

Christian is to be the one to go the extra mile for the maintenance of peaceful relations.

- We are not to resort to revenge, which can have bitter consequences. The peaceful way promotes good health, maintains genial relations and benefits the church as a whole.

Have you ever wondered what would happen if you practised peace this coming week and tried to live in a way that is suggested by Paul in Romans 12 v. 9 - 21, you might just see God transform everything around you.

# Questions to Ponder



- Who do I associate with the most in my church? Why do I associate with these people more than others?
- If God loves me enough to send Jesus to die for me, how can I learn from his example in the way I love others around me?
- What type of friend do I want to be?

if we're prepared to pay the cost.


For love is always worth it
